

Oregon Tech, KUHS Away For Pigskin Games

Crucials Set For Preppers

Important games, some involving the top 10 teams in the Associated Press poll, are on tap in Oregon high school football play this weekend.

Marshfield, defending state champion and No. 1 in the poll, will be host to unbeaten, untied Springfield in a class A-1, district 3 contest. Springfield is ranked 5th.

Medford, No. 2, is at home to Klamath Falls for a crucial district 6 game.

Eugene, No. 3 and considered a threat to Marshfield for the district 3 title, will entertain sixth-ranked Albany, a favorite for the district 8 championship.

Beaverton and Gresham, the No. 4 and 5 teams, are expected to remain untied and undefeated in district 3. Beaverton plays at Hillsboro and Gresham at Milwaukie.

Seventh-ranked McMinnville also is expected to preserve a perfect record when it hosts Lake Oswego.

Grants Pass, No. 9, hopes to keep its title hopes in district 6 alive when it entertains Ashland.

Astoria, No. 10 and with a perfect record, goes to Portland for a game with Central Catholic Saturday.

Other important action will send unbeaten, untied Parkrose against David Douglas of Portland in district 3; St. Helens against Oregon City in district 4; North Bend against Roseburg in district 5; Pendleton against The Dalles, La Grande against Milton-Freewater and Baker against Hermiston in district 7; and Sweet Home against Corvallis, Bend against North Salem and South Salem against Lebanon in district 8.

In the Portland city league it will be Jefferson vs. Lincoln, Grant vs. Washington, Cleveland vs. Benson and Franklin vs. Roosevelt.

OTI Boots Starters; Pels In League Fray

The Oregon Tech Owls and Klamath Union Pelicans both departed this morning for football action tonight and Saturday afternoon in their respective conference races, and with the leaving of the Tech squad comes news that athletic director and head football coach Rex Hunsaker expelled four of his first-string ball players on the eve of the trip.

Tonight the Pels meet Medford in a Southern Oregon Conference clash starting at 8:15 on the Medford turf, and the penalty-stricken Owls face Eastern Oregon College Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Mounties homecoming game of the year at La Grande.

Hunsaker announced late Thursday that he had expelled four starters, including both of his tackles and the number one set of halfbacks, which of course will hurt Tech's chances of stopping their OCC rival. Those given the "boot" by Hunsaker were tackles Tom Wylie and Richard Perlick, and halfbacks Tommy Carion and Carl Pastore.

All four of the boys, Pennsylvania high school graduates last spring, were lifted from the team and school for disciplinary reasons and their failure to attend classes, according to Hunsaker. The foursome had been warned about class attendance, and reporting regularly for football practice.

In making the shocking an-

ouncement, Hunsaker said, "the first reason a boy is here at OTI is to get an education, and that means attending classes. If he can't go to classes and get his school work, then he can't play football for me. I regret losing these four boys," the Tech coach added, "but it is something that we will not stand for."

Harry Juul and Al "Little Tiger" Everson will probably replace Pastore and Carion in the halfback slots, while Norm Kollen should fill one of the tackle berths. The second vacated line spot is still open, and promises to be a task for Hunsaker and line coach George Miller to fill with their already "depth-lacking" squad.

This will be the eighth meeting between OTI and EOCE on the gridiron. In past games, Tech holds the edge, 6-1. Last year's 27-6 defeat at the hands of the Mounties was the first time Eastern Oregon was able to outscore the Owls from the Mile High Campus. In 1951, Tech set a conference scoring record by beating the Mountaineers 73-0.

Both teams have the same 2-2 record for the season, but the La Grande collegians are 1-0 for OCC play, while Tech has dropped its only game in conference action. Last week Portland State dumped Tech 39-14, while EOCE was handling Oregon College of Education 20-12.

For John McGinnis' KUHS Pelicans, the spirit is high, and so are the odds that Medford will not fall for the first time this year. While the Pelicans are 2-3 for their pre-league season, Medford has rapped four foes for one-sided victories, and held the defending state champion, Marshfield, to a 20-20 deadlock.

Before leaving this morning, McGinnis reported his club to be in the best mental condition of the season. "If spirit alone would win a ball game, then we'll come home with the biggest upset of the year," the Pel coach said. "We know that Medford has a great club, but our kids will let them know they were in a ball game before this thing is over."

Medford was held to a 13-13 tie last year in a thrilling Modoc Field battle as Butch Kimpton caught a last-second touchdown pass to tie the Tornados, who wore the district crown in 1955. The Pels held the edge in yardage, and Medford is out to prove that the Whitebirds yardage in last year's tie game didn't mean a thing.

Medford's offense will be led by halfbacks Eldon Francis, Gary Riley and Gordon Owsley, a trio of break-away runners with plenty of speed. At fullback, coach Fred Speisberg will have the services of Bob Gee and Loren Christean. Francis has averaged 6.9 yards per carry this year in 51 tries. Christean has a 16.2 average in 15 carries. Riley and Owsley have both averaged over six yards in 27 and 21 carries respectively.

Medford's big line could tell the difference in a game that is expected to be marred by mud and possibly a few showers. The Tornado line will average 186 pounds compared to 175 for the Pels. In the backfield, Medford's foursome will scale in at 182 and KUHS' opening backs will average 157 pounds.

Griffith Has Eyes On Switch

WASHINGTON (AP) — Calvin Griffith said Thursday he would seek to persuade President Will Harridge of the American League to keep an open mind on a possible franchise shift for the Washington Senators.

Harridge said in Chicago the league "could not afford" to call a meeting to consider transfer of the franchise unless there was harmony among Washington officials.

That was a reference to the statement by H. Gabriel Murphy, club treasurer and largest single stockholder, that he opposes any plan to move the Senators out of Washington and will fight it in the courts if necessary.

Murphy owns 40 per cent of the Washington baseball club stock. Members of the family of the late Clark Griffith control 52 per cent. Calvin Griffith, the club president, has said he is seriously weighing a shift to Los Angeles or some other city.

The deadline for any franchise shift to become effective next year is Oct. 31. Harridge said there would be nothing to gain if Griffith asked fellow club owners to take up the matter "unless all stockholders were represented in the request."

"We don't want to get in the same situation we did when a family squabble hampered the transfer of the Philadelphia A's to Kansas City," Harridge said, alluding to the most recent American League shift two years ago.

Griffith said in an interview "this is a different situation" than that which marked the Athletics move, and that he planned to ask Harridge not to foreclose the possibility of a league meeting.

A franchise shift requires favorable votes from six of the eight clubs in the loop.

Griffith said he would be extremely reluctant to leave the capital but felt bound to study offers "which might be advantageous" from Los Angeles, San Francisco, Louisville or other cities. He added that no concrete written plans had been submitted and said that when one is he will call the club's five-man board of directors to consider it.
