### OTI Screen Printing Classes To Compete In Cover Design Contest

The winning cover design for the program for the next meeting of the Northwest Chapter, Screen Printers of America, will be chosen late Monday from 10 entries submitted by second-year students of the screen printing technology class at Oregon Technical Institute, according to Earl H. Bairey, instructor.

In line with his practice of using actual jobs as classwork projects, he made arrangements with Ross Ray of Screencraft, Ltd., Vancouver, B.C., president of the Northwest Chapter of employers in the silk screen printing industry, for program covers for the organization to be made by his class at OTI. The screen printers meet alternate months and the next meeting will be held in November in Portland.

The winner will be announced to the class on Tuesday and work will start at once so that the cover can be completed by October 15. The inside of the cover will carry credit lines giving the names of the artist and screen printer and the firm donating the materials used.

The first cover will be printed with Day-Glo from Switzer Brothers, Inc., Cleveland, which has given the OTI screen printing technology class approximately \$50 worth of Day-Glo to use in classwork.

### US Bank Deposits Told

The United States National bank of Portland showed deposits totaling \$771,842,344 as of September 28, 1956, according to figures just released. This represents an increase of more than nine million dollars over deposits reported at a similar period this time last year.

The Klamath Falls branch reported deposits of \$12,921,971.46 according to W. A. Huggins, manager. Loans and discounts for the statewide banking system increased more than 53 million dollars during the past year. The 12-month gain now gives U.S. National a loans and discounts total of \$346,216,898. Last year on October 3 U.S. National's loans and discounts stood at \$292,505,416.

Loans and discounts for the Klamath Falls branch now total \$5,329,635.28, Mr. Huggins reported. Total resources for the U.S. National bank at the end of this 12-month period are \$948,397,555—up more than 20 million dollars over this similar period last year.
