

Oklahoma Holds; OTI Awaits Homecoming

Spartans Pushing Sooners

It's still Oklahoma No. 1 in college football but the Sooners, unmatched record and all, may find themselves lagging at the polls in a few days simply because their chief rival, Michigan State, gets first crack at Notre Dame.

Michigan State, getting its support from those who place schedule over statistics, pulled up to within 25 points of Oklahoma in the weekly Associated Press poll of sports writers and sportscasters, despite the Sooners' winning streak of 33 games.

For Michigan State, a 53-6 winner over Indiana, the result of the new balloting was a gain of 95 points on Oklahoma, which whitewashed Texas 45-0 after thrashings of North Carolina and Kansas State.

In the total standings, with points awarded on the basis of 10 for a first-place vote, 9 for second, etc., Oklahoma led with 1,173 to 1,148 for Michigan State. Between them, they drew 111 of 131 first-place ballots, 67 for the Sooners.

Only one major change turned up in the weekly accounting, Michigan moving back into the top 10 at the No. 8 position after routing Army 48-14. Texas A&M gave way, dropping from ninth to 14th.

Georgia Tech held on to third and Texas Christian remained in the fourth. The rest of the lineup was Ohio State, Mississippi, Tennessee, Michigan, Southern California and Baylor.

Sunny Jim Looks To New Colt For Future

NEW YORK (UP)—Don't shed any tears for Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons; the 81-year-old trainer has a young horse back in the barn who looks almost as good as retired Nashua.

His name is Bold Ruler, a lightly-campaigned two year old colt with a world of speed and the same racing courage as his former stablemate.

In his most recent outing last Saturday, Bold Ruler, who represents the Wheatley stable, ran away from a strong field in the Futurity at Belmont Park. He'll make his next start in the Garden State Stakes — the world's richest race — at Garden State Park, Oct. 27.

DERBY PICK
If he wins the Garden State, Jim Fitzsimmons' latest racing "phenom" undoubtedly will wind up as the champion two year old of 1956 and the future book favorite for next year's Kentucky Derby.

Asked if he thought Bold Ruler has the stuff to develop into another Nashua, Fitzsimmons declined a prediction on the grounds that Bold Ruler hasn't had a sufficient number of races. But Eddie Arcaro, who was Nashua's regular pilot and now has inherited the mounts on Bold Ruler, wasn't so cautious.

"Bold Ruler is a good colt," said master Eddie. "Of course, it's hard to tell if he'll develop into another Nashua, but right now I'd have to say he's as good as Nashua was at this point in his career."

SUPPORT OPINION
Arcaro's opinion is supported by the records. As a two-year-old, Nashua won six of eight starts and earned \$192,865. Bold Ruler thus far has won seven of eight and has a bankroll of \$139,050. If he wins the Garden State, Bold Ruler easily will surpass the \$200,000 mark on earnings.

Bold Ruler didn't make his racing debut until last April at Jamaica when he won a maiden race by 3 1/2 lengths. He then ran off four more victories, including triumphs in the Youthful and the Juvenile stakes, before a sore back knocked him out of training.

When he returned to action at Belmont Park last month, the dark brown colt finished second to Nashville in an allowance race. That was Bold Ruler's first defeat, but he gained revenge in the Futurity, speeding to a two-length triumph over Greek Game while Nashville reported home sixth.

"He's just getting back in form now after that summer lay-off," Fitzsimmons admitted after the Futurity, "and he should be a tough horse to beat the rest of the year."

NEW YORK (UP)—Manager Gus D'Amato unexpectedly admitted today he had received "assurances" of clean officiating at Chicago before he permitted young Floyd Patterson to accept the Nov. 30th fight with Archie Moore at Chicago Stadium for the vacant heavyweight crown.

D'Amato's admission was unexpected because promoter Jim Norris, announcing the match in New York Monday night, said, "I have not heard anything about any assurances."

Pirates, Tornadoes Lead HS Poll Again

Unbeaten Marshfield and Medford are the No. 1 and 2 high school football teams in Oregon again in this week's Associated Press poll.

Marshfield grabbed the top ranking for the fourth straight week, picking up first-place votes from 19 of the 24 sports writers and broadcasters casting ballots. The other 5 backed Medford.

The race wasn't quite as close as last week, however, when Marshfield nudged out Medford by only a few points in the balloting. That was shortly after the two clubs had battled to a 20-20 tie.

This week Marshfield wound up with a total of 235 points in the balloting, 14 more than Medford. Both won their games last weekend, with Marshfield dumping Springfield and Medford mauling Klamath Falls.

Most of the rest of the top ten are the same this week. Eugene is No. 3 again, with 178 points. Eugene ran its victory string to 6 straight with a win over Albany Friday night, but only by a one-point margin.

Beaverton picked up 10 points in voting strength but remains in fourth place and Gresham is fifth again. Both won weekend games.

Albany dropped a few points after its defeat by Eugene, but is still No. 6. And McMinnville, which had the help of a 100-yard touchdown run by halfback Larry Peterson in beating Lake Oswego, 24-12, kept its No. 7 rating.

Grants Pass, which beat The Dalles last weekend, took over No. 8 in place of Springfield, which fell before top-ranked Marshfield. Springfield skidded into a tie for No. 9 with Astoria, which was No. 10 last week.
