Air Force Speeds Up Overseas Travel Program

Veterans enlisting under the Air Force Prior Service Program will have the opportunity of benefiting from a new speed-up in overseas traveling. Staff Sergeant Frank Linenberger, local recruiter-salesman, has announced.

"Another step to speed up the concurrent travel of Air Force per-

sonnel and dependents to overseas areas has been taken by the Air Force," said Sergeant Linenberger. "The secretary of defense has given the Air Force authority to issue government-owned furniture for use in private rental housing in overseas areas."

The new authority covers areas where the Air Force has set a 2,000 pound limit on the shipment of household goods. This new household shipping limit, combined with the authority to issue government-owned furniture, is designed to benefit Air Force personnel who might not otherwise obtain dependent housing overseas.

The Air Force plan was initiated because many private rental units available to service families overseas were either not furnished or only partially furnished," Sergeant Linenberger explained. "This new authority to issue government-owned furniture will allow families to rent these unfurnished units, thereby improving the housing situation in these areas."

Prior servicemen reenlisting in the Air Force, explained Sergeant Linenberger, stand to benefit from the new change, as the increased supply of overseas housing is expected to speed up travel of Air Force personnel and their dependents going overseas together.
