

# College Women Need Wider Scope Says Stanford's Dr. Lois Meek Stolz In Address To AAUW

The need for college women, to when she addressed delegates to identify themselves with things the board meeting of the Oregon Association of University Women September 21-22 in Eugene. Dr. Lois Meek Stolz, professor of psychology at Stanford University, 21-22 in Eugene.

Presiding at the two-day conference was Mrs. R. Willard Duncan, state president from Klamath Falls. Also participating from Klamath Falls were Pali O'Connor, state publicity chairman, and Mrs. G. W. Nelson, branch president.

In her keynote address at the Saturday luncheon at Erb Memorial on the University of Oregon campus, Dr. Stolz said, "Too many women today are motivated by 'self' interests. The motivation should be for both self and others to make the individual greater within so that having more to give she may give more."

She traced the development of AAUW as an organization dedicated to promoting women in education and listed three trends experienced within the association:

to improve women's collegiate education, to improve adult education and to improve education as a whole.

"If we put into practice what we stand for," the professor said, "we will have made a generous contribution to democracy."

Dr. Stolz is a former educational secretary for the AAUW, director of the Child Development Institute at Teachers College, Columbia University, assistant to the governor of California as coordinator of child care services and director of wartime child service centers in the Kaiser shipyards at Portland.

During the business sessions of the board meeting, Mrs. Duncan reported on the work of association leaders.

"We are trying to protect AAUW into the next 25 years, to determine a program to serve members, communities and the world," she said.

She announced plans for the 1957 state convention which will be held April 25-27 in Baker. Delegates voted to accept the invitation of the Grants Pass branch to hold the 1958 convention in that city.

The group also voted to endorse a statewide referendum which would permit the state to receive, hold and dispose of stock that is donated or bequeathed. The proposal will appear on the November ballot as Ballot No. 2.

The agenda for the meeting included a panel discussion on the AAUW program, moderated by Mairine Lober, state vice president from Portland. State chairmen reported on the progress in their areas of activity.

Following adjournment, Mrs. McCloud — Arlene Van Keuren McCabe of McCloud and Mario Facchin of McCloud were married in Reno on September 2. Following a week's honeymoon on the coast, they are making their home in McCloud.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Van Keuren and the bridegroom's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Valentino Facchin.

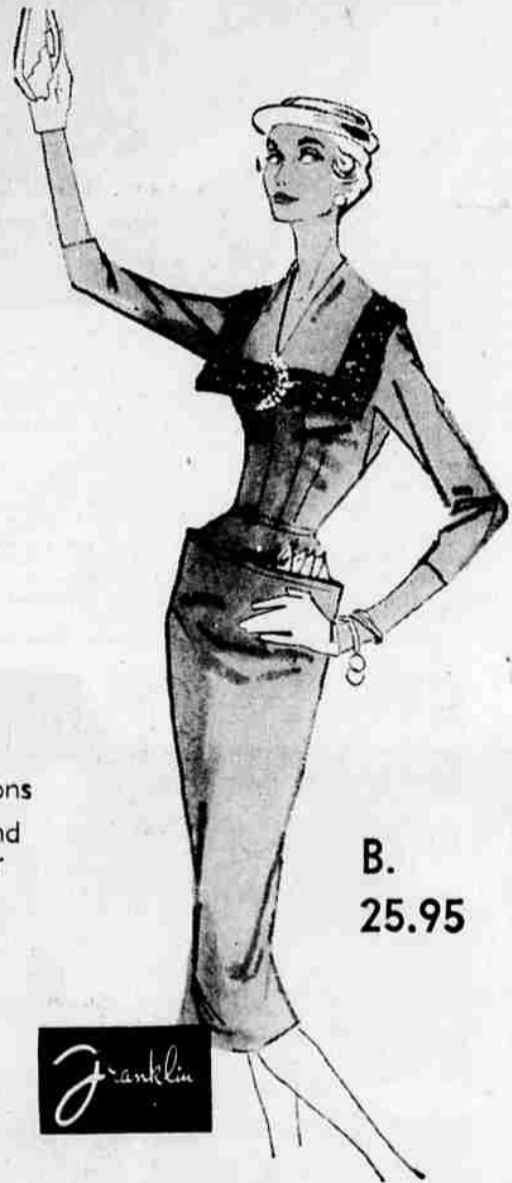
