

Top Bull Sale Prices Told

LAKEVIEW—The top price of \$760 was paid by Dan Schumacher of Silver Lake at the Lake County Range Bull sale held at the fairgrounds in Lakeview Saturday, October 6. A close second was Jess Roberts of Lakeview with \$750 for a single animal.

Forty-five head were sold at an average price of \$457 for the sale. The average for two-plus grade was \$566; grade two—\$524, and two-minus, \$371. Statistics for last year's sale showed 46 head with an average price of \$740; two-plus, \$608; grade two, \$427; two-minus, \$350.

Coon Vows Dam Work

BAKER — Congressman Sam Coon told the Milton-Freewater electric municipality Monday that he would cooperate with its plans to seek a partnership arrangement at John Day Dam if it is not built as a federal project.

In a letter from J. R. Castner, Milton-Freewater city manager, Coon was asked for his support of a proposal similar to the Priest Rapids partnership plan.

Four Oregon cities—Milton-Freewater, McMinnville, Eugene and Forest Grove—are working with the Klickitat PUD of Washington on an arrangement of this kind, Coon was told.

In his reply, the congressman pointed out that any group, public or private, would be able to participate under the provisions of the bill he introduced in 1955.

He said that the utilities would have six months after the passage of the bill in which to apply for a share of the power which the dam would provide.

"I am interested in helping all groups in Oregon that need power," Coon wrote. "We will not be able to meet our power needs if we rely on the federal government alone. Therefore, it will be necessary to obtain cooperation from groups like yours in financing new projects."

Coon was informed that the Oregon municipalities are working to obtain 50 per cent of the power to be generated at John Day Dam for the State of Oregon.

DeLap Predicts 500 New Voters

Although official records were not available, County Clerk Charles DeLap estimated Tuesday at least 500 new voters were registered at his office last week.

DeLap also said there was a substantial increase over the Democratic majority shown before the May primary election. At that time there were 11,354 Democrats and 8,872 Republicans registered in Klamath County.

Official registration figures for the November election will be announced later this week.

Youth Enlists In U.S. Navy

Klamath Basin Potato Fete Parade Rules Told

MERRILL—All parade entries for the Klamath Basin Potato Festival parade to be held on Saturday, October 20, are to form on the Merrill Elementary School grounds by 10:00 a.m. for pre-judging. The parade starting time is 11:00 a.m. sharp.

Line of march is south to the highway, east to the Signal Service Station corner, north two blocks, then west to the point of starting where the parade will disband.

Four elements will be taken into consideration on the judging of the parade floats.

1. Theme excellent. How well is the theme presented?
2. Theme scope. Does the theme have wide community interest?
3. Eye appeal. Are colors bright or dull? Is it pretty?
4. Quality and neatness. A. Is the cab covered? B. Is the frame work covered? C. Is the display well built? D. Is the lettering rough or good?

Each of the sub-items will be graded from one to five points giving an over all total possible score of 50 points.

Parade prizes have been announced as follows:

Class 1 — Commercial section which includes implement dealers, business houses, etc. First prize, \$30 or cup, second prize, \$20, third prize, \$10.

Class 2 — Service clubs. Prizes same as for Class 1.

Class 3 — Organizations and lodges. Prizes same as for Class 1.

Class 4 — Juvenile division floats. This class includes schools, teen-age clubs, children's organizations, etc. Prizes are also the same as for Class 1.

Class 5 — Comic section, includes funny costumes and old vehicles. First prize, \$15, second prize, \$10, third prize, \$5.

Class 6 — Children's division — Pet section. First prize \$5, second prize \$3, third prize, \$2.

Costumes — Prizes same as for Class 6.

Vehicles — Prizes same as for Class 6.

An engraved cup will be awarded the community with the best representation in the prize list. A special prize of \$25 will be awarded for the best float in the parade.
