High Revenue Need Told

SALEM—Estimates from two state finance agencies indicated Tuesday the 1957 Legislature will have to raise 17 1/2 million dollars in new revenues in order to balance the budget.

The Oregon Tax Commission and the state Department of Finance announced that budget requests for the 1957-58 biennium total \$277,072,941. Anticipated revenues were figured at \$259,532,238, leaving a deficit of \$17,540,702.

The Legislature and the finance department are expected to trim the deficit by cutting down departmental budget requests. Building projects at state institutions and the colleges are a major budget item, accounting for \$29,728,815 of the total.

The estimated revenues include a 30-million-dollar carryover from the current biennium and 175 millions from personal and corporation income taxes. The estimate does not include the proposed cigarette tax of three cents a package on the Nov. 6 ballot. Passage of this measure would add 11 million dollars to the total revenue.

OTI Authorized To Seek More Operating Funds

The state board of education at its Monday meeting authorized OTI Director Winston Purvine and State Vocational Director Oscar I. Paulson to seek about \$40,000 additional operating funds for OTI at the November 9 meeting of the state emergency board.

The board explained that the request is subsequent action to the \$30,000 request placed before the board last spring. At that time Purvine was instructed to try and offset the requirement by raising the tuition fees at the institute.

Effective with the fall semester this year the semester fees were raised from \$60 to \$72. Purvine explained to board members that the action resulting in a negative effect in that it materialized into a lesser registration at the school,

thereby failing to raise the needed tuition fees for each of the three semesters during a school year.

The budgetary material for the 1957-58 biennium is concluded on the basis of returning to the \$60 semester tuition fee. In other action the board heard the protests of a parent of one of the girls expelled from OTI last spring following a police raid at a Klamath Falls residence where a student party was being held. The woman maintained that

her daughter, along with six other OTI students, had not been justly treated when they were expelled. It was her contention that there were a large number of other OTI students at the party and they were not expelled.

The board informed the woman that it was not within their province to act on the matter, inasmuch as the expulsion was the product of disciplinary committee action approved by the OTI director.

Courts Ask Indian Study

LAKEVIEW—The Klamath and Lake County courts have requested the governor to convene the State Board of Forestry for the purpose of getting under way a study of the natural resources of the Klamath Indian Reservation, in order that the 1957 session of the Legislature can promptly decide on what course of action to take to assist the Indian Bureau and the Klamath Tribe in carrying on the current termination of federal jurisdiction program.

According to Forrest E. Cooper, Lakeview attorney who serves as counsel for the Association of Oregon Counties, active interest on the part of the Wisconsin Legislature recently resulted in an amendment to the termination act relating to the Menominee Indians of that state, who also own a valuable tract of pine timber. The amendment was to the end that the tribe will continue in ownership of its acres in perpetuity.

The Oregon counties are opposing any attempt to wrest the reservation acres away from those members of the tribe who want to retain their ancestral home.

County Judge U. E. Reeder represents the Association of Oregon Counties on the forestry board. He has also joined in requesting the governor to call such a meeting of the board.

Seaton Okays Mine Ruling

WASHINGTON—Secretary of the Interior Seaton has approved regulations designed to prevent exploitation of surface resources on public lands through the staking out of mining claims.

The regulations implement a 1955 law under which unpatented mining claims located after July 23, 1955, may not be used for any purpose other than prospecting, mining or processing operations. Seaton said Tuesday that under the old law persons staking out mining claims could get valuable above-ground rights to timber or sites for business, summer residence, hunting and fishing.

Seaton called the new law "the most important change in the mining laws since enactment of the Mineral Leasing Act of 1920, as well as one of the most vital conservation measures in history."

An Interior Department spokesman said the new law had no direct connection with the controversial Al Sarena case in Oregon. In that case patents were issued and the owners then allegedly cut valuable timber on the claims and did little or no mining.
