Know your AIR FORCE

A veteran former U.S. Air Force enlisted man, Warrant Officer Robert F. Moore, is currently serving as commander of the 408th Materiel Squadron, of the 408th

addressed as Mr. in the services) enlisted in the Air Force in 1939 and served at air bases in Illinois, Colorado, California, Washington and Florida prior to the beginning of World War II in 1941.

During the first part of World War II Mr. Moore was stationed at air bases in Alaska. While he was stationed at Adak in the Aleutian Islands he was serving in the armament section of a P-39 fighter squadron. Mr. Moore received a letter of commendation during this time for designing and fabricating a bomb sight for use on the P-39 which made it more effective as a fighter-bomber against Japanese shipping.

By March, 1943 Mr. Moore had advanced through the enlisted grades to that of master sergeant, a rank he held for 13 years until his appointment as a warrant officer in June, 1955.

Following the end of World War II and until 1951, Mr. Moore fulfilled routine duties at air bases in the U.S. and Alaska. In 1952, Mr. Moore was chosen as a member of the Military Assistance Advisory Group to the Royal Air Force and was sent to London, England where he was attached to the U.S. Embassy.

Mr. Moore was returned to the U.S. in 1955 and stationed at McChord Air Force Base, Tacoma, Washington where he was assigned as director of supply in the base materiel office until his transfer to the 408th Fighter Group at Klamath Falls.

Other duties assigned to Mr. Moore at Klamath Falls is supply materiel office and base exchange officer. He lives at 303 Pine Street with his wife Dorothy. Mr. Moore's home town is Savanna, Illinois.

KF Seventh Day Adventists To View New Church Rites

A group of members of the Klamath Falls Seventh Day Adventist Church will attend the first formal open house for the new one million dollar Milo Academy, located 17 miles east of Canyonville on October 7. The affair will also be a reception for Governor Elmo Smith. Plans for the open house were announced by Elder Lloyd Biggs, Oregon conference president.

The new school, although not completed was opened last year. Enrollment this year is 225 students. The completed building has a capacity for 300 students. The October 7 event marks the opening of two dormitories, one for boys, the second for girls, kitchen, dining hall, gymnasium, power plant, vocational training building and a model farm with latest type of dairy equipment.

The 447-acre Lazy Bar Ranch was bought in 1902 from G. Corwin. Since that time the Oregon Seventh Day Adventists have given funds to provide the new school. The million dollar funds were provided without the help of government or state aid.

The Milo Academy is one of three boarding schools and day schools on the high school level operated by the churches in Oregon. For many years Adventist leaders have felt the need of providing a high school in the southern part of the state, according to church leaders.

The governor's reception and open house will culminate many years of planning, sacrificing and working on the part of more than 14,000 church members and friends, Elder Biggs states.

In addition to the governor and high church officials, mayors of Southern Oregon cities, pastors, lay church elders, church members and the public are invited to be present to inspect the new educational institution. Some 2,000 persons are expected.

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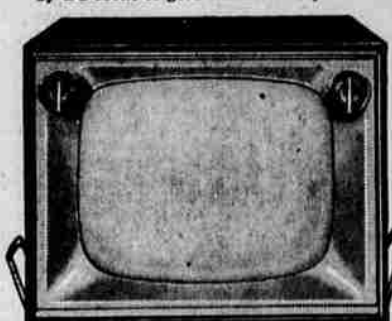
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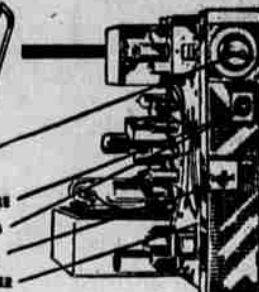


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
