 CHICAGO — Butcher hogs dropped 25 to 35 cents Wednesday in a generally slow market. Buyers obtained most 200 to 250 pound butchers at \$16.25 to \$16.25 with several lots at \$16.30 and \$16.40 and 200 head at \$16.50 to \$16.65, the top. Sows went at \$14.25 to \$15.75.

One load of high prime steers sold at \$34.00, equaling the year's high, but generally the steer market was depressed.

Most high choice and prime steers commended \$27.00 to \$32.50 and good to average choice \$19.50 to \$26.50. Heifers sold steady to \$1.00 lower, good to average choice going at \$18.50 to \$23.50.

Most good to prime wooled lambs were bought at \$18.00 to \$22.00.

Salable receipts were 10,000 hogs, 16,000 cattle, 400 calves and 2,500 sheep.

## Pioneer Klamath County Family Member Passes

Moray Lindsay Applegate, born August 6, 1876 at Dairy, the son of Capt. and Mrs. Ivan D. Applegate, died last Saturday at the home of a friend in Los Angeles while en route to Southern Oregon from Mexico. He had been ill for several weeks.

Mr. Applegate attended Monmouth College and the University of Oregon, which he was attending when the Spanish-American War broke out. He enlisted in the U. S. Army and served for some time in the Philippine Islands. Following his discharge he returned to the states and was graduated from the university.

He returned to the Philippines following his graduation and served in the educational department under the U. S. governor general. Later he was chosen by the U. S. government to collect various island specimens for the St. Louis Exposition.

After his next return to the U. S. he became interested in Mexico and was sent there as manager of a large ranch. While there, he married a Spanish girl, Pastora Perez. Two sons, Bernard and Richard were born to them there.

At the outbreak of one of the Mexican revolutions, he and his family escaped by boat from Mazatlan and went to Los Angeles where they made their home for several years. A daughter, Alicia, was born to them in Los Angeles.

Mr. Applegate returned to Mexico after the death of his wife and spent the remainder of his life attempting to recover titles to lands confiscated by the Mexican government.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Alicia Hardy, Ashland; two sons Bernard and Richard, address unknown; two sisters Mrs. Alice A. Peil, Ashland, and Mrs. Lena Lee Smith, Klamath Falls; a niece, Mrs. Ted (Margaret) Darnment, Klamath Falls; two nephews, Dr. Buford Hartus, Klamath Falls; and Albert Pierce, Texas, and 10 grandchildren.

Burial and services were held Monday in Los Angeles.

## Sodomy Trial Begins Today

Merle M. Crawford, 42-year-old Chilquoian ranch worker charged with sodomy, went on trial here Wednesday before Circuit Judge E. H. Howell of Canyon City.

Judge Howell entered the case after Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg disqualified himself to preside at the trial.

Defense Attorney Glenn Ramirez disqualified Circuit Judge Charles Foster, who was assigned to the case by the Oregon Supreme Court. The high court then named Judge Howell.

Deputy District Attorney P. K. Puckett said he expected a jury would be selected by early Wednesday afternoon.

Crawford was arrested last March on a charge of molesting a 13-year-old boy.

**STEELWORKER DIES**  
 SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Maurice O'Brien, 50, a steelworker, was burned to death Tuesday night when a fire of undetermined origin broke out in his San Francisco apartment.

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
