Ike And Stevenson Press Campaign Issues In Talks

Democrat Adlai Stevenson takes to the airwaves tonight to press his proposal for a halt to hydrogen bomb tests, while President Eisenhower prepared for a flying, four-day campaign trip to the West Coast and back.

Stevenson scheduled a nationwide radio-TV defense of his hotly debated suggestion that the United States take the lead in halting H-bomb tests—a suggestion Eisenhower has called a "theatrical national gesture."

Eisenhower steps up his own presidential campaign this week with speeches—either recorded or in person—five days in a row, starting tonight with two filmed five-minute talks.

Eisenhower leaves tomorrow for the Pacific Northwest, with stops en route in Minnesota and on the way back in Colorado—his longest campaign foray since the fight for votes began.

Aides said Stevenson will continue to make Vice President Nixon a "prime issue."

Nixon's own campaign schedule put him in Ohio today, while his Democratic opponent, Sen. Estes Kefauver, hit Vermont, New York City and Long Island.

In remarks prepared for a delivery in Burlington, Vt., today, Kefauver launched his strongest attack to date against Nixon, saying the vice president "is trying to get into the White House on false premises, a false front and a false face."

Kefauver said Nixon is a "man who has voted against everything liberal" and "would inevitably become the center of power" if Republicans win because the Constitution bars Eisenhower from seeking a third term.

The Tennessee said Nixon won election to both the House and Senate on "false premises" by trying to identify his opponents with the Communist party.

The controversy over Stevenson's H-bomb proposals continued to rage over the weekend. His suggestion that the military draft might be ended in the foreseeable future, when national security permits, also drew replies from administration spokesmen.

Nixon speaking in Alexandria, Minn., accused Stevenson of "playing politics with America's national security on the draft issue."

Then, referring also to the H-bomb proposal, he said Stevenson "could not have made two statements... which would have been more harmful in discouraging our allies or in encouraging our potential enemies."

Secretary of Defense Wilson said "it isn't feasible" for this nation to stop the tests without an ironclad agreement with other nations.

Harold Stassen, Eisenhower's disarmament aide, said Stevenson "has been misinformed and misled and (is) thus mistaken" on the H-bomb issue.

Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.), appearing in the same television session with Stassen, said he thought the tests are a proper campaign issue. Sparkman also defended Stevenson's position on the draft, saying:

"Gov. Stevenson did not propose the immediate discontinuance of the draft. He said we ought to study other programs to make it possible to end the peacetime draft. I see no reason why everyone could not agree to that."

Ten nuclear scientists from the California Institute of Technology issued a joint statement yesterday supporting Stevenson's stand on the H-bomb and calling for "free and open discussion" of such proposals.

Nixon, at midpoint in his current 10,000-mile campaign tour, said in Dayton, Ohio, he is confident the Republican ticket will sweep the farm belt.

Kefauver said in Nashville, Tenn., he is "very satisfied" after 27,000 miles of campaigning that enough independent voters are swinging toward the Democrats to make a Democratic victory Nov. 6 a certainty.

In Washington, former New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey said Nixon would be handicapped as a vice president, rather than helped, in realizing any presidential ambitions.

President Announces Plans For Oregon Campaign Tour

President Eisenhower will be accompanied by Mrs. Eisenhower on his visit in Portland Thursday on his national committee tour.

Robert T. Mautz reported after conferring with the White House staff.

The President will give a brief talk at the airport shortly after his arrival at 2:05 p.m. At 2:50 p.m., he has scheduled an appearance at a GOP party workers rally at the auditorium. And in the evening he will speak at 7:30 p.m. in a nationally televised talk.

The Eisenhowers will spend Thursday night at the Multnomah Hotel and will leave for Denver the following morning.

There were these other political developments in Oregon over the weekend:

More than 500 persons attended a birthday anniversary party for the President at the Eisenhower headquarters in Portland Saturday. Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell spoke, praising the administration's accomplishments and questioning if the country would be as well off had Adlai Stevenson been elected in 1952.

Mitchell also urged the election of Douglas McKay, GOP candidate for the U.S. Senate seat now held by Democrat Wayne Morse.

McKay jumped on Morse for comparing the Eisenhower administration's first budget with what McKay called the "phony budget estimates" of the outgoing Truman administration in 1953. McKay said that the budget for national parks had been doubled despite Morse's contention that

"the first thing McKay did was to cut the budget for national parks by four million dollars."

Morse, speaking at Toledo, accused The Oregonian of making "baseless attacks" on him in a recent editorial which told of his activities in behalf of two Portland men to clear the title to a tract of Southern Oregon forest lands.

Morse said there was nothing improper about his actions as he contends there was in the Al Sarena case. The editorial had compared the two cases.

State Sen. Robert D. Holmes, Democratic candidate for governor, accused his Republican opponent Gov. Elmo Smith of "doubletalk" about taxes. He said that Smith had sponsored and voted for the state ballot measure which would bar a vote on "a sales tax passed by the Legislature."

Such a bill would make meaningless Smith's statement that he would veto a sales tax unless it were approved by the voters.

Holmes said Smith accused Holmes of "falsehoods" and said he was "extremely resentful that something as clean as a campaign for governor should be based on repeated falsehoods."

Sen. Albert Gore (D-Tenn.) told a Klamath Falls rally that "the heart of the Republican Party is Wall Street" and that the policies of Secretary of the Treasury George Humphrey were "wrecking the economy of the United States." Gore is campaigning on behalf of Democratic candidates.

State Sen. Carl Francis, GOP candidate for attorney general, said the Democrat who now holds the post, Robert Y. Thornton, has usurped the powers of Oregon district attorneys.

Charles O. Porter, Democratic candidate for Congress from the Fourth District, said his Republican opponent, Rep. Harris Ellsworth, had "helped put Western farmers in a strait jacket by his voting record."

Al Ullman, Democratic candidate for Congress from the Second District, said incumbent Sam Coon had opposed federal aid to education and had not offered any other program for "meeting the crisis of education in this country."

A final tabulation of voter registration showed that Democrats lead Republicans in Multnomah County by 29,724-136,443. Democrats and 126,709 Republicans. The state totals will be available later this week.

Fat Sergeant Re-Enlists

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.—It's another hitch in the Army for Sgt. James Love, a hefty man sergeant once threatened with a court-martial because he wasn't peeling off weight fast enough.

The 34-year-old native of Cincinnati had said he would join the Air Force after his Army enlistment expired. He changed his mind when discharge day came last Wednesday and re-enlisted Saturday.

"The Army has more to offer," he said.

Love weighed 237 when "Operation Fat Man" was put into effect at nearby Ft. Carson last March by Maj. Gen. Thomas Watlington, then commanding general.

When the court-martial threat came, Love protested. An investigation was started, the weight losing order was rescinded by the Pentagon, and charges against Love were dropped.

His weight is now 220 and he says he eats "just when I'm hungry."
