## PTA Representative Talks Of Group's Work, Program

Mrs. Ellen Dell Bieler, a field representative of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, conducted a workshop in the basic fundamentals of Parent - Teacher organization Friday, October 5, in the lecture room of the county library. Accompanying Mrs. Bieler were Mrs. Leigh Gustison, junior vice president of Region 5, and Mrs. John Benson, state parliamentarian.

Mrs. Art Moore, president of Klamath County Council of PTA, opened the session by introducing Mrs. Gustison, who in turn introduced Mrs. Bieler. Mrs. Bieler expressed her pleasure at being in Klamath Falls for the second year, and was particularly impressed with the new Parent-Teacher TV program originating here, which she termed "heartening and thrilling."

Referring to the action program of the national congress, which concerns juvenile protection, mental health and social service, Mrs. Bieler commended Klamath County on its recreational and detention facilities, and stated that there were only 160 detention homes in the nation.

However, she said, "PTA should make a survey and examination of the qualifications of juvenile court judges in Oregon, for in many instances they are not too high - in fact, some judges have none at all. Also, what are the training schools throughout the nation like? Are they really rehabilitation centers, or just some place to hang hats? Some PTAs visit these schools and bring back reports."

Speaking on the educational field Mrs. Bieler said, "America is anathetic in the matter of education. We need to find ways in which the school system can be reorganized more economically and efficiently. In our national legislative program we supported federal aid for the construction of school buildings during the current emergency, because we know that a year ago in America there were over 2-1/3 million youngsters in classrooms above the classroom space available. Last spring PTA supported the Kelly Bill, which lost by 16 votes. Whether or not we believe in such a bill, we need to have programs that bring about an honest analysis of the situation. No state in the union has demonstrated its willingness to stand on its own without federal aid."

"Another thing we do not do more about is to get enough good teachers and keep them. Nation-wide we do not meet the needs for teachers. By 1965 we are going to need 16 new teachers for every 10 on the job now - 60 per cent more than we're teaching in the schools now to meet replacements and increased enrollment. We are losing approximately 60,000 teachers here in America because the pay is so poor."

"We do not give enough to the Oregon Tuition Scholarship program, which is definitely a teaching scholarship and carries prospective teachers through the four years of college. The weakness in giving a scholarship locally is that a unit cannot afford to do this." Mrs. Gustison stated that approximately \$174,000 is allocated each year for teacher training in Oregon by the OCPPT.

## Chief Warns Of Cooking

A fire in your home this winter would be expensive and inconvenient, assuming your family was lucky enough not to be hurt in the bargain, says Chief M. G. Gordon of the Suburban Fire Department.

One of the likeliest starting places of such a fire in any home, according to the chief, is the heating and cooking equipment - ranked by National Fire Protection Association estimates as the number two cause of home fires.

Here's the chief's advice on cutting down the chances of your heating and cooking equipment causing a costly, "inconvenient" fire:

Check the location and installation of stoves and furnaces to make certain that nearby walls, floors, curtains, furniture and other combustible material cannot be ignited.

Make sure all types of heating and cooking equipment are placed well out of normal travel routes to doorways.

When buying new heating or cooking equipment, look for the label and instructions which show testing and approval by some nationally recognized testing laboratory such as Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. Underwriters' Laboratories of Canada or the American Gas Association.
