

Annexation Request Made

DUNSMUIR — A petition was presented to the Siskiyou County board of supervisors this week signed by four of five persons in one portion of Mount Shasta School district requesting annexation to Dunsmuir School District. County Superintendent of Schools Ed Roberts presented the petition to the board for their decision as to whether or not an election will be held.

The petitions stated that the area in question is only two and one half miles from the Dunsmuir school and over six miles to the Mount Shasta School.

The decision on the annexation was held over by the board members for another week. County Administrator Jess O'Roke was asked to investigate the situation further before next week's board meeting.

In other business the board heard Eric Schoonmaker request that private contractors be given the opportunity to bid on county road work. Road Commissioner Orel Lewis told the board that the county was set up to do most of the work required, but the county does plan to contract several projects set up for next year.

State police said Anne Gray, Yakima, Washington, driver of the other car, was not injured. The Collins family was on a vacation trip.

Seven Hurt In Accident

Seven persons were under treatment at Klamath Valley Hospital Saturday following two automobile accidents.

Donald B. Hodgeman, 31, Paradise, California, was driving an automobile which collided with a Klamath Falls Creamery Company truck on Highway 97, approximately 50 miles north of here.

Hodgeman suffered head injuries and a broken nose. Phillip Barry, 2449 Wantland Avenue, Klamath Falls, driver of the truck, suffered a wrenched neck. George Hendrix, 29, a passenger in Hodgeman's car, sustained a leg injury.

In the second accident, at the junction of highways 230 and 209 near Crater Lake, north entrance, Henry Drayer, 39, of Sutherlin, Oregon, fell asleep at the wheel of his car and crashed into a tree. Drayer and passengers, Leroy Russwurm, 30, Wilbur, Oregon, Leonard Drayer, Sutherlin, and Ellen Ann Drayer, 36, were all injured. Hospital attendants said none was in serious condition.

At Boyett's request, an Ohio National Guard plane flew the children to Little Rock from their home in Lorain and brought them home again. Boyett, divorced from his wife, had not seen the children for seven years.
