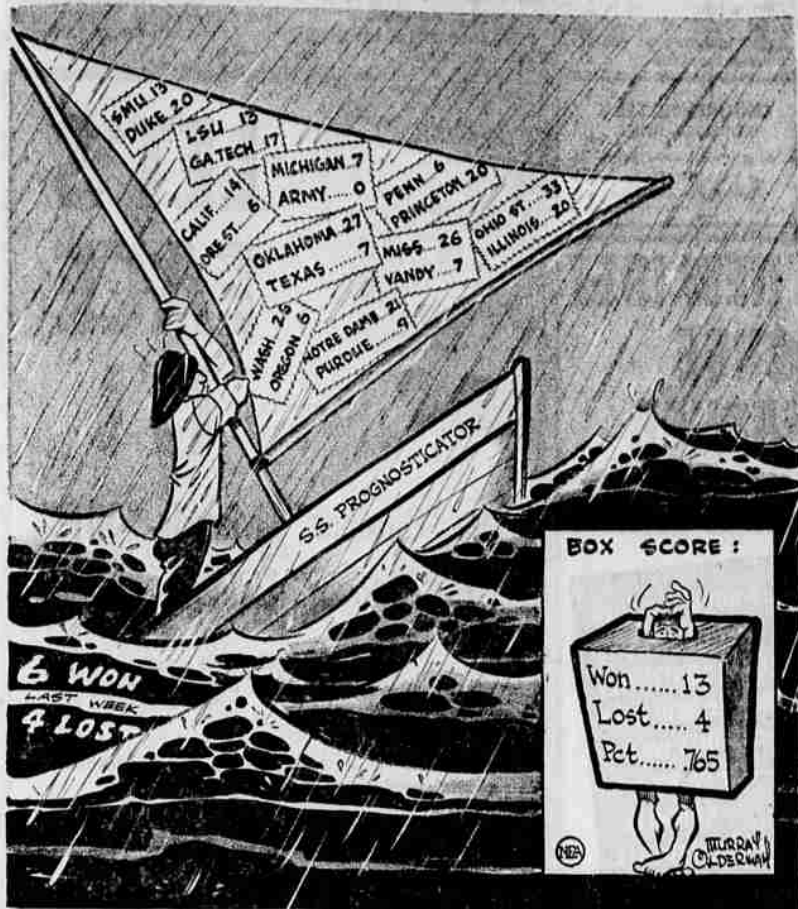

Giants Sell Vet Pitcher

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Giants, who have promised their followers a new look next season, have started by selling a veteran pitcher to the Philadelphia Phillies and purchasing two promising farm hands from Minneapolis of the American Assn.

Jim Hearn, 33-year-old right-hander who had a 5-11 record last season, was sold to the Phillies. In a companion deal the Minneapolis-Millers purchased the contract of Stu Miller, another right-handed pitcher with a 4-0 mark from the Phillies.

In the deal with the Millers, the Giants obtained outfielder Willie Kirkland and right-handed pitcher Curt Barclay. Kirkland, 22, hit .293 and drove in 129 runs while collecting 35 doubles, 12 triples, and 37 home runs for the Millers. Barclay, 25, finished with a 15-11 record.

Newcombe Eyed By W. O'Malley

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Newsweek asked president Walter O'Malley Thursday if he is going to keep his eyes peeled for any promising players when he takes some of his Brooklyn Dodgers on a baseball tour of Japan.

"One promising player I'm going to look at is named Don Newcombe," O'Malley said. "He borrowed \$100 from me the minute he got on the plane yesterday and promised to pay it back."

O'Malley said the big 27-game winner, who was "lost" for a time after being taken out of the final World Series game against the New York Yankees, boarded the plane in New York with no baggage.

Newcombe's wife was due here Friday with his luggage before the Dodgers leave by air for the Orient.

Cus D'Amato OKs Chicago

NEW YORK (UP) — Stubborn Cus D'Amato, manager of young Floyd Patterson, finally relented today and said he would approve Chicago Stadium as the site for Patterson's proposed heavyweight title fight with Archie Moore, Nov. 30, "if certain assurances are given me about Chicago."

Accordingly, Jim Norris may match 21-year-old Patterson of Brooklyn and 39-year-old Moore of San Diego on Monday to fight for the vacant heavyweight crown. D'Amato, who has been steadfastly rejecting Chicago as the battle site, did not explain what "assurances" he wanted about the Windy City. One guess is that he wants ring officials from other states to work the fight; or he may want the right to veto certain Illinois officials.

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Oregon, Oregon State To Meet PC Conference Foes Saturday

West Coast gridgers, most of them toughened in intersectional battle, move against each other Saturday in three Pacific Coast Conference games.

Washington clashes with Oregon in Seattle and Washington State invades Los Angeles to meet UCLA. California, a surprise 14-0 victor over highly rated Pittsburgh last week, takes on Oregon State at Corvallis.

John Brodie and other Stanford Bruins lost 42-13 to Michigan and won 13-7 from Utah.

Four California first-stringers will be sidelined at Corvallis. Quarterback Gus Gianullias, ends Ron Wheatcroft and Roger Ramseier and halfback John Stewart are out with injuries. The Bears will have a weight advantage in the line against Oregon State.

OSC lost 14-13 to Iowa last week, but defeated Missouri 19-13. USC beat Oregon State 21-13.

Brodie, the nation's No. 1 college thrower, has only one of Stanford's four top ends to throw to against San Jose State—Carl Isaacs. Gary Van Galder, Jerry Beattie and Joel Freis are out with injuries.

Shore Recalls Mad Babe

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C. (UP)—

Ernie Shore, one of the seven men ever to pitch a perfect major league game, related today how Babe Ruth's temper tantrum gave him a chance to make baseball history.

Shore, now a sheriff around Winston-Salem, watched on television last Monday when Don Larsen of the Yankees turned in his pitching masterpiece in the World Series.

Shore recalled that his day was hot and cloudless with a fierce sun. It was June 22, 1917 in Boston's Fenway Park.

Babe Ruth took the mound and walked the first batter, second baseman Ray Morgan.

"Ruth didn't like the call one bit," Ernie said. "And the Babe, he could argue. Well, the ump chased him and I was called in."

"I didn't even get a chance to warm up. They only gave you five pitches in those days to loosen up and that's all I threw before the first man was in there ready."

"On my first pitch Morgan lit out for second and (catcher) Sam Agnew threw him out easily. They thought I wouldn't get any stuff on the ball until I warmed up," Ernie said.

"I warmed up between the first and second innings."

"It was really hot out there," Ernie went on. "No clouds in the sky... just like when Larsen was pitching, only hotter. I didn't even know I had a no-hitter going until the ninth inning."

"Then somebody on the bench opened his mouth and said nobody had reached first base. But I wasn't scared a bit. No sir! The only good ball they hit off me that day was John Henry's liner for the second out in the ninth. He hit it right at left fielder Dutchy Lewis. The last man, he drug one and tried to beat it out and we got 'em," Shore said.

Boston won, 4-0.

"They didn't give me credit for a perfect game. Just a no-hitter at first. I guess it was 10-15 years later that the Baseball Writers Association got it in the record as a perfect game. I don't know why they changed it except I did retire 27 men in a row," said Ernie.

"I regret now that I didn't start that day. I had a good fast ball, and when it was real good it would sink. The Senators were topping the ball all over the place to the infield. Henry's was the only solid one they hit. Why, I had six assists and two put outs. I only struck out two," the sheriff related. "There wasn't a close play all day."

Wes Santee Case Again In Spotlight

NEW YORK (UP) — The Wes Santee case had more repercussions today with the announcement of several Santee-inspired rules changes that will be submitted to the National AAU approval at the group's annual convention in Los Angeles, Oct. 30-Nov. 2.

As a result of matters that came up during the barring of Santee, fastest American miler in history, on charges of accepting "excessive" expense money, a special rules committee has come up with suggestions about expense money and tighter supervision of promoters.

Also among the 43 rules proposals is one stemming from an incident at a college All-Star game in New York's Madison Square Garden, regarding a dispute over just "when" an amateur athlete becomes a pro.

When Santee lost his amateur status, widespread criticism was heard that the present AAU rule limiting an athlete to \$15 per day expenses in addition to transportation was "too low."

The rules proposal committee, headed by New York attorney Pincus Sober—who also headed the committee that investigated Santee, has called for a slight easing of that limit.

The new rule would permit a "supplemental allowance up to \$3 per day if necessary," but the athlete would have to prove necessity by submitting transportation vouchers and hotel bills.

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Three men and an alternate will be chosen.

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Miller Cops Lead

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—Army Spcl. 3. C. Robert K. Miller of Seattle, Wash., took over the lead Thursday in the field of 19 men seeking spots on the U.S. modern pentathlon team for the 1956 Olympics.

Miller fired a near perfect record in shooting, the fourth of five events in the pentathlon. The final event, cross country riding over a 5,000 meter course, was scheduled for Friday.

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Idaho Coach Skip Stahley, looking for the first win, suffered another disappointment yesterday when senior fullback Warren Hawley broke a leg. The squad was reduced to 29.

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
