Fans Wait Six Months For Tickets To Sullivan Show

NEW YORK (UP)—The toughest ticket to latch onto in this town is not "My Fair Lady." It's a ducat for a TV program—the Ed Sullivan show.

"We parcel out tickets to the Sullivan show as if they were gold," says one beleaguered lady in the CBS ticket bureau. "People who send in requests right now may get seats for the Sullivan show in about six months. Maybe."

Sullivan has several close competitors in the TV ticket squeeze. Pasteborders for such NBC-TV productions as the Perry Como show, the Steve Allen Sunday program and Sid Caesar's Saturday clambake are in extremely heavy demand.

Over at ABC-TV, "The Voice of Firestone" boasts a long list of waiters. And Sullivan's fellow employees at CBS-TV—Jackie Gleason and Arthur Godfrey—also get a burdensome bag of requests each week.

Here's the way the ticket situation shapes up for free TV shows: TRY AUTO AGENCY

CBS-TV (405 Madison Ave)—the best way to snag Sullivan tickets is through the automobile sponsor of the show: ask your local auto dealer to help you. For the Gleason show, there's a three-month wait and tickets are limited to two per request. The Godfrey morning show has a four-month waiting roster. Godfrey's "Talent Scouts" has a four-week wait. "There's no audience for Godfrey's Wednesday night show," "I've Got A Secret" is an eight-weeker at CBS-TV and "What's My Line" takes about six weeks. "The \$64,000 Question" and "The \$64,000 Challenge" also fall in this category.

Your best quick bets at CBS-TV are the Phil Silvers show (shot on Friday afternoon with an audience), the Garry Moore Monday through Thursday morning shows, the new Herb Shriver show, "High Finance" and "Name That Tune." All list about a four weeks wait.

NBC-TV (30 Rockefeller Plaza)—no more ticket requests for the Como show will be taken after November—seats will be booked right through June. There are no tickets available for Steve Allen's Sunday show until about late January. A two-month wait is listed for Sid Caesar and demand is building steadily.

Utility Firms Study Taxes

LAPINE — A joint meeting of Midstate and Central Electric cooperatives at Redmond October 11 featured a study of the effects of a state legislative sub-committee proposal for taxation of Oregon rural electric cooperatives.

Dr. Phillip O. Foss of the University of Oregon political science department, retained by Oregon's REA financial systems, presented data to show tax rates for central Oregon's two rural utilities under the schedule proposed by the sub-committee.

Midstate Electric, it was pointed out, is particularly vulnerable to increasing taxes based on total valuation due to top-heavy capitalization required to serve comparatively few customers. During Midstate's short existence, it was further noted, property valuations, including personal property, have risen noticeably throughout its service area. Property tax revenue in this indirect manner will far surpass the yield of any direct taxation that could be imposed on Midstate.

Three alternative tax methods were proposed as being more equitable for all types of utilities. Attending the meeting from the LaPine cooperative were C. M. Olson, George M. Larimer, Bud Parks, Harold Hake and Glenn Anderson. Larimer, Midstate's manager, has previously participated in panel discussions of rural electric tax problems at statewide meetings.


