Clem Labine Avenges '53 Yank Victory

BROOKLYN (AP) — Clem Labine's victory over the Yankees Tuesday gave the Dodger right-hander a full measure of revenge for his defeat in the game that gave the Yankees the 1953 world championship.

Three years ago Brooklyn went into the sixth game down three games to two. With the Yankees ahead 3-1 Labine came on in the seventh in his more familiar role of reliever and got a chance to square the series for the Dodgers when Carl Furillo belted a two-run homer in the ninth to tie the score.

But Labine walked Hank Bauer to start the ninth. Yogi Berra lined out, but Mickey Mantle beat out an infield hit and Billy Martin singled Bauer home with the run that won the game and the series.

The situation was somewhat similar Tuesday. Again the Dodgers were down 3-2 and needed a victory to square the series. This time Labine drew his first series start and he was never better as he blanked the Yankees 1-0 in 10 innings to keep the Brooks in the running.

He can forget the sixth game of the 1953 series now.

"I feel sorry for Bob Turley because he pitched a great game," said Labine after Tuesday's game. "I never saw anyone faster. But to the victor belongs the spoils. Sal Maglie pitched a great game Monday, but he lost. Don Larsen may have pitched a perfect game but if he feels any better than I do now, I just can't believe it."

Labine yielded seven hits, two to Berra, but in his toughest spot of the game he got the hard-hitting Yankee catcher on a fly to Duke Snider in center.

"This came in the eighth when Joe Collins doubled with one out. Labine was ordered to walk Mantle intentionally to face the dangerous Berra."

Yogi swung at the first pitch and filed out.

"What did Labine throw?"

"I threw him a curve that broke inside," replied the Dodger six-footer. Incidentally Labine's curve broke sharply whenever he threw it.

"Was he relieved to get rid of Berra so quickly?"

"I'll say I was. And you can say that again."

BROOKLYN (AP) — Figuring the

total attendance for the six games is 312,121. The gate, however, will not exceed last year's classic when 362,310 paid their way through the turnstiles. The seventh game of the '55 series was played in Yankee Stadium and 62,465 turned out to see Johnny Podres blank the Yanks.

A record overlooked. Duke Snider of the Brooks broke the all-time record for strikeouts last Sunday when he fanned for the 31st time in series competition.

Snider has struck out twice since then. The old record was 30 established by Babe Ruth in 10 series.

Snider struck out eight times in 1949, five in 1951, six in 1952 and 1953, eight in 1955 and eight so far this year.

This was supposed to be a good series for sluggers. But only 49 runs were scored in six games for an average of four runs a game for each team.

Bob Turley's 11 strikeouts was his highest total since June 29, 1955, when he wiffed 11 Baltimore Orioles. It was also the first time he pitched more than nine innings since May 30, 1955 when he lost a 10-inning game to Washington.

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Robinson Looks For Another Active Year

BROOKLYN (AP) — Jackie Robinson, feeling "like a kid again," wants to help Brooklyn win one more National League pennant before pulling down the curtain on his active playing career.

"I feel I've got at least one more good year in these old legs of mine," the superb Negro athlete said after delivering the blow which gave the Dodgers a 10-inning, series-knotting 1-0 victory yesterday in the sixth game of the World Series.

"I want to play one more year. I'm sure I can help them win another pennant. Next year at this time I may feel I'm good for another year. As long as that's the case, it's going to be hard for me to do something softer — like managing."

Robinson is rated top-flight managerial material — although no one of his race has led a professional team in this country — and his name has popped up as possible manager of Montreal, a Dodger subsidiary.

NOT FACTOR

"Money is not a factor," Jackie said. "I think my wife Rachel would like for me to manage and slow down some. But, to me, I'd be like a fire horse put out to pasture."

Today Robinson is 37. The muscles which made him an all-star athlete at UCLA still ripple over a frame of six feet and 185 pounds. He still has a fierce competitive fire.

Yesterday Manager Casey Stengel of the Yankees twice ordered Duke Snider walked to get to Robinson — each time with two out and a Dodger in scoring position at second base. The first time, in the eighth, Jackie popped out to third base. The second time, in the 10th, he lined a hit to left field scoring Junior Gilliam with the run which broke up a sterling pitching duel 1-0.

"The fellows on the bench told me 'They can't get you twice like that, Jackie' and I was pretty confident they couldn't either," Robinson said. And they didn't.

10TH YEAR

The graying Dodger infielder, completing his 10th season in the majors after becoming the first

Negro to crash the barrier, said: "I've slowed up some — a step and a half," he said. "But my legs feel as good as ever. I think my eyes have lost nothing and my coordination is
