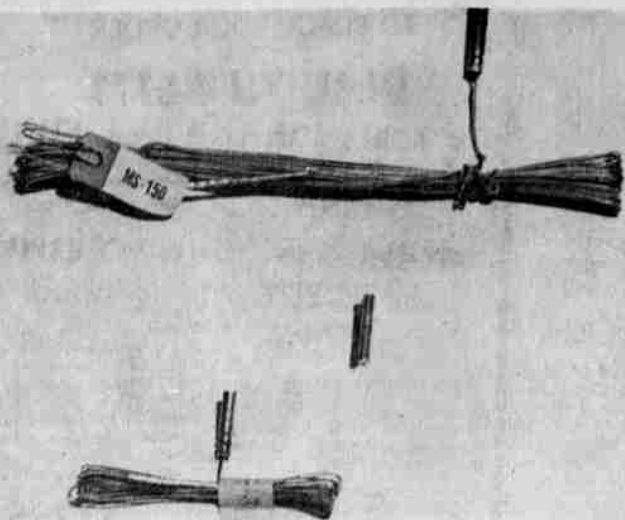

The upper and lower displays, with wire lengths attached to the caps, are the electronic detonated types. The unattached cap in the center is the concussion and fuse detonated type. The center type cap is the type which was in possession of KUHS students last week. The caps are usually between two and three inches in length, are bronze or silver colored, and are equipped with end openings for fuse connections. The diameter of the caps is usually about the size of a lead pencil. "The caps are extremely dangerous," stresses Chief Hamilton, "and anyone happening across one should call the police immediately." The impact of the cap blast is sufficient to tear off fingers, and thousands of small metal shivers permeate the air with such a blast. The chief adds that the caps are particularly treacherous to be around inasmuch as they can go off with the slightest impact.

The Rev. Dr. Martin Gusinde, professor of anthropology at Catholic University and an expert on pygmies, spilled the beans about the joy-producing beetles Monday.

Father Gusinde, just back from an expedition in New Guinea, said the pygmies whom he visited live in a miserable environment. But he said they are happy all the time anyway.

The 70-year-old anthropologist said it's apparently eating the beetles that keep them that way. The pygmies eat them roasted.

Subcommittee To Get Special School Report

Steps are being taken to supply a special House subcommittee with a list of how many government officials in Washington send their children or grandchildren to racially mixed schools in the nation's capital.

The subcommittee, headed by Rep. James C. Davis (D-Ga.) and comprised largely of Southerners, made the request shortly before concluding hearings yesterday into the effects of integration of white and Negro children in District of Columbia schools.

Dr. Hubert M. Corning, superintendent of schools, said he would supply the list. It is to cover the children and grandchildren of President Nixon, Supreme Court justices, Cabinet members, White House aides, senators, House members and District of Columbia commissioners.

SAME DAY

The subcommittee wound up its probe the same day the U.S. Supreme Court began a new session. During the weeks and months ahead the high tribunal is expected to tackle a heavy docket of cases studded with problems of racial integration in the public schools.

Elsewhere on the troubled segregation scene two Negro students were roughed up at Beaumont, Tex., legal maneuvers continued in Dallas, and the white boycott of integrated elementary schools at Henderson, Ky., was reported losing much of its punch.

At Beaumont, pickets from a new White Citizens Council 11 roughed up two unidentified Negroes and prevented them from attending night classes at Lamar Tech College. The students were not injured. Two other Negro students were met by police at the

campus and told to go home. They did.

Police estimated that about 150 white adults set up a picket line at one entrance to the college. They carried placards with slogans such as "rebels with a cause" and "keep our education system white." Later they moved to the college administration building. About 30 police patrolled the campus.

ORDER GIVEN

Lamar Tech, a four-year state-supported school, was ordered to admit Negro students this year by a Federal District Court. It has about 5,000 day students and 1,300 night students. There are 26 Negroes enrolled in day classes and seven in night classes.

At Dallas, the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People lost one round in a move to use federal courts to stop the new Texas drive against school integration suits, but Federal Judge W. H. Atwell told the organization it could file a suit later.

The maneuver resulted in postponement of a hearing by which the NAACP sought to integrate the sprawling Dallas school system. The hearing was reset for Nov. 11.

In Kentucky, the Henderson County Board of Education asked its attorney to explore the possibility of obtaining injunctions against any person interfering with operation of the integrated Weaverton elementary school.

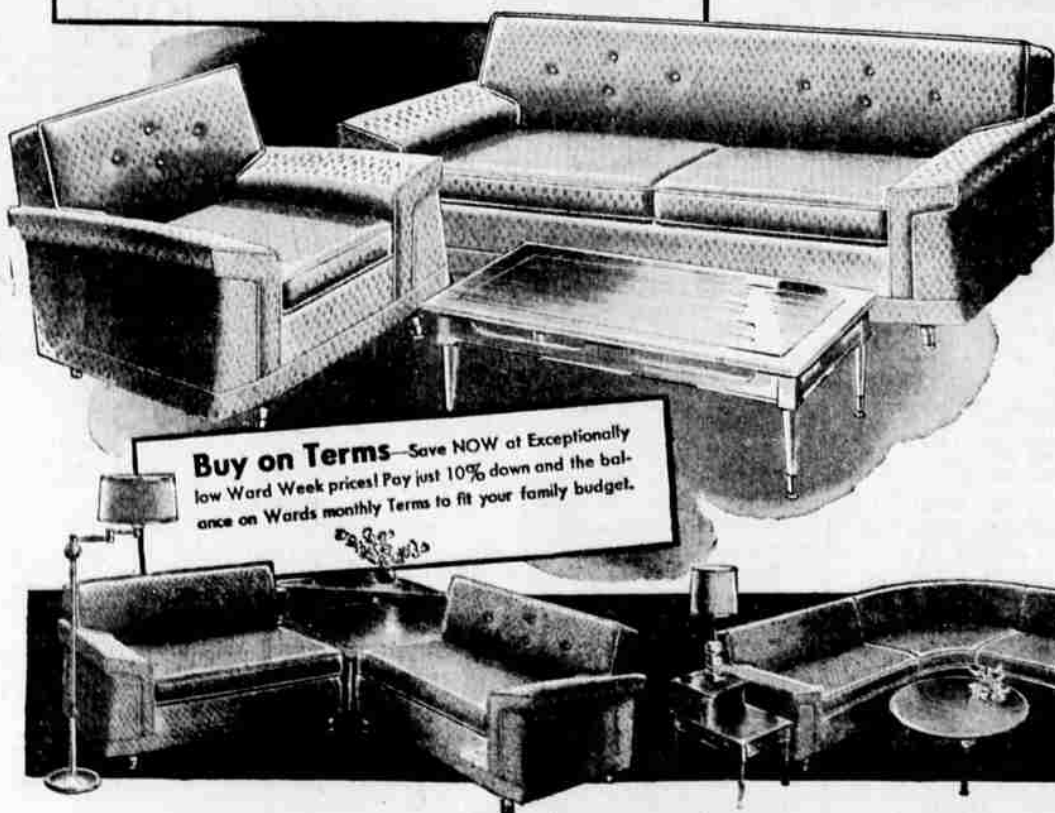

Weather Balloon Picked Up Here

A weather balloon, released by the United States Weather Bureau office at Medford on February 25 of this year was found September 29 on Aspen Mountain about 15 miles west of Klamath Falls by Walter Hamblin, 499 Spring Street, this city.

Hamblin was on a deer hunting trip when he found mechanism that records temperature, air pressure and moisture of the air through which it passes, by means of a radio transmitter. Carried to high altitudes, the balloon which supports the intricate mechanism

is designed to burst at 16,000 feet altitude and the container is floated to earth by means of a parachute.
Hamblin mailed the carton containing the record to Medford Monday.
