Tito Reportedly Rebuffed Over Anti-Stalin Program

BELGRADE (U)—President Tito reportedly has failed to convince his Soviet hosts at Yalta that they should not soft-pedal their de-Stalinization program.

Informed sources said the Soviet-Yugoslav talks in the Crimea have reached an impasse over Tito's reported insistence that the lessening of Moscow's controls continue as a condition for reviving Belgrade's ties with Yugoslavia's satellite neighbors.

These informants said Tito's campaign for independence of the satellite Communist parties from the Kremlin's direction has run into opposition from Soviet party chief Nikita Khrushchev himself.

Khrushchev reportedly has cooled on the so-called liberal policy introduced following the Soviet Communist party Congress last February and Tito's visit to the Soviet union in June.

The report is based on growing belief that Khrushchev's power in the Kremlin has waned and that he has been forced to swing toward the viewpoint of former Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and other old-time Stalinists.

Molotov, Deputy Premier Lazar Kaganovich and other old guard members are said to feel that Khrushchev's softer policy went too far and weakened the Soviet position in Eastern Europe.

Few here believe Khrushchev has undergone a change of heart about Stalinism. But he apparently shares his Kremlin associates' alarm as to where a policy of more independence for the satellites might lead.

Diplomats here believe Khrushchev wanted to explain this to Tito when he made his surprise visit to Brioni recently. But with the Yalta talks in their seventh day,

There were no indications when Tito would return from Yalta.

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Ten Perish In Accident

MUNCIE, Ind. (UP)—Ten persons were killed, including a family of nine with four small children, Wednesday night in a head-on, two-car collision seven miles west of here.

Sheriff's police said Fred Beal, 32, his wife, Lillian, 30, their daughters, Claudia, 4, Vickie Lynn, 5, Christiana, 6, and Inez, 8, Beal's mother, Mrs. Marie Clark, 60, his sister Loretta Beal, and a friend, Jesse Price, 37, died in the accident.

The 10th victim, who drove the other car, was identified as Thomas Bryan Burns, 35, Keystone, Ind. All those riding in Beal's car were from Muncie, police said.

Police said John Nicewander said skid marks at the point of impact indicated the car driven by Beal apparently swerved across the westbound lane over the center line and crashed into Burns, eastbound car.

All the victims expect one were killed instantly, Nicewander said. Lillian Beal died shortly afterward on the operating table of the ball Memorial Hospital in Muncie.

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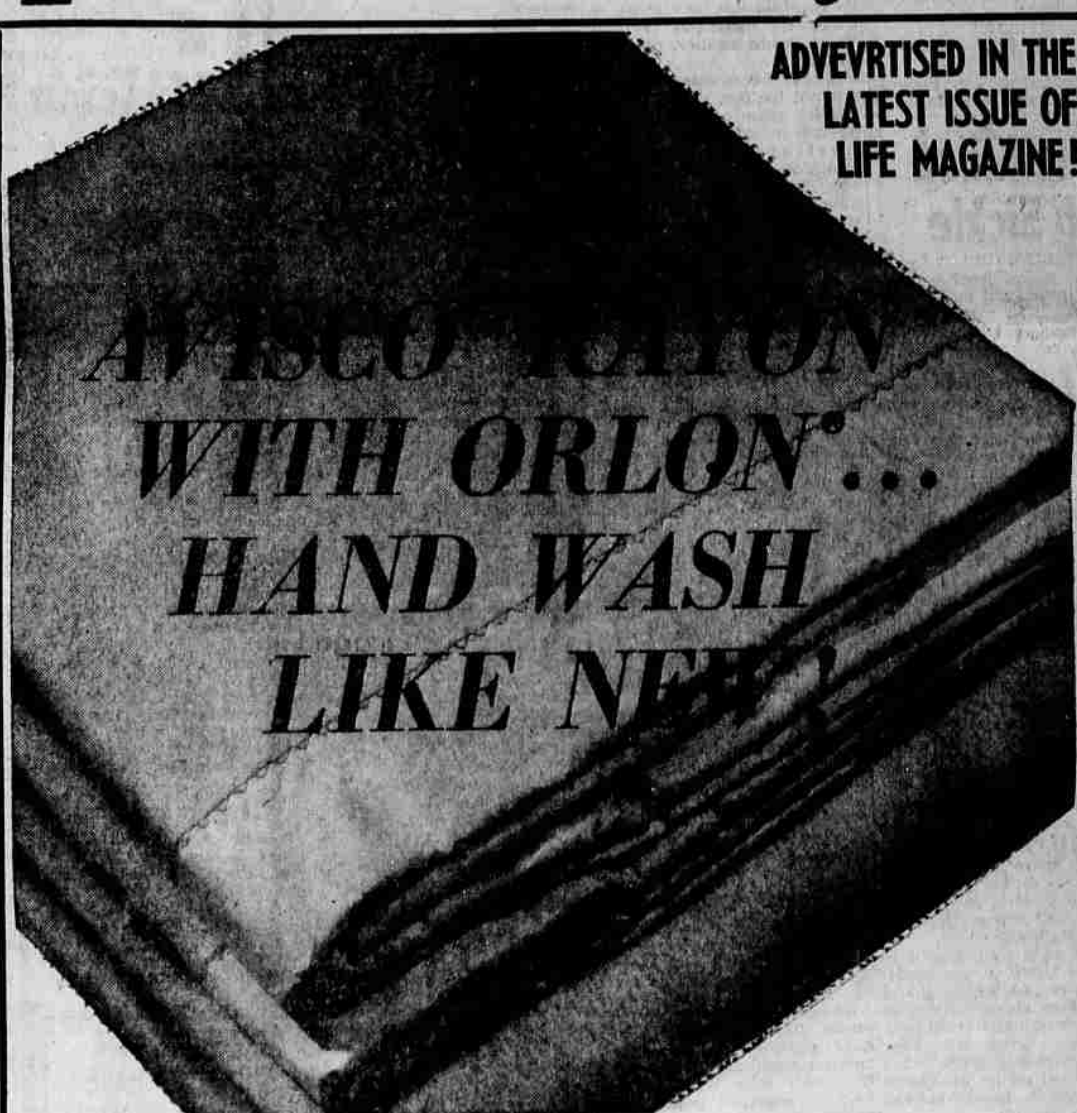

Fowl, Eggs Best Buys

The housewife who steers clear of high price tags on beef and other meats this weekend will find comfort in the more moderate cost of chickens and eggs.

Beef prices are expected to head lower soon, but for the moment are still at high levels. Wholesale prices eased off this week and steers sold cheaper, but for the most part this shift has not yet reached the retail level.

Lamb and pork also bring reduced wholesale prices now and should be cheaper by next week. Until then there will be little change in what the butcher charges his retail customers.

Chickens, in both frying and broiling size, are the most widely featured weekend special. In many areas they are selling several cents per pound lower than last week.

Cabbage, onions and potatoes are the outstanding buys on vegetable counters, government market observers report. Also selling at good prices are celery, corn, peppers, tomatoes and spinach.

Canflower and eggplant are moderately priced and lettuce fluctuates according to the quality and amount of local supplies.

On fruit counters, apples and grapes will attract the thrifty shopper.



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
