Significant note in the news:
British troops and police are battling frenzied Chinese mobs with riot guns, bayonets and tear gas in an attempt to end ANTI-FOREIGN rioting in Kowloon, which is the mainland part of the British crown colony of Hong Kong.
At least eight Chinese are reported dead and hundreds of persons have been injured.

Let's take a sharp and realistic look at what is happening in Kowloon.

Suppose the Chinese dominated GOVERNMENT and business in Klamath Falls. Or the British. Or the French. OR THE RUSSIANS. Or the subjects of any other foreign power.

WE'D RESENT IT.
We'd resent it because, like all the other peoples of the earth, we want to run our own shebang. We'd probably start riots, just as the Kowloon Chinese are doing—even if we knew that a lot of us would get killed in the rioting.

This is why the Kowloon incident is significant:

The days of colonial imperialism on this globe that we call The Earth are DRAWING TO A CLOSE.

Communist Russia is now the ONE GREAT colonialist-imperialist power. She holds under her stern thumb all the surrounding conquered nations that are commonly referred to as her satellites. She keeps them under her thumb because she has GUNS and the people of her satellites have none. They know that if they revolt against their imperialist Russian masters they will be slaughtered like sheep.

But—
Even the might of Russian communism won't stand forever against the tidal wave of nationalism—which means the natural yearning of all peoples to run their own affairs—that is sweeping the world.

Do you recall Achilles—the hero of Homer's Iliad?

He had a weak spot. The weak spot was his heel, where his mother held him when she dipped him in the waters of the Styx to make him invulnerable. She forgot that her gripping fingers kept from his heel the magic water of the dark river.

So, when he was wounded in the heel by an arrow sped from the bow of Paris, the son of Hector, he DIED.

Russia's Achilles heel is the inherent foolishness of the brutal communist system of colonial imperialism under which she holds the victims of her conquests.

SP Service Hearing Set

SALEM (AP)—The proposed cut of Shasta Daylight train service between Portland and San Francisco to three round trips a week will be subject of an Oregon Public Utilities Commission hearing.

Commissioner Charles Helzlsouer said Thursday he is calling the hearing although he has no authority to order the Southern Pacific to keep the service at the present daily rate in the meantime. A court opinion—which is being appealed—held the commissioner lacks such power.

However the California Public Utilities Commission has ordered the railroad to keep service at the daily rate until it looks into the matter.

59 Dead In Border Battle

JERUSALEM (AP)—Israeli forces wiped out another Jordan border police station, the fourth in a month, in a seven-hour artillery and hand-to-hand battle that ended early Thursday.

Official accounts from both sides said 59 were killed and 25 wounded before a U.N. ceasefire demand finally brought firing to a halt at 5 a.m. Unofficial accounts said as many as 160 were killed.

The Israelis said their forces attacked Kalkilyeh Station, a mile inside Jordan and 62 miles north of Jerusalem, as a reprisal for the slaying of two Israeli farm hands.

The Israeli forces engaged in fierce hand-to-hand fighting, grenade throwing and bayonet charges before they finally blew up the post with TNT charges and withdrew to their base across the border, informants said. An extended artillery duel across the border followed.

Search Continues For Plane

LAKENHEATH, England (AP)—Hours of searching by an armada of planes over the Atlantic failed Thursday to turn up a hint of what happened to a U.S. military transport plane which vanished during the night with 59 men aboard.

At one time before night fell, 27 search planes, including big jet bombers, were in the air carrying out the search. Ships below doubled their watches, but there was not a clue.

The missing craft, a giant C118 Liftmaster of the Military Air Transport Service (MATS), was carrying two Air Force officers and 49 Air Force enlisted men back to the United States after duty in England. Also aboard was a nine-man Navy crew of three officers and six enlisted men.

The four-engine plane, military version of the civilian DC-6, left this American base, 60 miles north of London, at 6:26 p. m. (10:26 a. m. PST) Wednesday on a 1,200-mile leg to Lajes Air Force Base in the Azores.

It was last heard from at 8:36 p. m. (12:36 p. m. PST) when it was approximately 180 miles southwest of Land's End, Britain's most westerly point.

The U. S. 7th Air Division in London said a signal, reported to be an SOS, that was picked up by search planes and relayed to Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland as possibly coming from the Liftmaster, was a garbled version of a message between freighters discussing the search operation.

The transport was due at Lajes at 12:21 a. m. Thursday (4:21 p. m., PST Wednesday). When it last reported back to base here it still had enough fuel to keep it airborne until 5:30 a. m. Thursday (9:30 p. m. PST) Wednesday.

At 4 a. m., however, American and British military authorities ordered a gigantic search of the entire ocean area from England to the Azores on the presumption that the plane was down somewhere in the Atlantic.

Normally planes of MATS have three or more life rafts, each capable of carrying 20 men. Passengers aboard also are required to wear "Mae West" lifejackets to sustain them in the water in case of a crash at sea.

By noon Thursday the planes engaged in the search had swelled to 20, including three six-engine U. S. B47 jet bombers flying at high altitude and using radar in an effort to pick up some clue.

Other British, American and Portuguese air force planes from Germany, France, North Africa and the Azores combed the eastern Atlantic, and all shipping in the area was asked to be on the alert for signs of wreckage or survivors. The search was aided by excellent weather and visibility up to 18 miles. Rescue operations were being directed from St. Maguans, Wales.

An Air Force spokesman said the Liftmaster would have flown on from the Azores to either Westover Field, Mass., or McGuire Field, N. J., depending on the weather.

Earthquakes Told In U.S.

EUREKA, Calif. (UP)—A moderate earthquake, in two distinct rolling type shocks, was felt here at 8:50 a.m. PST today with some damage to buildings reported.

There was no damage to buildings, nor were there any reports of injuries.

The University of California seismograph at Ferndale, 15 miles south of here, registered the quake at 4 a magnitude and said it was still recording on the seismograph 40 minutes after the initial shock.

The epicenter was placed in the Pacific Ocean, 100 miles north-west of Ferndale.

NEW YORK (UP)—Fordham University Observatory today reported seismograph detection of "a very large earthquake" 5,600 miles from New York in an undetermined direction.

The Rev. Joseph Lynch, observatory director, said the first of two shocks occurred at 10:36 p. m. Wednesday and the second followed at a little after 10:46.

Lynch said the shocks had a magnitude rating of six and one half points.

Israeli sources said Jordan sent a regiment to Kalkilyeh after the attack started, but it ran into an Israeli blocking force and failed to reach its goal.

Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, chief of U. N. truce supervisor, finally prevailed on both sides to observe his ceasefire call after the Israelis withdrew.

The Kalkilyeh station was the fourth Jordan police fortress wrecked by the Israelis in the past few weeks. In the biggest attack, on Sept. 25 at Husan, near Jerusalem, 39 Arabs and 5 Israelis were killed. Israel said it acted then in reprisal for the slaying of four members of an archaeological party outside Jerusalem on Sept. 23.

Explaining last night's attack, the Israeli communiqué said: "The Jordan gang which murdered two Israeli citizens during their work in an orange grove Tuesday had entered Israel territory of Kalkilyeh."

Oregon Soaked By Rainfall

Rain fell through much of Oregon Wednesday, and the forests and rangelands across the entire southern part of the state got a heavy soaking.

Lakeview recorded 1.16 inches in the 24-hour period ending at 4:30 a. m. Thursday, a downpour equaled only at North Bend on the coast.

Farther inland Burns received two-thirds of an inch of rain, and other normally dry points reported up to three-quarters of an inch.

Foresters and hunters hailed the rain, for it reduced fire danger and made for easier stalking of game in the hunting areas.

Clearing weather is expected to set in now, and the Weather Bureau at Portland told Eastern Oregon to expect freezing weather. Temperatures will dip as low as 22 degrees in the high valleys, forecasters said.

McKay Pushes Drive Into Klamath, Lake Counties

Former Interior Secretary Douglas McKay wound up a hectic 20-hour campaign session in Klamath Falls Thursday morning and then flew to Lakeview to seek further support in his battle for election to the United States Senate.

The Eisenhower ex-cabinet member set a merry pace for his local campaign managers from the minute he alighted from his chartered two-engine Aero Commander plane at Klamath Falls Municipal Airport at 12:45 p.m. Wednesday until he took off Thursday morning.

Because his plane was grounded before its takeoff at Portland for two hours by bad weather, McKay arrived later than scheduled in Klamath Falls and had to cancel some of his engagements.

The former Oregon governor shuttled between living rooms and hotel lobbies until midnight Wednesday, trailed by weary but enthusiastic Bob West, co-chairman of his Klamath Basin campaign committee, and George Proctor, chairman of the Klamath County Republican Central Committee.

APPOINTMENTS

McKay kept seven coffee hour appointments in Klamath Falls homes and mingled for two hours with the workers at the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company plant.

Highlight of the round of activities was a no-host dinner Wednesday evening in the Pelican Cafe party room attended by 150 of the candidate's staunch supporters.

Governor McKay spoke briefly with emphasis on the achievements of the Eisenhower administration. He frankly admitted he did not have a solution to the current farm problem.

"You can't settle the farm problem through politics," he said. "It must be met on an economic plane. We'll just have to keep trying."

McKay added that he did not believe farmers blamed President

Eisenhower for the problems of agriculture.

"Some of them may be mad at Ezra Talt Benson," he continued, "but I don't believe they are mad at the President."

SUMMATION

In summing up the achievements of the Eisenhower administration, Governor McKay pointed out that at present no place in the world is a member of the United States armed forces being shot at.

Defendants Freed In Vice Case

JACKSON (UP)—Two suspended Jackson police officers were free today of charges of bribery and perjury in connection with a flourishing red light business which operated in this Mother Lode town.

Superior Judge Ralph McGee returned a verdict of acquittal Wednesday for Gildo Dondero, constable, and James Fregulla, night patrolman. The pair had been charged with accepting huge payoff sums from madams, in return for permitting operation of the bawdy houses, just a stone's throw from the town's main street.

McGee's six-page decision indicated a belief the prostitution operation in Jackson was bigger than the police force. He said a week's public hearings by an Amador County Grand Jury indicated the officers "had no control over the operation of prostitution in Jackson" and could not have been guilty of the illegal acts charged.

The Grand Jury, which indicted the men after a week of spicy public hearings, also had charged them with lying during the hearings. In an unusual legal move, the case was tried by McGee without a jury and without a formal trial. He based his decision on 600 pages of testimony gathered during the Grand Jury hearings.

In view of Wednesday's verdict, it was expected that an accusation against Police Chief Guido Tofanelli, charging him with failing to take action against prostitution, would be dropped.

Dondero and Fregulla were suspended from their positions on the police force, pending outcome of remained on the job, recruiting a new two-man force. One of the new officers resigned after a few weeks when he was charged with a felony.

Union Requests Modoc Election

International Woodworkers of America, Local Union No. 6-12, AFL-CIO, recently petitioned the National Labor Relations Board to hold an election among employees of Modoc Lumber Company here.

An NLRB representative was in Klamath Falls Tuesday and an election was held among the 77 employees of the lumber company. Results of the election were made known Wednesday afternoon.

Thirty-five votes were cast in favor of the union and 39 against the union. A simple majority was required for a decision and there were no challenges.

More Than 100 Killed In Colony

HONG KONG (UP)—Rioting between Communist and Nationalist Chinese erupted into virtual open warfare in this British Crown colony today. More than 100 persons were reported killed.

The rioting started Wednesday when a Nationalist flag was raised over a refugee resettlement center.

Starting as an intra-Chinese battle, it soon turned into an anti-foreigner drive. Europeans and other white persons were stoned, beaten, mistreated and their cars and property attacked and burned.

BRITISH ARMY UNITS

The government called out its police reserves and sent British Army units to restore order in the riot-torn areas of Kowloon and the new territories, both British-leased slivers of mainland China opposite the island of Hong Kong.

But the lull that resulted was short, and the mass violence erupted with new intensity today in Kowloon and the new territories.

A government spokesman said 10 persons were killed in incidents in Kowloon.

He said worse trouble exploded in the new territories where, "It is feared inter-faction fighting resulted in some 100 deaths before military authorities entered the town and were able to gain control of the situation."

RED-NATIONALIST FIGHT

"The character of the earlier disturbance has also changed and appears to involve inter-faction fighting between members of the left wing and right wing movements," the government spokesman added.

In Hong Kong, left wing means Communist Chinese and right wing means Chinese loyal to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist regime on Formosa.

A British army patrol reported it had found 60 bodies in a factory area where rioting broke out Wednesday.

Japs Protest USAF Base

SUNAKAWA, Japan (UP)—Four thousand leftist-led demonstrators today manhandled 53 Japanese government surveyors attempting to chart enlargement of an American airbase near this farming village.

It was the ninth straight day that the pickets, made up of labor union members, students, Socialist Party Diet members and a few villagers, halted the survey.

The U.S. and the Japanese governments want the runways at Tachikawa Air Base lengthened because the U.S. Air Force cannot now use the field for its most modern jet fighters or load its big transports to capacity.

The one main street of this tiny village was jammed with demonstrators when the surveyors arrived shortly after noon with their instruments.

The surveyors, hired by the Japanese Procurement Agency, attempted to push through the crowd so they could start work. But the demonstrators shoved and manhandled them back.

After trying for 20 minutes to get through, the surveyors gave up and left.

Ike Defends H-Bomb Policy

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, firing back at Adlai Stevenson, said Thursday his administration has done everything humanly possible to bring the H-bomb threat under international control and use atomic power for peaceful purposes.

Eisenhower also told a news conference he regards management of America's internal affairs as the paramount issue of the presidential campaign.

A reporter told Eisenhower that Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, said in an address at Seattle Tuesday night that "Republican politicians, including the President, have little understanding or sympathy with attempts to save man from the greatest horror his ingenuity has ever devised."

Stevenson was talking about the H-bomb and defending his proposal that H-bomb tests be ended, under certain conditions.

In reply, Eisenhower said the record is there and speaks for itself.

He then went on to say his administration has done everything humanly possible to get this thing (the H-bomb) under control and use it for peace.

Stevenson's suggestions that H-bomb testing be ended and that the possibility of halting the military draft be explored have turned into two of the hottest issues of the campaign.

Eisenhower said Thursday he has uttered his last words on those two subjects.

Most of Thursday's news conference, like others of the past few weeks, was devoted to politics.

Eisenhower did say, in response to a question, that he is willing to go anywhere and do anything to help bring about a peaceful solution of the Suez crisis. He said, however, it must be a peace with justice.

Eisenhower had been asked whether he would be willing to go

before a meeting of the United Nations in the interest of trying to find a solution.

Eisenhower said he would make a personal appearance before the U.N. Security Council if he felt that would help solve the problem.

On the political front, Eisenhower's assertion that management of America's internal affairs is the main issue of the presidential campaign came when a reporter asked him to give his view on that matter.

What the government must undertake, Eisenhower said, are programs in the field of social security, health, unemployment insurance, aid for education, plus trying to see that the nation has a sound dollar.

The President placed great stress on need for a sound dollar and a stable economy, saying that without them, pension schemes all over the country would fall to the ground. That, he added, would affect millions of older folks.
