Meeting To Open PCC Play

Southern California's power aden Trojans and the Beavers of Oregon State, both winners in opening games against inter-sectional foes, meet Friday night in a Pacific Coast Conference football battle in Los Angeles' Memorial Coliseum.

The big problem for Coach Tommy Prothro's Beavers will be stopping the one-two Trojan punch of halfback Jon Arnett and fullback C. R. Roberts, who humbled Texas 44-20 last week. Oregon State upended Missouri 19-13.

Inter-sectional battles between PCC and Big 10 teams highlight the Saturday menu with the West Coast gigantic staged at Palo Alto, where Chuck Taylor's Stanford Indians entertain Michigan State.

TOUGH JOB
Minnesota plays Washington at Seattle while California meets Illinois at Champaign and the UCLA Bruins draw a tough assignment against Michigan at Ann Arbor.

The second strictly conference game of the weekend finds Idaho at Eugene playing Oregon while independent San Jose State battles at Washington State.

USC rates as favorite over Oregon State, but Trojan scout Mel Hein warned that the Beavers have the same personnel as last year except at left guard, right tackle and blocking back.

The Beavers' attack centers largely on halfbacks Sam Wesley and tailback Joe Francis. Against Missouri, Joe threw a pass to Sam on a touchdown play good for 62 yards.

Stanford's Chuck Taylor says that if any team can beat Michigan State this season, his Indians could do it. Chuck feels his passers, paced by quarterback John Brodie, and receivers can possibly counteract the Spartan running attack.

Michigan State's Duffy Daugherty warns, however, not to underestimate his club's passing.

"Our quarterbacks throw on the run and do a lot of passing from the option," he said.

DOPESTERS
Dopesters pick Illinois over California, but to win it, the Illini will have to stop the Bears' passing attack that clicked well in a 7-6 loss to Baylor. Quarterback Gus Giannulas and Joe Contestabile both were pitching strikes to ends Ron Wheatcroft, Roger Ramseier and Norm Becker.

UCLA dropped Utah 13-6 in the opener but without the power of past years while Michigan has been rated a good chance for the Rose Bowl trip. Bruin Coach Red Sanders says, however, that if his team moves and strikes like it did against Utah, "we won't be humiliated."

Oregon, led by halfback Jim Shanley, romped over Colorado 35-0 in the opener and should do about the same thing to Idaho.

Washington, after drubbing Idaho 53-21 as sophomore back Luther Carr made an auspicious debut, hosts a Minnesota club that's been warned by its coaches to "grow back" at the Huskies.

Joe Culmone set a track record in 1950 when he rode 69 winners during 45 days at Atlantic City, N.J.

Fraley's Facts, Figures

NEW YORK (UP)—The New York Yankees aren't too content as they await the outcome of the National League pennant race today because their pitching is wobbling and their series fate may rest in the hands of a one-time castoff and a perennial doghouse inhabitant.

The Yankees, who still figure to be the series favorite, were shaken up a bit when Whitey Ford hurt his back. On top of that, Tom Sturdivant and Johnny Kucks have not been too effective of late.

Which could place a terrific load on Tommy Byrne, once a wanderer of the baseball wastelands, and towering Don Larsen, a modern intype of the unpredictable Rube Waddell.

Ford, if he can move his arm, undoubtedly will get the first game call because he is the Yanks' money pitcher. Sturdivant and Kucks will get their share of work, too, but you can't get away from recent statistics.

NEEDED HELP
Kucks gave up seven hits as he was beaten by Baltimore in the last series and has needed help in his last four games — three of which the Yankees lost. Sturdivant, who figures to start the third game in the classic, has needed bullpen aid in his last five starts, of which the Yankees lost three. The last time out, Baltimore nipped him for five runs on six hits and three walks.

Pitching Coach Jim Turner denies that the American League hitters have seen enough of them and have "caught on" to what they're tossing. Maybe he should wish that this was the case. Otherwise, the National League opponent may make merry against two tossers who have lost the big touch.

If that's the case and Ford's back doesn't come around as it should, Larsen and Byrne may be the two most overworked pitchers in the series.

HOT STREAK
Larsen, who figures to start the second game of the series, has been hot as a two dollar pistol of late. His last three efforts, against Baltimore, Detroit and Boston, all have been four-hitters although in the last named he needed a ninth inning assist from Byrne.

The six-foot, four-inch Hoosier often has been in the Yankee doghouse. In the spring of 1955 the business-like Yankee management almost blew his collective stack when he reported to spring training 25 pounds overweight and preferred reading comic books in the bullpen to pitching batting practice or running.

Byrne at 36 still is regarded as a clutch pitcher after years of near anonymity because of wildness. Earlier in his career he was traded away, shuffled among several clubs and wound up back in the Coast League. There he found himself and the Yanks brought him back at the end of 1954.

He and Larsen well could be the balance of power this time around.

Pels, Owls Face Out Of Town Foes; KU At Redding, Compton Hosts OTI

There will be no action on the home front for the Oregon Tech Owls or the Klamath Union Pelicans this weekend at Modoc Field, but just the same, the two clubs will be taking up the pigskin game on foreign soil, namely California.

Tonight the Pelicans will go against the Wolves of Shasta Union High School in Redding, and Saturday night Oregon Tech's Owls face the Tartars from Compton Junior College in Compton.

Game time for both games will be 7 o'clock Pacific Standard Time.

The prep battle this evening at Redding will bring together two small clubs as the Pels and Wolves will both field "below average" sized teams. KUHS has won one and lost two in their three games so far this year, while Redding is 1-1 for their two appearances on the gridiron turfs this season.

Last week, KU was dumped 26-0 by Reno, but Redding's prepsters poured on the steam to rock Oroville High School club 20-13 and snap a 27-game winning streak. The Oroville win stunk was one of the longest in Northern California high school football history.

The Redding-Klamath Falls series has been running for seven years, with KUHS winning five and losing two. Redding is favored to pick up victory number three in eight attempts tonight.

For the Owls, coach Rex Hunsaker's footballers from the mile high campus will take tonight off and watch the University of Southern California and Oregon State College in a game being played at Los Angeles. Then tomorrow night, OTI and Compton will vie in the west's junior college "Game of the Week."

Compton is the nation's number one JC football power. Last year the Tartars won the Little Rose Bowl crown, and are continuing their good turf ferunnes this year as they go in search of victory number two. Last Saturday, Compton tripped up Bakersfield JC 27-0.

Reports from Compton reveal that the Tartars are stronger than last year with the return of several outstanding boys from the service, and the addition of some topflight freshmen just out of high school ranks. The Tartars are four deep at every position except quarterback, where coach Tay Brown has ONLY three boys capable of running the club.

Next weekend, both the Pels and Owls will be playing before the home folks. On Friday, KU meets Boise in another non-league game, while Tech plays host to Portland State in their first conference game of the year for the OTI club. Tickets for both of these games are on sale at the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce office.

Radio station KFLY will broadcast the Redding-KU game tonight. OTI's game at Compton will be aired by KFMJ, which will also be on hand to carry the KU game this evening.

Indians Top Wing '9' In Little 'WS'

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (UP)—Lefty Dick Tomaneck will take the mound for the Indianapolis Indians tonight against Gary Blaylock of Rochester in an attempt to give the American Association club its second win in the little World Series.

The Indians, behind the superlative pitching of John Gray, defeated the Red Wings, 3-2, Thursday night in the opener of the best of seven series.

Gray held Rochester hitless for six innings. He had a one-hitter going into the ninth and finally wound up with a five-hitter, his second post-season win, although he needed relief in a wild finish.

Rochester had taken a 1-0 lead in the third without a hit when Tim Burgess walked and moved around on Gray's throwing error and a wild pitch. But the Indians went ahead, 2-1, with a pair in the seventh on singles by Rudy Regalado and Stu Loucklin, a sacrifice fly by Joe Altobelli, and a double by Allen Jones, and added what proved to be the winning run in the top of the ninth when Regalado hit a 350-foot homer to left.

That one-game lead could disappear overnight or the Braves could be assured of a tie, depending on the outcome of the games at Busch Stadium and Ebbets Field.

"We're going to do our best to knock them off," said Manager Fred Hutchinson of the Cardinals who can not move up or down from fourth place, no matter what happens.

The Braves appeared free and easy as they swung for the fences in batting practice after a one-day vacation. Most of the players said they found it harder to sit around the hotel lobby than playing ball games.

"We've still got to win them all," said Manager Fred Haney of the Braves. "We can't count on Brooklyn losing any more."

The Braves, leading the Dodgers by one full game in the tight National League race, can clinch a tie by winning two of three from the Cardinals, even if Brooklyn wins all three of its games from Pittsburgh.

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UP)—Chicago's Bobby Boyd, the second ranking middleweight contender, was a 2-1 favorite tonight to stall Joey Giardello's comeback in their nationally televised 10-rounder at the Cleveland Arena.

Boyd, shooting for his 10th consecutive victory, was given the edge on his speed and boxing ability in contrast to Giardello's harder punching. Boyd's height was also a factor against the stocky Philadelphia.
