AF Chief Says Nation Leads In Defense Works

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The chief of the Air Force's electronic defense set-up said Thursday the nation's newest system of continental defense puts the United States far ahead of any other country.

The new Semi-Automatic Ground Environment (SAGE) defense was described by Brig. Gen. Stanley T. Wray, in an address at the San Francisco Presidio Officers' Club.

SAGE, scheduled for construction in the near future, will divide the United States into several sectors and subsectors, Wray said, with each subsector equipped with the "world's fastest and largest digital computers."

These computers, he said, will put "electronic brains" to work in place of men and "will give the United States an air defense system way ahead of anything else in the world."

Almost all possibility of human error will be eliminated through use of the computers, he said.

"Even more important," the general added, "precious minutes will be saved—minutes that otherwise would have been required to interpret radar displays manually, plot them and report to the weapons director."

Wray also commands the Distant Early Warning (DEW) system across Canada, and "White Alice," the Alaska communications system, both manually operated.

In DEW and White Alice, planes are spotted on radar and the information is relayed by telephone to plotters and checked with flight plans.

The system, Wray said, is time-consuming and inadequate to cope with today's "threat of mass raids and the high speed of aircraft."

When SAGE starts operating, he said, "all known flight plans and weather reports will be fed into the computer as soon as they are received, as well as information received from the ground observer corps."

"All of this data is stored... and when a track is fed in from radar, the computer immediately goes to its memory to see if it can identify the track."

If the plane is not identified, the computer alerts the operator and, eventually, guides interceptor planes to the track.

"The key points of advantage in SAGE operation," Wray said, "are centralized control, maximum elimination of human error, and precious minutes of defense time saved through automatic calculations—minutes that could spell the difference between survival or disaster."
