Berserk Rap Brings Jail

A 33-year-old harvest worker, who was reported to have terrorized a farm camp one mile south of Malin with a butcher knife and a meat cleaver, was lodged in the county jail here Tuesday night.

He was L. H. Horton, who said he came to Klamath Falls from Texas to work in the potato harvest.

According to Deputy Sheriff Del Summers, Horton had been drinking heavily and boasting to other residents of the camp that he had a brother who was killed while robbing a Texas bank.

Sheriff Murray Britton, who investigated the fracas, said Horton menaced several persons while storming through the camp waving the butcher knife and cleaver. He also was reported to have slashed the sides of a tent.

Deputy Sheriff A. L. Schmidt of Malin signed a complaint against Horton.

Russia Accepts U.S. Offer To View Campaign Drives

WASHINGTON (UP)—Russia has accepted a United States invitation to send Soviet observers to this country to watch the wind-up of the presidential campaign.

Moreover, the Russians said they would welcome similar American visitors to observe Soviet-type campaigning and balloting in their next big election.

Moscow's agreement to send "two or three" observers to the United States was communicated to the American Embassy in the Soviet capital last Saturday, the United Press learned.

The State Department sent similar invitations about two weeks ago to Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary and Romania. Russia and the satellites were asked to send observers "to view at first hand the free electoral processes in this country."

Administration officials are surprised that the satellite nations so far have not accepted the U.S. invitation—particularly after Moscow did so.

There is speculation that the satellites will fall into line. But there is some feeling, too, that the Russians might not like to have the satellites know too much about the "free and unfettered elections" the United States has been talking about for years for Eastern Europe.

The State Department plans to have the Russians in this country

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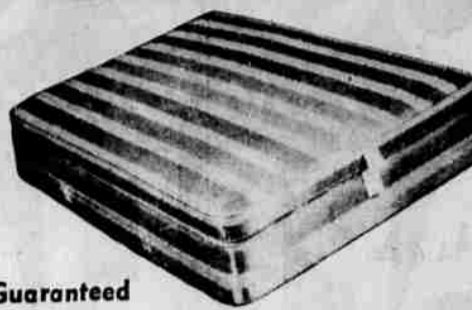
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about Oct. 21 for a quick swing through the nation. A tentative schedule calls for the visitors to begin their tour in Washington, work their way into southern

states, to Texas, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and back the "northern route" to New York City for election day, Nov. 6.

At the State Department's suggestion, Pan American Airways already has received approval of the Civil Aeronautics Board to fly the Russians to this country free of charge. If the satellites send two or three observers each, the overall cost to the government of the experiment in East-West relations isn't expected to be more than \$20,000.

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
