Off-Street Parking Plan Passed By City Council

Off-street parking for all apartment houses built in Class 2 residential districts will be required in the future, announced the Klamath Falls City Council at its regular meeting Monday night. The council's motion sets the requirement at one car per apartment unit. This requirement is outlined in the new zoning ordinance now being drawn up by the city planning commission. The planning group has been working on the new zoning ordinance most of this year. It is expected that it will be ready for council action some time late this year. The new zoning statute will also require off-street parking in all other business, residential and industrial zones. This off-street parking provision is required in most other cities where it has been found necessary due to the growing number of automobiles in America, it has been pointed out. In further business, the council granted permission to Mayor Paul Landry to attend an air power demonstration to be staged by the U.S. Air Force at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida on October 7. Mayor Landry, and Max Wauchope, city editor of the Herald and News, will be flown from Klamath Falls by the Air Force to the demonstration as guests of the Air Force. This demonstration is put on by the Air Force every year to show the latest tactics and weapons that have been developed. Eglin is the headquarters of the research and development arm of the Air Force and the site of the air proving ground. Congressmen, civic lead-

ers, military representatives from all over the world, and members of the several press media are invited to attend the demonstration each year. Thomas C. Barnes, sewage plant engineer in charge of the three sewage treatment plants of the city (the main plant on the Klamath River, the small auxiliary plant on Owens Street and the plant at the municipal airport) was presented with a certificate by the mayor for completing a course last May at Oregon State College, Corvallis. Barnes attended the course which is put on by the college in conjunction with the State Board of Health. It qualifies him as an operator of Class 1 sewage plants. "You are to be commended for fulfilling an unknown, but necessary and vital job, in such an efficient manner for the past several years," Mayor Landry told Barnes. "Although not a glamorous job yours is one that is most necessary to the health and well-being of all the citizens of Klamath Falls," Mayor Landry added.

Gore Sees Like Trend Decreasing

WASHINGTON (UP)— Sen. Albert Gore (D-Tenn) said today he found on an eight-state tour an "unmistakable trend" away from President Eisenhower. And the trend, Gore said in an interview, is "picking up steam all the time." Gore shied away from making a flat prediction at this point that the Democrats will recapture the presidency. But he said "as of now Mr. Eisenhower is in very serious trouble and the Republican state tickets are in even worse trouble." COMPLETES 10-DAY TOUR Gore based his political analysis on his "grass roots findings" during a 10-day speaking tour through eight states. His itinerary included New York, Ohio, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Utah, Idaho and Tennessee. On the basis of conversations with everybody from local politicians to cab drivers, Gore said, he found voters switching to the Democrats for these reasons: "The tie-up between the administration and large vested interests; a feeling that the President is not fully on the job and doubt that he is fully boss when he is on the job; tight money, high interest rates and the cost of living; "THAT FELLOW NIXON" "Hard times" for farmers; "the worsening drift of international affairs, and "that fellow Nixon." Gore said it is difficult to assay at this point what effect Mr. Eisenhower's stepped-up campaigning will have on the presidential race. But he doubted Mr. Eisenhower can save many hard-pressed GOP candidates on state tickets from defeat. "The presidential coalition is not worth what it once was," he commented.

'Big Three' Auto Figures Told

DETROIT (AP)— The auto industry's "big three"—General Motors, Ford and Chrysler—built 4,980,833 passenger cars in this year's first nine months. The figures, announced by the three big producers, compare with 5,714,147 car assemblies in the comparable 1955 record. Of the total General Motors accounted for 2,337,646 units this year against 3,038,951 in the like 1955 period; Ford Motor Co. 1,148,090 against 1,631,965 and Chrysler Corp. 605,097 against 993,191. Biggest car builder in this year's January-September period was GM's Chevrolet with 1,192,929 assemblies compared with 1,405,504 in last year's comparable period. Ford's Ford Division accounted for 924,380 cars in this year's initial nine months compared with 539,793 in the like 1955 period.
