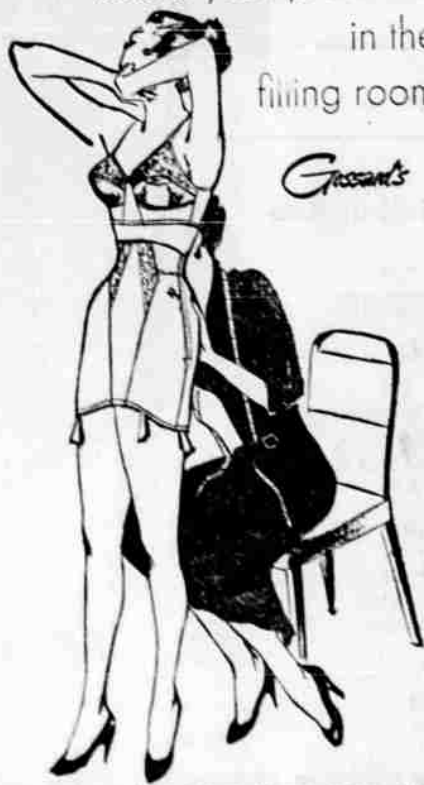

4,000 MPH Research Plane Planned In Two Years

WASHINGTON (UP)—The government is planning a rocket-powered research airplane that will fly well over 4,000 miles an hour, it was learned exclusively today.

It may be ready to fly in about two years.

Designated the X15, the spectacular little craft is expected to reach altitudes well above 200,000 feet, or more than 38 miles.

The airplane is under joint development by the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, the Air Force, the Navy, and North American Aviation, Inc., Los Angeles. It has been mentioned in congressional testimony, but details have not been announced.

The X15, if it performs as planned, will carry man at speeds more than twice as fast as those achieved to date in a research plane and about three times as
