Many household items, as well as radios, lamps, furniture, and good quality clothing will be sold.

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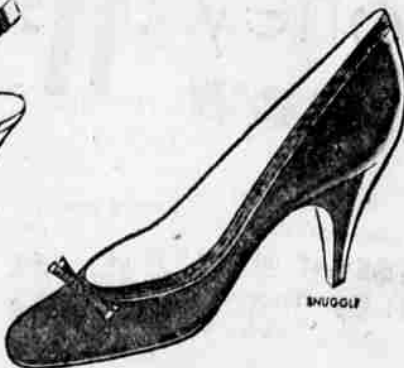
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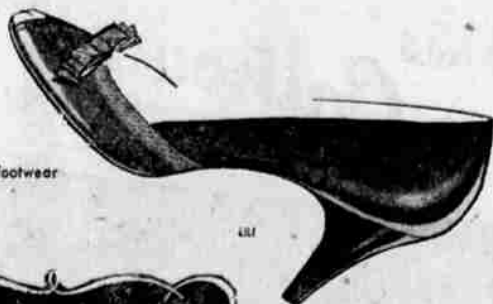


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
