

## ISRAEL-JORDAN CLASH LOOMS

A survey just completed by one of the leading professionals of the country shows that as of now politics is the topic of conversation of only 44.7 per cent of the 102 million Americans old enough to vote.

It finds that more persons talk about politics in the West than in any other area of our country and that men talk more about politics than women do.

Note, please, that these pollsters are concerned only with people who TALK about politics. I wish they'd give us a count on the people who THINK CONSTRUCTIVELY about politics.

That would be really interesting.

The head of this survey outfit—his name is Sindlinger and he's presently accepted as one of the toppers in the business—adds that it is STARTLING to see how more and more millions of people start talking politics as the election gets closer.

Heck! There's nothing startling about that. As this is written, another tornado is brewing off to the southeast of Florida. It isn't creating much excitement yet—but as it gets CLOSER everybody in Florida will be talking about it.

Something that is going to happen tomorrow is always more exciting than something that is going to happen week after next.

The teletype today tells about a man named Grusgecki who found a woman's purse on the Pennsylvania Turnpike and drove 100 miles out of his way to deliver it to her in Pittsburgh.

The story labels it as another instance of the brotherhood of man.

Shucks! Let's be realistic about these things. He was probably looking for a little publicity.

He could have MAILED it to her for a few pennies.

I mention this because in these modern days too many people do things for the publicity they get instead of doing what they believe TO BE RIGHT.

The world would be better off if more of us followed the advice of Matthew (VI-3): "When thou doest alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth."

The dispatches tell us this morning that a knotty diplomatic problem may develop in San Francisco if the district attorney decides to file a shoplifting charge against the wife of the Yugoslavian vice-consul Stanislav Juznic.

She was arrested Saturday on a charge of taking merchandise worth slightly more than \$26 from a San Francisco store.

Her case is reminiscent of the Russian ballet dancer who was arrested in London for shoplifting. That one caused quite a flurry in diplomatic circles.

Why are these problems "knotty"? It's quite simple. Diplomats are VISITORS. They are presumed to be friendly visitors.

Suppose you caught a visiting FRIEND, or a member of a visiting friend's family, lifting stuff out of your dresser drawers.

It would pose a knotty problem for you.

CHICAGO (U)—A slippery 15-year-old boy was held today for grand jury action as the admitted ice pick slayer of a 46-year-old woman who resisted a purse snatch.

Police said Kelly Bennett, a Negro fugitive from a state boys reformatory, admitted he stabbed Miss Mildred Hayes, a high school librarian, because she fought and "started to scream."

Also awaiting grand jury action as an accessory was Herbert V. Leak, 15, who Bennett said shared in the \$6.65 he took from the dead woman's purse last Wednesday. Leak also is a Negro.

Leak denied being present when Miss Hayes was attacked in front of her home on the South Side, or getting part of the money.

Police Lt. Harold Enright said the Bennett boy broke down yesterday and confessed he killed Miss Hayes.

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## Indian Hearing Charge Levied

## Coon States Political Bias Motivates KF Senate Meet

Although the national political spotlight will be on the President Eisenhower celebration Thursday in Portland, some of its glare is expected to filter to Klamath Falls, due to a battle over a congressional hearing slated here by

the Senate Indian Affairs Subcommittee.

Senator Richard L. Neuberger, Democrat of Oregon, arranged the hearing to make a one-day survey of the complex Klamath Indian Reservation termination problem which has been puzzling experts for months. Senator James E. Murray, Democrat of Montana, will preside at the session to be held in the circuit courtroom at Klamath County Courthouse.

## SUBTERFUGE

Republican leaders are up in arms over the meeting which Congressman Sam Coon of Baker, who is campaigning in Klamath Falls, charged Monday morning is "merely a subterfuge by Senator Neuberger to obtain a political rostrum."

George Proctor, chairman of the Klamath County Republican Central Committee, wired Senator Murray, chairman of the subcommittee, urging that the hearing be called off immediately.

Proctor charged Neuberger arranged the hearing to "have a platform to express his political bias at taxpayers' expense." Proctor also said "the hearing is just an excuse for Neuberger to bring Democratic senators into Oregon in his frantic attempt to reelect Senator Morse."

Congressman Coon appeared to be extremely riled over the pending Indian parley.

## DOMINATED

"Senator Neuberger held the same kind of a hearing in Washington last year," Coon said. "He dominated the affair. That's probably what will happen in Klamath Falls next Thursday at the courthouse. It probably will be a one-man show with Neuberger in the leading role."

Coon said no one could do anything about the Indian problem in one day.

"It won't mean a thing as far as reaching any conclusions on the Indian Reservation termination problem," he added. "It certainly is a shame that such a vital problem should be used as a basis for a lot of political gain."

In the meantime, The Associated Press reported from Portland that the hearing here has resulted in a number of requests for permission to testify.

## QUOTED

The wire service quoted Neuberger as saying that among the persons desiring to be heard are Rollin Bowles, president of the Oregon Isank Walton League; Dr. DeWitt Safford of the Oregon Council of Churches; and Harvey Wright, state director of Indian affairs.

Neuberger's administrative assistant, John G. Jones, was in Klamath Falls last week and was reported to have received requests from members of the Klamath tribe who want to testify.

## John Flynn's Death Told

LAKEVIEW — John Michael Flynn, 77, a resident of Lake County since 1901, died Sunday morning at his Lakeview home.

He was born February 3, 1879, in County Cork, Ireland, and came to Lake County when he was 21 where he engaged in sheep raising and ranching for several years. In January, 1917, he was married in Lakeview to Dola Garrett who survives.

He was a member of the Elks Lodge and the Presbyterian Church. For 30 years he was a member of the Lakeview police force.

Other survivors are three sons, Mills and Fields Flynn of Lakeview and Noel Flynn of Klamath Falls; seven grandchildren; a brother, Dick Flynn of Tulelake and a brother in Ireland; sisters, Mrs. Christine Sullivan of San Mateo, California; Sister Mary Liguori of Cleveland, Ohio and five sisters in Ireland and England.

Services will be held at 2 p.m. on Tuesday from the Lakeview Presbyterian Church with the Rev. C. Wayne Julier officiating. Interment will be in Sunset Park Cemetery. Ouseley-Osterman Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

## French Party Faces Crisis

LYON, France (U)—Conservative members of France's powerful Radical Socialist party have quit the faction in protest against Premier Pierre Mendes-France's leadership.

As a result, elder statesman Edouard Herriot resigned the party presidency he had held since World War II. Herriot told the party's annual convention he supported Mendes-France but could not continue as head of a divided party.

At Mendes-France's suggestion, the convention left the presidency open in the hope Herriot would reconsider.

Despite the split, both Mendes-France's forces and the dissidents were expected to continue to support Socialist Premier Guy Mollet's government. The Radicals are the Socialists' partners in the coalition Cabinet.

The right-wing walkout was led by Andre Morice, former minister of industry and commerce. This minority complained that Mendes-France was dictatorial in his drive to enforce a uniform, left-of-center policy.

Previously the party has been neither radical nor socialist, but generally middle of the road and embracing members of varying political tendencies.

## SP Lawyer Sees Chance Of Freight Rate Increase

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—A Southern Pacific Railroad attorney said that if the company continued to lose money on its passenger service it was "inevitable" that the losses would be "ultimately reflected in higher freight rates."

Charles W. Burkett told the California Public Utilities Commission hearing on Southern Pacific passenger service which opened here this morning, that "loss on all passenger trains operated by Southern Pacific presently amounts to over \$43 million."

Burkett said "if these passenger losses continue, it is inevitable that they will be ultimately reflected in higher freight rates, which so directly affect the cost of living of all members of the public."

The commission ordered a hearing on adequacy of Southern Pacific's passenger service Oct. 9 after turning down a request by the railroad to reduce its passenger service between San Francisco

and Portland, Ore., from daily service to three trains a week on the Shasta Daylight run.

In opening the hearings, PUC commissioner Mathew J. Dooley said that the commission would "take a look at the overall picture" and determine whether Southern Pacific was providing adequate passenger service.

Also under investigation during the hearings will be requests to curtail service between San Francisco and Los Angeles, Sacramento and Los Angeles, and Sacramento and Gerber. In the latter case, the railroad has asked to eliminate passenger service entirely.

Several labor groups went on record as opposing the railroad's requests. They were the Brotherhoods of Locomotive Engineers, Railway Trainmen, Railway Clerks and Locomotive Firemen and Engineers. The California Farm Bureau, represented by J. J. Duell, told the commission that the federation "was an interested party" in the overall proceedings.

## Aircraft Parts Found By Ship Near England

LONDON (U)—A British tanker reported that it plucked a yellow raft and two aircraft wheels from the Atlantic Monday in the search for a U.S. transport plane missing since Wednesday with 59 men aboard.

U. S. 3rd Air Force headquarters, which made public the report from the tanker Navicella, said

no sign of life was noted in the area.

The raft had American markings, but there was no positive report that it came from the missing C-119. The raft, partly deflated, was found some time after the wheels were spotted, and about eight miles away, the tanker said.

Finding of the wheels spurred flagging hopes among the searchers.

"It gives us new hope that there might be a dinghy or dinghies in the area with survivors," the RAF officer said in Cornwall. "A new search is now being gradually built up around the area in which the wreckage was found."

A U. S. Air Force spokesman in London said he could not confirm the wreckage was from the missing plane, a C-119 Liftmaster.

The debris was picked up by the British tanker Navicella about 370 miles west-southwest of Land's End, the most southwesterly point of Britain.

A high speed Royal Navy launch was dispatched to the tanker to bring in the wreckage.

The U. S. Air Force announced earlier Monday its search for survivors from the Liftmaster would continue indefinitely.

Numerous investigations have been carried out after planes or ships reported picking up distress signals or sighting life rafts, flares, wreckage, dye markers and other objects.

All the reports fizzled out. A gigantic air search, involving more than 100 planes, an aircraft carrier and other Navy ships, was ordered to continue despite the failure to locate any trace of the missing plane or survivors.

Both the congressman and Mrs. Coon will attend a series of coffee hours in Klamath Falls on Wednesday and Thursday.

The congressman plans to leave Klamath Falls next Sunday afternoon for Lakeview. He will campaign there next Monday before driving to Bend.

## GOP Scored By Senator In KF Visit

Senator Albert Gore, Democrat of Tennessee, on a barnstorming political tour of Oregon, delivered a vitriolic blast at the Eisenhower administration here Sunday during which he said the policies of Treasury Secretary George Humphrey are wrecking the economy of the United States.

Gore spoke at a luncheon in the Willard Hotel sponsored by the Klamath County Democratic Central Committee. He said the purpose of his visit was to aid the campaign to reelect Senator Wayne L. Morse.

## POLICIES

"The strong man behind the door of the Eisenhower administration is Secretary Humphrey," he said. "His policies have resulted in a severe economic blow to the lumber industry of the Pacific Northwest."

"Under Humphrey's tight money policy," Gore added, "new housing construction has been slowed to an alarming degree. A young couple, just getting married and starting out in life, and desiring to build a home, according to the FHA, could have gotten a two-bedroom house for \$9,280 four years ago. The payments would have been \$59 for 21 years."

## MONEY POLICY

"Today," he continued, "as a result of Secretary Humphrey's tight money policy, that same house costs \$10,600 with monthly payments of \$69 for 25 years. Anyway, the young couple will know they'll have the house paid for on their silver wedding anniversary."

Gore also said that President Eisenhower is not giving the United States adequate leadership at home or abroad.

"It's worse than the days of President Harding," he said. "The heart of the administration is in Wall Street."

## MORSE PRAISED

The Tennessee also praised Senator Morse for his part in keeping the atomic energy program out of the hands of the big business.

He also said Morse was a dominant figure in the fight for the national highway bill which is designed to bring good roads to every section of the country.

Senator Gore was introduced by Al Ulman, Democratic candidate for congress. Dorothy Lowell, candidate for county clerk, was master of ceremonies. The program was arranged by Eldred Hansen, chairman of the Klamath County Democratic Central Committee.

Democrats from all sections of the Basin attended the luncheon. J. D. McDonald, of Portland, president of the Oregon State Labor Council, was a special guest. All Democratic candidates in Klamath County were introduced.

## Navy Gets Super Sub

GROTON, Conn. (U)—The Navy is getting a submarine which is described as "the quietest of all time" and which has comforts you'd expect only on an aircraft carrier.

It is the USS Darter (also known as SS 576) which the Electric Boat Division of the General Dynamics Corp. is turning over to the Navy in commissioning ceremonies here next Saturday.

Although the Darter is smaller than her World War II ancestor (it's 260 feet long and 1,000 tons), it is faster and a lot roomier insofar as the crew is concerned.

It's quiet, says General Dynamics, because its engine noise is confined to a "sound-isolated" compartment. The convention, diesel-powered engines are operated by remote control from a sound-proof cab or console.

Submerged, the new Darter can be operated by one man because of its airplane or "joy stick" type control. The corporation said that type of control also makes for a comfortable ride as well as for easier diving and maneuverability.

## DERAILMENT

TSU, Japan. (U)—A speeding express train slammed into a derailed student excursion train seven miles south of here Monday night, killing at least 8 persons and injuring about 60. Tsu is 60 miles east of Osaka.

## Use Of Iraqi Troops Poses New Danger

JERUSALEM (U)—Tension gripped the Israeli-Jordan border Monday as a result of reports that 3,000 Iraqi troops were poised on Jordan's eastern frontier ready to move in to support young King Hussein's shaky government.

Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion, in a speech to Parliament, declared his country reserved freedom of action if the Iraqi army enters Jordan. The Israeli Foreign Ministry in a pointed statement obviously aimed at Britain warned against support for any such move.

Israel feared entry of Iraqi troops would pose a danger of attack against her. There was speculation that Israeli troops might mount a counterpush to shove her border back to a straight line between the Sea of Galilee and the Dead Sea, where there is now a big Arab bulge.

## BEN-GURION

The 70-year-old Ben-Gurion renewed the Israeli plea for defensive arms from the United States. At U. N. headquarters in New York, Jordan called for quick discussion by the Security Council of a "most serious" situation along the border. The Council may meet Thursday to discuss the Jordan complaint that recent Israeli reprisal raids, in which a series of Jordan frontier posts have been wiped out with a large loss of life, are a threat to peace.

In London, British Foreign Office spokesman said the government of Prime Minister Eden has advised Israel that the dispatch of Iraqi troops to Jordan would "contribute to stability in a troubled area."

The British are reported to fear that King Hussein's Jordan regime is in danger of collapse from pressures from extreme Arab nationalist elements backed by Egypt. Jordan is holding nationwide elections next Sunday.

The Israeli government has publicly declared its "anxiety and astonishment" at the British position. It called home its ambassadors to London, Washington, Paris and Moscow as the crisis sharpened.

Britain took an increasingly grave view of the situation. The British-Jordan collective defense agreement of 1948 obligates Britain to help the little Arab nation if it is attacked.

## WARNING

Israel sources said Peter Westlake, temporary head of the British diplomatic mission to Israel, delivered a note to the Foreign Ministry warning that Britain would not tolerate any Israeli attempt to interfere with Iraqi troop movements. The sources said Westlake pointedly reminded Israel of the 1948 British-Jordan pact.

Britain also is obligated to defend Israel in case of an Arab attack under the British-French-

American agreement of 1950 guaranteeing Palestine's borders.

Moscow warned Israel against warlike acts against Arab nations. The Soviet government newspaper Izvestia said: "The game with fire the ruling circles of Israel are conducting carries dangerous possibilities — primarily to Israel itself."

## UNREST

The Israeli-Jordan border has been the scene of increasing raids and counterattacks since early September. Israeli forces have killed nearly 150 Jordanians in retaliatory attacks following charges that persons from Jordan had killed Israelis.

Israeli-Arab skirmishes shifted to another front yesterday. An Israeli patrol was reported to have killed two Egyptian guerrillas and captured two others in the Sdeh Boker area of the central Negev Desert. An Israeli spokesman said the prisoners told of being sent into Israel with grenades and sub-machineguns by Egyptian intelligence officers.

## New Suez Conference Planned

UNITED NATIONS (U)—U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld today prepared to make a new effort to bring Britain, France and Egypt to agreement in the Suez Canal dispute.

The task of mediation was kicked back to the secretary general after Security Council endorsement of six principles for a settlement — worked out in private talks with Hammarskjöld last week — and a Soviet veto of a British-French demand for international operation of the waterway.

A French spokesman said it had not yet been settled when the mediation talks with Hammarskjöld would be held.

U.S. Secretary of State Dulles, before his return to Washington, conferred with British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd early yesterday. A British spokesman said it was possible Dulles and Lloyd discussed the 15-nation Suez Canal Users' Assn. (SCUA), which Britain is anxious to get operating.

The New York Times reported that Lloyd asked the United States to join in getting SCUA operating this week, without waiting for completion of organizational details. The British reportedly want SCUA to start collecting the canal tolls for the ships of the 15 nations, and to withhold any portion from Egypt unless the Egyptians "cooperate" with SCUA.

Dulles, according to the Times, promised to answer Lloyd's request through diplomatic channels.

The Times said British circles reported Britain should use force to assure passage through the canal if Egypt stopped a British ship after the association began operating.

The six principles, agreed on by Lloyd, French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau and Egyptian Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzi in their talks with Hammarskjöld last week, were unanimously endorsed by the Security Council as requirements "that any settlement of the Suez question should meet."

These are the six:

- (1) Passage through the canal should be free, open and without discrimination;
- (2) Egypt's sovereignty should be respected;
- (3) "operation of the canal should be insulated from the politics of any country;"
- (4) tolls should be fixed by agreement between Egypt and the users;
- (5) a fair part of the tolls should go for canal improvements; and
- (6) arbitration should settle disputes between Egypt and the management of the Suez Canal Co., which operated the canal before Egyptian President Nasser took it over July 26.

## Lost Hunter Found Safe

Klamath Falls state police received word early Monday morning that Adolph Quesey, 17-year-old hunter reported lost in the area southwest of Klamath Falls last Saturday, has been found in good condition. Police received the call from William Moore, the person with whom the Rogue River youth was hunting at the time they became separated when hunting along the Klamath River about 25 miles below Klamath Falls.

Quesey was found on the Ward Road of the Ward Ranch, in the immediate vicinity of the area where he was reported lost.

Scores of men searched the area throughout Sunday. Units taking part in the hunt were the Klamath Air Search and Rescue Unit, the Klamath County sheriff's force, the state police, and a large number of volunteers.
