STOCKS

WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market declined Tuesday on the small volume in a year.
Wall Street observers ascribed the dull performance to continued concern over tightening credit as well as preoccupation with a crucial World Series baseball game.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined 80 cents to \$178.90 with the industrials down \$1.30, the rails down \$1.10 and the utilities unchanged.
Volume totaled 1,220,000 shares compared with 1,450,000. It was the lowest volume since Jan. 11, 1954 when the same number of shares changed hands.

CHICAGO (AP) — The hog market was steady to strong on all weights and types in a fairly active market Wednesday.
Butcher hogs were scarce at weights over 260 pounds. Most 200 to 230 pound butchers sold from \$16.00 to \$16.25. Several lots of 195 to 225 pounders brought \$16.35 to \$16.50.
Several lots from 200 pounds down sold for \$15.85 and larger lots of mixed grades selling 170 to 195 pounds sold from \$15.25 to \$16.00.
Steers were steady to strong compared with Tuesday's market and some sold 50 to 75 cents higher.

High choice and prime steers sold from \$27.50 to \$33.25, the top. Mixed choice and prime steers selling 975 to 1,075 pounds went at prices ranging from \$28.00 to \$29.25.
Slaughter lambs sold unevenly steady to 50 cents higher while yearlings and sheep held about steady. Good to prime woolled lambs sold from \$18.50 to \$22.00.

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Council Hears Report On 'Black Snow' Removal

Work designed to remove the soot from the downtown stacks of the Consumer Heating Plant is well underway and will probably be completed within six weeks, the weather holds. The Klamath Falls City Council heard that report last night.

Councilman Walter Fleet told other members of the council that one of the boiler collectors has already been installed, that the other necessary material is on its way, and that the "black snow" will be eliminated within a six week construction period, weather permitting.

One property owner was on hand in protest of the proposed assessment as a part of the Painter Street improvement. His contention was that his property is not on the street, that it will be a dead-end street, and that it will in no way serve his property or increase the value of it.

The council pointed out that the long-standing city policy for assessing properties in such an instance provides for apportionment with the extent of the assessment reducing as the distance of the property from the given street frontage increases. In any event, all property within specified bounds is assessed with the passage of given improvement projects.

Other persons were on hand to inquire as to why the assessments on some Eldorado property are higher than some of the Painter Street assessments as a part of

the improvement project. The city engineer explained that the difference is due to the Eldorado lots being larger.

The council approved the ordinance for assessment.

In other matters the council:

(1)—Read the assessment ordinance as related to the improvement of the portion of Fremont Street bounded on the northeast by Pacific Terrace and on the southwest by Newcastle Street.

(2)—Read the ordinance providing for the annexation of the Sunland Addition, being the approximate 10 acres between Avalon and Austin off Shasta Way. The ordinance will be in force at the end of 30 days and the people of the addition will vote on the issue if the measure is not contested by referendum during the 30 day period.

(3)—Held a non consenting hearing and heard the ordinance providing for the annexation of the South Sixth Street area extending from the Tower Theater site. The approximate 57 acre plot is bordered by Washburn Way, Shasta Way, South Sixth and Home Acres. The city attorney provided information indicating that all involved property owners have consented to the proposed annexation.

(4)—Discussed the possibility of improving and developing the small park in the vicinity of St. Francis and Lookout streets, and referred the question to the park and recreation board. The possibility of improving the Ewuana park was also discussed.

(5)—Heard the fire chief's August report to the effect that the department answered 38 alarms during the month with property damage being concluded at \$4,733.45. The chief further reported that one fire death was suffered during the month. On August 10, Danny Skeen, about 38, was removed from his cabin at 219 Broad Street when the caretaker was awakened and noted smoke from the cabin. The caretaker removed Skeen's body, extinguished his burning bed, and then summoned the fire chief. The report indicated that the fire was believed caused by a cigarette.

California Weather

Northern California: Increasing cloudiness in the north portion today and south portion tonight, followed by light rain beginning on the north coast this evening and spreading to Santa Cruz and Sacramento by early Wednesday, then clearing slowly Wednesday afternoon; cooler along the coast and in the north portion Wednesday; coastal wind southerly 8-18 mps north of San Francisco and variable 7-15 mph elsewhere.

San Francisco Bay Region: Increasing cloudiness today; cloudy tonight and Wednesday; a little rain Wednesday morning; cooler Wednesday; high today San Francisco 70, Oakland 75, San Mateo 75, San Rafael 75; low tonight 54-59; gentle wind, becoming southerly 8-16 mph Wednesday.

Sierra Nevada: Fair today; increasing cloudiness tonight then cloudy Wednesday with a little rain north of Highway 50; cooler north portion Wednesday.

Sacramento Valley: Increasing cloudiness today and tonight; cloudy with a little rain Wednesday; cooler Wednesday; high today 76-83; low tonight 55-65; high Wednesday 68-74; southerly wind 8-18 mph.

There is some fog on the coast this morning and high clouds are appearing in the sky over Northern California. The high clouds herald the approach of a weak cold front now over the ocean about 350 miles northwest of San Francisco. With approach of the front the high clouds are expected to thicken and lower to give rain as far south as Santa Cruz and Sacramento.

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
