Huskies Thump Ambitious Ducks

SEATTLE. — Big Dick Day, 240 pounds of busy tackle, bailed the University of Washington out of trouble with three fumble recoveries today as the Huskies whipped threatening Oregon, 20-7, in a Pacific Coast Conference football game.

Washington rolled to a 13-0 advantage in the first half, then suddenly lost momentum when quarterback Al Ferguson left the field with a dislocated shoulder.

Oregon was knocking at the touchdown gate, completing a 73-yard march, when Ferguson was shelved, and the visiting Webfoots left the field at halftime trailing by only 13-7.

Oregon, the leading defensive team in the circuit up to this game, stopped Washington cold all through the third period but fumbled away its opportunities. The Webfoots also suffered from injury when halfback Jim Shanley was knocked cold early in the third quarter and had to sit out the rest of the game.

A recovery by Day late in the last period at the Oregon 47 finally cranked up Washington's split-T machine for a touchdown. Even that wound up with a fumble. Plunging the last yard, Bobby Herring bobbled the ball but recovered behind the Oregon goal.

The Webfoots outfumbled the Huskies, 7 to 5, losing the ball five of those times to Washington's two.

Washington cruised 59 yards in 7 plays for its first counter, sending elusive Luther (Hit and Run) Carr on a 27-yard payoff canter at the finish.

The second TD was cued by right guard Whitey Core's fumble recovery on the Oregon 32. Nine plays later Dean Derby blasted the final yard to make the score, 13-0.

Oregon's tally came on a 5-yard swing around right end by sub fullback Will Reeve.

Oregon found a line star of its own in second string center Nick Markulis. The 193-pound senior turned in eight tackles for his team and blocked Washington's second conversion attempt. Guard Spike Hillstrom was the tackler for Oregon on seven plays.

This second Coast Conference victory of the season for Washington was definitely a line triumph. Spearheaded by Day, surprisingly agile for his bulk, the big Washington forwards kept the pressure on the Oregon passers.

The crowd of 35,000 was handed a thrill on the game's opening kickoff when Oregon fullback Jack Morris clicked off a 76-yard return. He picked up the bounding ball on the Oregon 10, and his momentary fumble gave his blockers time to blaze him a trail into the open. The speedy fullback, who shades 10 seconds for the 100 in his springtime role as a sprinter, was overhauled by Washington's lanky senior end, Corky Lewis, on the Husky 14.

The Webfoots went seven yards, but on fourth down they committed their first fumble and Day was there to smother it on his own 9. Oregon did not cross the midfield stripe again until it trailed by 13 points.

Lewis turned in 10 tackles during the afternoon and the entire Washington line carried the burden after Ferguson's departure. Despite its bobbles, Oregon out first downed Washington, 17 to 13 and netted 94 yards on 7 complete passes to Washington's 23 on 2.

The Huskies had a 252 to 165 margin in rushing yardage.

Stanford Measures San Jose

PALO ALTO, Calif. — John Brodie, the nation's top college passer, threw 24 passes Saturday and completed 13, two touchdowns, in leading Stanford to a 40-20 victory over hard-fighting San Jose State.

The 192-pound quarterback, although used only sparingly in the second half, boosted his national totals to 61 completions in 102 attempts and seven touchdowns.

Passes by Brodie, John Douglas and Jack Taylor figured heavily in all six Stanford touchdowns.

Bob Reinhardt, the San Jose State quarterback and also ranked high among the nation's college throwers, didn't complete one in 14 attempts in the first half, but connected for six out of nine and one touchdown in the second half.

LINCOLN, Neb. — A tremendous 35-yard field goal expertly booted by sophomore halfback Ben Grosse carried Kansas State to a 10-7 upset over the favored Nebraska Cornhuskers Saturday in a Big Seven Conference football clash before 24,000 fans at Memorial Stadium.

A 30-mile south wind out of leaden skies gave distance to the third quarter kick and helped break a 7-7 deadlock established in the first eight minutes of play.

It marked the first win in four starts this season for the undermanned Kansas State Wildcats.

John Landy May Not Race

Jim Bailey Wins 800 Meter Event

MELBOURNE, Australia (UP)—Jim Bailey, a curly-haired runner who attends the University of Oregon, easily won the 800-meter race Saturday at Australia's Olympic track and field trials, but received a lousy boomer from 15,000 fans who didn't like his tactics.

While en route to his triumph in a lazy one minute, 51.2 seconds, Bailey pulled the same trick he used while upsetting John Landy last May 5 at Los Angeles. He slapped Landy on the rear as he surged past to win a 3:58.6 mile.

Today Bailey whacked Billy Butchart on the posterior as he galloped past him on the first lap. Midway in the second lap, he pulled alongside Don MacMillan, turned and laughed and went on to win easily.

This was the last straw for the normally happy-go-lucky Aussie spectators. One of the largest crowds, ever, to attend a track meet in this country gave Bailey a prolonged boomer as he finished. Meet officials also pounced on the 26-year-old Sydney Runner and gave him a tongue-lashing for his actions.

Bailey laughed when asked what he thought of his reception and said track wasn't regarded so seriously in the United States.

"When I tap someone on the bottom in the United States, the officials regard it as all part of the fun," he said. "They're certainly a bit more serious here. I merely touched Butchart to indicate I wanted to go through."

Arizona Smothers Vandals

MOSCOW, Idaho. — Sophomores Joe Belland and Leon Burton ran all over Idaho today as Arizona State swamped the outclassed Vandals 41-0 in an inter-sectional football game.

The Vandals, plagued by injuries and down to only 29 players, were so inept they crossed the 50-yard line only three times and never got beyond State's 43.

The Sun Devils from Tempe, operating smoothly in nippy 45-degree weather, scored the first two times they got the ball and virtually ran the Vandals out of their own stadium on homecoming day.

Many of the disappointed fans in the crowd of 6,500 started walking out after Burton, a 170-pound halfback from Flint, Mich., ran 56 yards with a handoff early in the fourth quarter to cap a great performance.

It was the longest run of the otherwise dull game which left the Vandals winless after four starts. Arizona State is undefeated after four.

KUHS Frosh Top Lakeview

The KUHS freshmen continued undefeated during the 1956 campaign with a 39-7 win over Lakeview Saturday afternoon. Herrera proved to be the offensive spark for the locals, reeling off three TD's during his afternoon's work. The first was an 80-yard run, with his last two scoring attempts going over from the 25-yard line and the 5-yard mark.

The frosh have two more games remaining in the season. They go against McLoughlin of Medford here October 19, and journey to Medford October 26 to be hosted by Hedrick.

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. — Unbeaten Ohio State, the team which returned the forward pass, scored one touchdown on a pass and another on a fake pass, to launch its Big Ten title defense with a 26-6 victory over error smitten Illinois Saturday.

In grinding to their 14th consecutive conference triumph — one shy of Michigan's league mark — the Buckeyes chewed up their usual ground yardage, but needed an Illini fumble and a pass interception to turn the tide.

Apparently in a high dudgeon, Hayes charged onto the field late in the fourth quarter when the Bucks were penalized 15 yards for illegally getting a kicking tee onto the field. Hayes sent a player in with the tee, but the officials should have been asked for permission first. He had to be led off by the official.

Quarterback Frank Ellwood, who completed two of the passes Ohio State tried, and halfback Jim Roseboro each scored two touchdowns as Ohio State hammered to its third victory of the season.
