Ferlin Huskey, who is called "Mr. Versatility" and who is featured on Nashville's famous Grand Ole Opry will appear in person Oct. 21 at the Klamath Falls Armory.

He takes his entertainment career very seriously, and for this very reason, he is known as one of the finest stage entertainers in America today. His homespun humor, together with his impersonations of other great singers, and his own hit songs, certainly makes for a fine evening of enjoyment.

### Editor-Author's Death Told

PORTLAND (AP) — Phillip H. Parrish, 60, who guided the editorial page of The Oregonian for 17 years before his retirement last January, died Sunday.

Parrish had been in ill health for some time but had continued as a consulting editor for the newspaper.

His journalism career covered 40 years in which he worked on the Morning Olympia at Olympia, Wash.; The Bellingham (Wash.) Herald; and the Oregon Journal, besides The Oregonian.

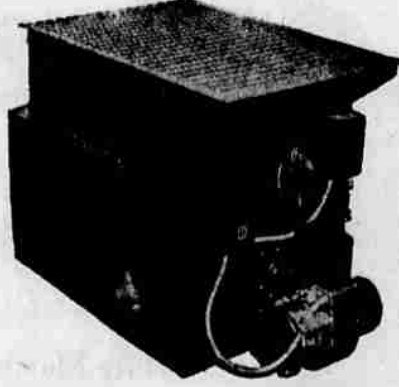

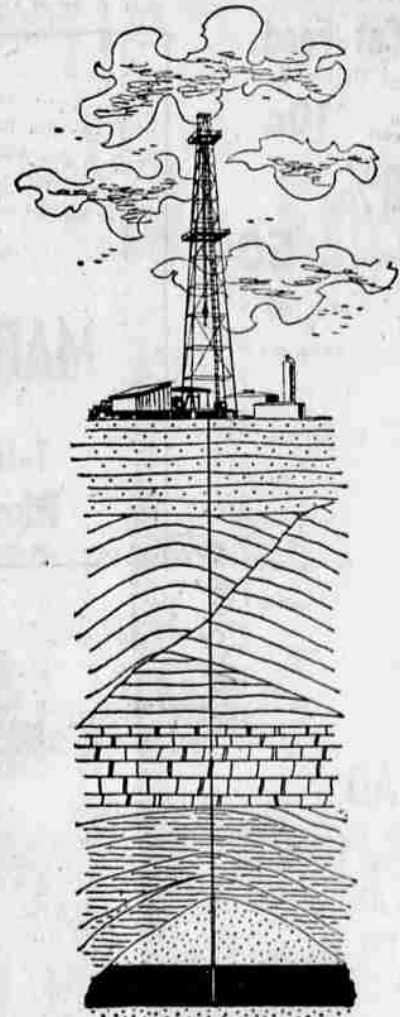
