Optimistic note in the news: Britain and Egypt are reported to have made conciliatory moves in private talks on the Suez canal dispute. (The talks are being held at United Nations headquarters in New York.)

A diplomat at the U.N. says Egyptian Foreign Minister Fawzi has agreed that Egypt would be willing to co-operate in some respects with the Suez canal users' association. He adds that Britain, in return, has dropped its insistence on international operation of the waterway.

We need more of that kind of management in government.

There are, of course, women and women — just as there are men and men.

An able young man of my acquaintance came in to see me yesterday. He was fit to be tied, and he needed somebody to unload on.

He had been talking politics with a couple of women friends and in the course of the session he remarked that although he had come near voting for Mr. Stevenson four years ago he couldn't see him now with a telescope because he is beating the drum for issues he's sure Adlai doesn't believe in.

"Why," one of his women friends said, "he's just doing that to get elected. He's BEING SMART."

The other agreed.

They weren't just arguing, he says. They BELIEVED IT.

That's why he was fit to be tied.

I still think the ladies were just arguing.

I'm reasonably sure that if their children had exhibited to them an example of the twisted moral and ethical thinking involved in the argument that the end in view justifies whatever means are taken to GAIN THE END both would have been shocked — and if the children had been below ten age some spankings would have ensued.

Mothers are like that. That is why, over the centuries, they have been the keepers of the world's morals and the maintainers of the world's most admirable ethical standards.

Anyway, I think we need more women candidates for public office.

KOTI-TV Slates Sports Programs

The Cavalcade of Sports will be seen over KOTI-TV, Channel 2, Klamath Falls, Friday evening at 6 p.m. from Madison Square Gardens, according to a last minute report from the station.

TROOPS CLASH

ALGIERS, Algeria. — French and uniformed rebel troops clashed a few miles from Algiers Friday on an estate where a secret rebel hospital was discovered Thursday. The French said six rebels were killed, while French losses were put at one killed and two wounded.

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Uneasy Calm Reigns Over Colony Areas

HONG KONG (AP) — An uneasy quiet settled today over riot-torn Kowloon and surrounding villages. Authorities kept a tight curfew clamped on Hong Kong's mainland territory where two days of frenzied rioting and a factional fighting left 44 known dead.

The colony's British government also sealed Hong Kong's border with Communist China, presumably to prevent Red agents from slipping across to further inflame the atmosphere.

Acting Gov. E. B. David extended the curfew imposed Thursday until Saturday morning to

give police a better chance to round up persons suspected of leading the riots.

Housewives in each of Kowloon's six curfew zones were allowed only two hours a day on the streets to buy provisions. Gurkha troops from Himalayan Nepal lined the streets as crowds rushed to the stores where prices already were soaring. Spotter planes hovered overhead.

Except for these hours, Kowloon was almost a dead city. Its streets were deserted, and most restaurants and all movie houses closed their doors.

TROUBLEMAKERS

A few bands of Chinese troublemakers still roamed the streets in defiance of the curfew, attacking shops and looting. But they scattered before police arrived and no clashes were reported.

David warned "hooligans" who continued to make trouble ran the risk of being shot.

The border was closed after discovery of 30 Chinese workers' bodies in the mainland factory village of Tsun Wan. They were killed in a battle between Communist and anti-Red factions.

Police halted all but official travel at Lowu, frontier crossing point 25 miles from Kowloon.

Eighty of the 165 persons arrested during the rioting were brought into court and charged with rioting and unlawful assembly.

RED REACTION

In the first official Red reaction to the Nationalist rioting, the Peiping Peoples Daily said the Communists were watching "the situation closely" to determine whether Hong Kong security forces were able to protect the colony's Chinese residents.

The paper, which speaks for Red China's government, accused the British of failing to "take effective and timely steps to hold the rioting in check."

On Formosa, Nationalist Vice Premier Huang Shao-ku praised the "heroic patriots who protected their national flag" and blamed Chinese Communists for "exploiting the situation for their own purposes."

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THAT'S RIGHT, YOU CAN START blowing the rust out of the bird hunting musket with the opening of duck season at 5:47 o'clock tomorrow morning. The California and Oregon seasons are running concurrently this year with steady firing anticipated on both sides of the state line. For ducks the limit is six birds daily and twelve in possession, with an additional three birds a day allowed if they are pintails or wildgeese. For geese the limit will be six birds daily or in possession. Only three of the birds may be of the dark species. The non split season will be from October 13 to December 31.

SP Daylight Cuts Ousted

Tom McCarry, district freight and passenger agent for the Southern Pacific Company, announced Friday that plans for reducing the streamliner Shasta Daylight service between Portland, San Francisco via Klamath Falls to three trips per week have been abandoned.

McCarry said he was notified by the Southern Pacific general office in San Francisco that the Daylights will continue to run both north and south daily until further notice.

Since it was announced the train service would be curtailed, the Southern Pacific has received protests both in Oregon and California.

Wednesday, Mrs. Josephine Kitzredge, Republican candidate for state representative, wired the Oregon Public Utilities Commission urging action to force the railroad to continue daily service on the Daylights.

Missing Deer Hunter Found

BEND (AP) — A deer hunter from Sutherlin, reported missing in the Juniper Springs area southeast of Prineville, was found safe at midday Thursday, the state police office here reported Friday.

The hunter, Fred (Jack) Frost, was found by a search party headed by Forest Service employees from the Ochoco ranger station. Frost became separated Wednesday from an unidentified hunting companion, who reported him missing.

Firemen Probe Plant Blaze

Suburban firemen said Friday morning that investigation of the Wednesday fire which destroyed the Enterprise Irrigation District Pumping station indicated that the fire began in the office of the building. Firemen added that they have as yet been unable to determine the cause.

The station, located about six miles southwest of Klamath Falls, was inactive at the time, having discontinued for the year the service to water users of the district. The plant was built in 1938 at a cost of \$65,000.

Weed Radio Station Set

A new radio station is planned for Weed, California, by C. E. Wilson and Philip D. Jackson, operators of KJAD here. They operate as a partnership under the name Independent Broadcasters, Medford, Oregon, where they own station KBOY.

Application has been made to the Federal Communications Commission for an 800-kilocycle, 1 kilowatt daytime station at Weed.

Their brothers, who are associated with the KJAD operation in Klamath Falls, James O. Wilson Jr. and Jim T. Jackson, have formed a partnership known as Grants Pass Broadcasting Company. Under that name they have made application to the FCC for a new radio station at Grants Pass on 1270 kilocycles, 1 kilowatt, daytime.

Both of the new stations contemplated will feature news and music.

Missing Aviator Lands Safely

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — A Portland, Ore., flier reported overdue between Billings, Mont., and North-east Oregon landed safely Thursday night at Baker, Ore., the state Board of Aeronautics reported Friday.

The aeronautics office said Alvin F. Oien, flying alone in a single-engine Fairchild, did not report his landing to the Civil Aeronautics Administration. Not until Friday morning, when Oien took off to continue his flight to Portland, did authorities learn he was safe.

Authorities called off an air search which had started in Southwestern Montana, where stormy weather kept all but a few search planes on the ground.

Chiloquin, Gilchrist Set Pace In UF-RC Campaign

"Chiloquin and Gilchrist have set the pace for county communities in the United Fund-Red Cross campaign," Noel Flynn, campaign chairman, said Friday. He added that Chiloquin was one of the two county communities which reached their goals last year.

As the united drive passed the halfway mark following the Thursday noon report meeting, Flynn said the greatest response from the county division had come from Oren Sample, Gilchrist community chairman, and the Rev. David Schneider, chairman in the Chiloquin area which includes Klamath Agency, Modoc Point and Sprague River.

Gilchrist reported \$1,200 which included the Gilchrist Lumber Company's firm gift and a partial employee report. Chiloquin has turned in a total of \$839.99.

Other county communities which have responded thus far to the united appeal for 27 youth health and welfare agencies are Malin with \$251 and Chemult with \$50. Flynn said reports from the residential division were starting to come in, with a preliminary report of \$123 from Mrs. Paul Campbell, Mrs. Robert Thompson, Mrs. Irvin Beck, Mrs. John A. Vaughn, Mrs. Bruce Binkley and Mrs. G. W. Hinman.

Gigantic Hunt Fails To Locate Airship

LONDON (AP) — Distress signals spurred a gigantic search today for a U.S. transport plane missing with 59 servicemen aboard. There was not a hint of success.

At least 30 planes from bases in a half dozen countries—including giant six-engine U.S. Stratofort bombers—an aircraft carrier and destroyers scoured the area north of the Azores in an effort to pin down the source of the messages.

But back to base came these reports from the searchers: "No luck. Nothing sighted."

The missing plane, a C118 Liftmaster of the U.S. Military Air Transport Service, was due at Lajes Air Base on the Azores, Thursday morning. It carried 50 Air Force personnel returning to the United States from duty in Britain and a Navy flight crew of nine.

LONG SILENCE

After a long silence a string of SOS signals was picked up by commercial airliners flying early Friday between Britain and New York. Belief was expressed the distress calls might be coming from portable transmitters on

rubber life rafts carried by the missing aircraft.

But in New York, three transatlantic pilots who heard the distress signals said they were later informed the calls came from land stations sending out alerts about the plane.

Still another Pan American pilot reaching New York, however, said he picked up a signal which he believed came from "an original source" while his plane was 300 to 255 miles northwest of the Azores.

The Air Force estimated the signals were coming from a point approximately 150 miles north of the Azores.

VANISHED WEDNESDAY

The transport vanished Wednesday night on a flight from the air base at Lakenheath, England, to the Azores, en route to the United States. Aboard were 50 Air Force men returning to their Lincoln, Neb., base and the transport's crew of nine Navy men.

The position from which it was estimated the SOS signals came was more than 600 miles beyond the missing plane's last position report. But an Air Force spokesman said the aircraft could have lost radio contact with the ocean control tower at Shannon Airport in Ireland and flown on toward its destination before going down.

"We would be surprised to find it too close to the Azores, but it's possible," the spokesman added. The Liftmaster carried four life rafts, each equipped with a portable transmitter and having room for 20 men.

STANDARD SIGNALS

The Air Force spokesman described the SOS's as "standard distress signals."

"They weren't signed and we don't know whether they came from the missing aircraft or not," he said, "but we're going to search that part of the Atlantic so thoroughly a fly couldn't hide in it."

A previous SOS, heard by search planes yesterday, turned out to be a garbled version of a message between ocean freighters discussing the search.

OCTOBER BID CALLS

The October bid calls are on constructing Howard Prairie Dam, an 88-foot-high, 900-foot-long earth and rockfill dam 27 miles east of Ashland, for which 750 days will be allowed for construction; 10.3 miles of open canal, 2.3 miles of concrete flume, 7.5 miles of concrete lined canal and a half-mile of 48-inch concrete siphon, along with a small diversion dam 15 miles east of Ashland in the Howard Prairie and Soda Creek sections of the Rogue project; and building 10 miles of road at Haystack Reservoir near Culver in the Deschutes project.

The work now planned for next year, with the expected month of bid call:

Green Springs power plant and switchboard including a 125,000-horsepower turbine and 16,840-kva generator; switchyard; 40-inch diameter steel penstock 9,600 feet long; 2.6 miles of 6-foot, 1-inch concrete buried conduit; in April.

Keene Creek Dam 16 miles east of Ashland, 63 feet high, 550 feet long; in April.

Ashland lateral diversion dam on Emigrant Creek, four miles southeast of Klamath Junction; in May.

CASCADE TUNNEL

Cascade Divide tunnel, 6-foot diameter, 1,550 feet long; in June.

Howard Prairie delivery canal, 8.5 miles of concrete-lined canal with siphons and road crossings; in June.

Bear Creek siphon on Talent lateral, 1,640 feet long; in June.

Lateral rehabilitation between Medford and Ashland, about 24 miles; in June.

Deschutes project office and warehouse building at Madras, in April.
