Mother, Four Children Die

STRATFORD, Conn. (AP)—A 60-year-old mother and four of her children perished early today when fire swept their six-room home in this Bridgeport suburb.

The mother, a daughter and two sons were only 15 feet from the front door when they were felled by dense smoke. Another son was found in an upstairs bedroom, a short distance from the window.

They were Mrs. Florence Talbot, whose husband died six months ago; her 13-year-old daughter, Betty, and three sons, Thomas, 21, Robert, 23, and Jack, 28. Jack's body was found upstairs.

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Cold Weather Covers U.S.

Chilly weather covered most of the eastern third of the nation today as southerly winds warmed much of the mid-continent.

The cool air which centered over the Great Lakes region yesterday moved eastward and extended over the Eastern Seaboard from New England southward to the Carolinas. Temperatures dropped below freezing in many sections of New England but they were generally above the 32-degree mark in the Middle Atlantic Coast states.

The warming trend was reported in the upper and middle Mississippi Valley and the northern central plains, with readings 20 to 28 degrees higher than 24 hours earlier.

Cool weather continued in many parts of the Great Lakes region with temperatures in the 30s and below freezing in some areas.

Postal Label To Be Ousted

WASHINGTON (AP)—Postmaster General Summerfield announced today that the familiar label "may be opened for postal inspection" no longer is needed on sealed second, third and fourth class matter.

Summerfield said he had adopted the suggestion of his legal department that the inspection regulation is now so well known to the public that when the sender seals such packages he gives implicit authorization for its inspection. The requirement for labeling has been in effect since 1921.

Summerfield said that when a mailer does not wish to have his mail opened for inspection, he needs only to mark the item "first class" and attach the proper first-class postage.

Music Course Shows Rise

Participation in the music instruction classes within the city schools reflects a marked increase this year.

School Superintendent Arnold Gralapp points out that the number of students registered for elementary and junior high music instruction this year is 477, compared with 432 for the same period during October of the 1955-56 school year.

The major portion of the increase is reflected in the number of students taking wind instrument training, as opposed to the lesser increase of those studying string instruments.

The report further indicates that the KUHS 'A' band membership has dropped from 80 to 77, with the 'B' band increasing from 29 to 32 members. At the same time, the high school orchestra membership has increased from 52 to

55, and the a cappella choir has increased from 79 to 86 members. Membership in the girls' glee club has dropped from 71 to 46, with the boys' glee club membership remaining static at 45. A major increase is seen in the membership of the mixed chorus which is up to 81 from a figure of 42 last year.

The overall high school music enrollment is 453 this year as compared with 398 last year.
