

Income Tax Block Slated For Use In High School

A new edition of the Internal Revenue Service's "federal income tax course," for use in teaching students of high schools and secondary schools basic income tax facts and how income tax returns should be prepared, is being readied for fall distribution this fall, Revenue Commissioner Harrington announced Saturday.

Forms for use in ordering copies of the new course have been mailed to more than 30,000 public, parochial and private secondary schools of the nation. The instruction course was first offered by the Revenue Service five years ago, and it was received enthusiastically by schools all over the country. This year, Commissioner Harrington expects more than 95 per cent of the secondary schools to make use of the course.

Power Project Nears Finish

DUNSMUIR—Use of a portable substation next week for the transfer of voltage north of Dunsmuir will be the final step in a \$30,000 power modernization project in the area.

Power from Mott to the Sacramento River bridge substation will be stepped up as rapidly as the installation of new transformers can take place. Harold Baughman, Copco manager, explained. The portable substation will be moved from Mott southward to assume the 12,000 volt power load from the new transformers until the total power shift can be made.

The installation of new transformers will necessitate the interruption of power from four to six hours in sections of the area, Baughman said. However, he assured TV viewers that outages would be avoided during the World Series broadcast times.

This modernization of the electrical system in north Dunsmuir area has been underway for the past two months and will increase power capacity 500 per cent.
