## California Vice Jurymen Selection Begins Today

JACKSON (UP)— The difficult task of selecting a jury to try two suspended police officers on charges they permitted a red light district to flourish in downtown Jackson began here today.

Constable Gildo Dundero and Night Patrolman James Fregulia, currently suspended from the Jackson police force, were indicted by an Amador County Grand Jury on charges they collected huge payoffs from bawdy house madams. The pair also was charged with lying to the grand jurors during a week of sensational public hearings by the jury.

An initial panel of 30 prospective jurors was called but it was doubtful if 12 among them could be selected to hear the case. Feelings have run high in the town on the case and some townspeople and officials have appeared to be openly in sympathy with the officers, who made up two-thirds of the town's police force.

Following their indictment by the Grand Jury, the City Council hesitated before suspending them. Police Chief Guido Totanelli, who was accused by the jury of looking the other way as far as the brothel business was concerned, has been allowed to remain on active duty. He recruited a new police department but one of the two new officers already has resigned after being charged with a felony.

The attorney who represented Totanelli during and after the hearings was appointed city attorney by the City Council shortly after the hearings ended.
