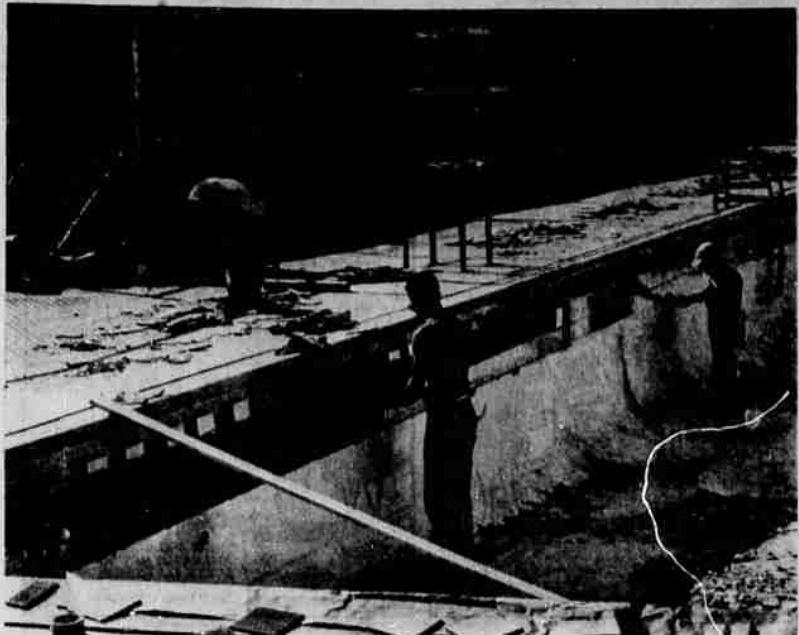
WOMEN RECOGNIZED

Barbara Nichols Gives Advice To TV Starlets

NEW YORK — For TV starlets with an eye on a film career, Barbara Nichols has a word of advice. The way to break into movies, she says, is to play hard to get.

This 5 foot, 5 1/2-inch stunner with turbulent ash blonde hair speaks with some authority. She avoided movie studios and the scouts found her on TV. And with three movies completed, bouncy Barbara has yet to take a screen test.

"Most girls have it all wrong," she explains just a mile petulant. They want to get in the movies, and they all rush to Hollywood. "But the way to get in films

is stay right here. Let them come to you."

Her own formula for breaking into the cinema has been live TV and Broadway shows.

She made a big splash a couple of seasons back in a bit appearance on Sid Caesar's NBC-TV show. Later, Caesar called her back and worked a whole show around her.

"Somebody's always bound to be watching, one place or the other," Barbara figures.

Before her stint on the Caesar show, Miss Nichols probably was the best-known unknown in the land. For two years she was the calendar girl of Esquire magazine, and as a model her face and figure appeared on the covers and inside pages of 200 other magazines.

Determined since childhood that she wanted an acting career, Miss Nichols captured a batch of beauty contest titles and went on to bit roles in night clubs and stage shows.

Then a movie scout spotted her on the Caesar show—and that got her a part in "Miracle in the Rain." Next came roles in "Step Down to Terror" and "Beyond a Reasonable Doubt."
