Perrin Awarded Housing Plans

Howard R. Perrin, Klamath Falls architect, has been awarded the architectural engineering contract covering residential housing for Air Force personnel of the 40th Fighter Group and associated units to be stationed at Klamath Falls, according to Col. E. D. Grashio.

The housing is planned for a location about two and one-half miles southwest of the Klamath Falls municipal airport in the Miller Hill area.

The housing units, to cost up to \$16,500 each, will be built under Title VIII of the new Capehart law and 320 units have been certified by the FHA, according to J. Guy Arrington, regional FHA director in Portland.

"It is hoped that actual construction can be initiated early in the 1957 calendar year," Col. Grashio stated.
