Nixon Speaks In Midwest Plugging GOP Leadership

DAYTON, Ohio (AP)—Vice President Nixon takes his plea that America "can't risk giving up the proved leadership of President Eisenhower" to farmers, factory workers and students across Ohio today. The vice president, carrying the main burden of Republican vote-seeking at the grass roots, in the past few days increasingly has been pitching his campaign on what he presents as a contrast. He says it is a matter of judgment and experience on Eisenhower's part against what he calls good intentions but no better than second rank background for Democrat Adlai Stevenson. Nixon speaks here and in Toledo, Defiance, Warren and Youngstown today. On arrival here yesterday, he predicted to newsmen that the Republicans will lose no farm state on the issue of Eisenhower versus the "Stevenson-Brannan farm plan." Farm conditions, particularly depressed by drought, may count in some marginal states, Nixon said. He cited Missouri as an example. He told a questioner there is no significance in his not mentioning Secretary of Agriculture Benson by name when speaking for the Eisenhower farm program. He said he never mentioned Cabinet members individually unless there is a special reason to do so. And he said the question whether Benson, a controversial figure in the Farm Belt, is helping or hurting Republican chances by making speeches there cannot very well be discussed until Benson has had his say. "Mr. Benson certainly worked as hard as any man could for a program he believes to be in the best interest of the farmers," Nixon said. The vice president gave optimistic estimates of Republican chances in the states he has visited during his present 10,000-mile swing, now half over. These ranged from "not lost... doubtful" for Texas to "no problem" for Nebraska and Colorado. At the same time, Nixon said Eisenhower supporters should be on the alert for a push "by the

Cabbie Miser Loses Hoard

WEST BABYLON, N.Y. (AP)—Police plan to count today the hundreds of crumpled bills and tarnished coins they found scattered through the ramshackle house of a retired cab driver and his reclusive sister. Patrolmen stumbled on the dusty treasure hoard Saturday after John Van Huda, 58, telephoned and said two men had robbed him of \$12,000 on his home. When police arrived they were astonished to find money littered through the nine-room Long Island house like so much trash. Each room was also stuffed with old newspapers, rags, boxes and bottles. Rats had nibbled on some of the bills lying on the floor. Other bills were worn thin from passing feet. Two thugs posing as deliverymen talked Van Huda into letting them in. They hit him over the head and dug out an estimated \$12,000 from under a mattress. The robbers stuffed the cash in a feed bag and fled. How much did the thugs miss in the money-chattered house? First estimates placed the total at \$30,000. But later Babylon Police Chief Percy K. Hempstead said he couldn't say how much there was. Asked why the money was kept in the house, Van Huda's sister Jeanette, 64, said: "That's because of that Hitler... Johnnie got very excited because he thought Hitler was going to take over the whole world. He thought if he kept the money in the house, Hitler wouldn't look for it there." Van Huda said: "You know how it is, you need money around the house for emergencies." Neighbors were startled to learn that the shabby Van Huda house was crammed with riches. Some said they had lived in the area for 30 years and had never seen Miss Van Huda. "That's not true," she said. "I was out 10 years ago. It's my feet. They keep me in most of the time. They always hurt me."

Gilbert said the boy belongs to a rifle club and was getting the weapon ready for target practice.
