The next meeting, slated for October 2, will be at the home of Mrs. Hugh Templeton, 4225 Sum-

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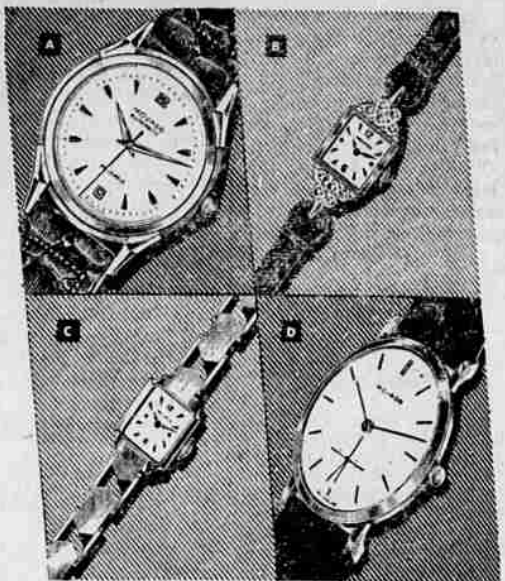
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
