

Yank Win Old Stuff For Fans

NEW YORK (UP) — One of the strangest results of the World Series is the almost national feeling of resentment against the New York Yankees for being such perennial winners.

"I'm tired of seeing these Yankees win," goes the typical remark. "It's downright monotonous and I'd like to see it spread around a bit."

It is a feeling which, instead, should be directed at the constant also-rans.

In all fairness to the Yankees, and at the risk of appearing a local partisan, their success is well-earned and justly due. Their secret is balance in building plans and a refusal to stand pat.

Other clubs, such as the Boston Red Sox, have spent more money in trying to build a dynasty. They were simply dollar foolish.

STAND PAT
Still others, such as the Cleveland Indians, have foolishly stood pat on a winning hand which never matured — and never figured to pay off consistently.

Look at the way the Yankees operate and you get the answer. When they made their last managerial change, they were ridiculed for bringing in "clownish" Casey Stengel from the Coast League. He has only won six world championships and seven pennants in eight years.

Too many clubs take on managers who have been fired by another dissatisfied club. Too seldom do you see a new managerial face come up from the minors when it has been proved, by such as Eddie Dyer and Walt Alton, that there is plenty of eager talent out there in the "bushes" instead of using tired, shopworn major league masterminds.

It was heartening to see the Chicago Cubs, after the worst finish in their history, clean house by accepting the "resignations" of Messrs. Jim Gallagher, Wild Matthews and Stan Hack. Not that there is any personal animosity or adverse feeling in this corner for those gentlemen named.

It's simply that, if baseball is ever going to catch up to the Yankees, it's going to have to get rid of the guys who have found a leisurely berth with a fat paycheck.

PROGRESSIVENESS
Knock the Yankees all you desire, but you also have to admire their progressiveness. You can count on one hand the men they have today who were there or even in the system when Stengel arrived.

Stengel was asked during the Series what he would have done if Johnny Kucks and Tom Sturdivant hadn't come up this season.

"Why," he said, "We'd have come up with two other pitchers."

Sugar Hart, Dennis Open Boxing Week

Garnett (Sugar) Hart of Philadelphia and Earl Dennis of New York, a couple of young, eager welterweights who have waited that the stars won't fight them, collide Monday night at New York's St. Nicholas Arena.

Hart, a solid swinging 21-year-old with a record of 14 knockouts in 17 pro fights, is an 8-5 favorite over the dangerous 24-year-old Dennis. Sugar's complete record is 16-1, the loss coming on a one-round knockout by one Fred Terry. Since then Hart has won eight straight.

Dennis has a mediocre 30-13-5 record, including 11 kayos, but he has won 20 of his last 23 scraps.

Hart's manager, Marty Stein of Philadelphia, had to guarantee he would sell \$10,000 worth of tickets to get his big opportunity. So far he has sold more than \$1,500.

Cuba's Ike Logar, one of the welterweight contenders Hart and Dennis would like to meet, faces Gaspar (India) Ortega, a free-swinging, tall Mexican youngster in the Wednesday night feature at Boston's Mechanics Building. The 23-year-old Logar, winner of nine straight including six this year, is favored to make it 10-0 straight. His record is 45-5-3. Ortega's record is 34-7.

Vince Martinez, the No. 6 welterweight contender from Paterson, N.J., also sees action Monday night. Handsome Vince, idle since he was beaten by Tony De Marco last June, opposes Rinzin Nocero at Providence, R.I.

Joey Giambra, another handsome gladiator with title ambitions, guns for his fifth straight victory Friday night at New York's Madison Square Garden. The 25-year-old Buffalo, N.Y., middleweight, tenth-ranking contender, takes on fast-punching, aggressive Gil Turner of Philadelphia. Giambra's record is 45-4-1. Turner's 50-13-1.

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Detroit Tumbles LA Rams

"There'll Be Some Changes Made" might well be the National Football League's theme song this year, played to the accompaniment of clicking turnstiles.

Nearly a quarter-million fans turned out to see yesterday's play, in which last year's conference titlists, Los Angeles in the Western and Cleveland in the Eastern, lost to teams they used to handle easily.

A throng of 60,042 saw the Browns' succumb to a New York Giants' team for the first time since 1932. The score was 21-9. The once-awesome Cleveland offense could manage only 40 yards rushing and 104 passing. And 56, 281 saw Los Angeles provide last year's cellar-dwelling Detroit with its third victory, 24-21, as many as the Lions won all last year.

Only the Chicago Bears, living up to their rave notice, provided a touch of sanity, rolling almost at will through the San Francisco 49ers, for 397 ground yards, 98 air yards, 22 first downs and a 31-7 victory. A capacity crowd of 49,714 sat in on this one.

In other games, the upstart Chicago Cardinals retained their spotless record with their third straight victory, 31-3 over Washington, before 25,794. Philadelphia rode with Bobby Thomson's aerial circus for a 35-21 decision over Pittsburgh before 31,375.

Green Bay's Packers used veteran quarterback Tobin Rote's two touchdown passes and two scoring plunges for a 38-33 verdict over Baltimore. A near-capacity crowd of 24,214 braved a second-half drizzle to see Green Bay notch its first victory.

Wineburg In TC Spotlight For 1st Time

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UP) — For two years Ken Wineburg played in the shadow of a lot of guys on the Texas Christian football team. He was second string to Ray Taylor at halfback and Taylor, of course, played in the shadow of All-American Jim Swink.

This year they're all playing in the shadow of Ken Wineburg. Swink among them. Ken leads TCU along the unbeaten path with running reminiscent of that of Swink at this stage of the race last season.

Through three games he leads the Southwest Conference in scoring and ball carrying. He has made 42 points and has romped to 364 yards with an average of 10.4 per carry. He has passed for 54 yards, caught a half-dozen passes and punted 6 times for an average of 26.2. Coach Abe Martin is a trifle disappointed in the latter but is confident Wineburg will straighten that out.

Martin explains Wineburg's progress like this:
"He was a second stringer for two straight years and when he got the chance to be first string took advantage of it. He has great speed, is willing to try hard and he's sure doing a good job for us."

At the same time Martin expressed confidence that Swink, who has been only an average runner thus far, would reach his 1955 stature. "Maybe the boy's trying too hard," commented the coach. "He's trying too hard to live up to what he feels is expected of him. But he'll be all right. Anyway, he's been very valuable to us as a pass receiver and as a threat for the opposition to concentrate on."

Nashua Closes Turf Career With Victory

NEW YORK (UP) — Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons says farewell to his beloved Nashua today, the sadness of parting tempered with the knowledge that he has in the 2-year-old Bold Ruler a horse that may well emulate the performances of the millionaire thoroughbred.

Nashua entrains for Lexington, Ky., and stud duty today after winning the Jockey Club Gold Cup at Belmont Park — the race that the 82-year-old trainer wanted "most of all to win."

The 4-year-old son of Nasrullah, for whom a syndicate headed by Leslie Combs II paid \$1,251,200, closed out his racing career with a record of 22 victories in 30 starts and world record earnings of \$1,288,565. Six of his triumphs and earnings of \$343,150 came in 10 outings for the syndicate.

"Yes, I really wanted to win that one," said Mr. Fitz in talking of Nashua's record-shattering performance of 3:20.4 in the two miles of the Gold Cup. "I told Eddie (Arcaro) to take him out on the front end and let the others catch him. I figured the distance was just as tough for the others as my horse."

And then the conversation shifted to Bold Ruler, also a son of Nasrullah, who climaxed quite a day for Mr. Fitz and Arcaro by winning the Belmont Futurity for his seventh triumph in eight starts.

"Is Bold Ruler as good at this stage of his career as Nashua was as a 2-year-old?" the genial trainer was asked.

"It's mighty hard to compare horses," said Sunny Jim, "but Bold Ruler has met the best and beat them. He's lost only one race and Nashua lost more than that."

For the records, Nashua had a 2-year-old record of six victories and two seconds in eight trips to the post.

Louisiana Segregates 'All' Sports

NEW ORLEANS (UP) — Louisiana Monday segregated all sports. It will be illegal for white and Negro amateur or professional players to compete in the same "athletic training, games, sports or contests." Spectators also must be segregated. The maximum punishment is a \$1,000 fine and one year imprisonment.

Although the law passed in the regular May session of the Legislature did not take effect until Monday, its provisions have been felt for weeks.

Soon after Gov. Earl Long signed the bill July 17, some colleges began cancelling their commitments to appear in Louisiana. Some withdrew because of Negroes on their squads. Others said they were withdrawing on grounds of principle.

The University of Wisconsin was the first to act. It ended its 1957-58 home-and-home agreement for football games with Louisiana State University at Baton Rouge.

Seven schools called off basketball games set for next season. Notre Dame, Dayton and St. Louis quit the Sugar Bowl tourney. The Sugar Bowl substituted Alabama, Houston and Virginia Tech to play with Kentucky, only team remaining of the original four invited.

Santa Clara dropped out of the Louisiana Invitational Tournament at Shreveport and was replaced by Virginia Military Institute. Loyola of New Orleans lost Harvard, Marquette and American University from its basketball schedule.

Boxing previously was the only sport previously segregated throughout the state. That ban was applied through a rule of the Louisiana State Athletic Assn. The new state law goes further: it will prohibit white boxers from working out with Negro boxers in gyms, a not uncommon practice here.

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Oklahoma Batters Texans; Michigan State Triumphs

It's getting to the point where perhaps the only question about Oklahoma's football powerhouse is whether the Sooners can get through the season unscathed upon.

Coach Bud Wilkinson's national champs, with the remaining schedule giving little evidence they'll be unlocked, now have rolled over three 1956 foes with their goal line still virgin territory.

They snubbed North Carolina 36-0, humiliated Kansas State 66-0. Then they made themselves at home on the range with a 43-0 decision over Texas last weekend.

This week it's Kansas. The Jayhawkers, who have beaten only Iowa State in four games to date, figure to give the Sooners a modern record of 34 consecutive victories.

After Kansas all that stands between Oklahoma and another perfect season is Notre Dame, Colorado, Iowa State, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma A&M and Indiana.

ONLY NAME
Notre Dame, only a name for a change, may prove a stumbling block. After a 28-14 thrashing by Purdue for a 1-2 record, the Irish now hold only the uncertain hope of upsetting one of the big guys. And if an upset is to be Notre Dame's claim to fame it almost has to come this weekend against Michigan State.

Michigan State, hard on Oklahoma's heels for the national title, took a 53-6 Hoosier Holiday against Indiana — leaving MSU atop the Big Ten with also unbeaten Ohio State (26-0 over Illinois) and Iowa (13-7 over Wisconsin). Iowa may make it to the Rose Bowl what with Michigan State ineligible to return and Ohio State on probation.

NATIONAL HONORS
In the race for national honors, Georgia Tech, Texas Christian and long-absent Tennessee are ready to move in should either Oklahoma, Michigan State or Ohio State falter. All six are 3-0.

And on the fringe, there's Mississippi (4-0), already primed for a Southeastern Conference battle with Tech and Tennessee; Southern Cal (3-0) and perhaps Michigan (2-1). Michigan, beaten only by Michigan State, made an impressive comeback with a 48-14 crusher against once proud and potent Army.

E. Singleton Sold To Redlegs

SEATTLE (UP) — Elmer Singleton, who had the lowest earned run average in the Pacific Coast League last season with a figure of 2.35, was sold by the Seattle Rainiers Sunday to the Cincinnati Redlegs.

Singleton won 18 and lost eight for the Reds during the 1956 campaign.

Dewey Soriano, Seattle general manager, said the Rainiers got cash and options on two Cincinnati players from the Redlegs for Singleton. The cash terms were not announced.

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
