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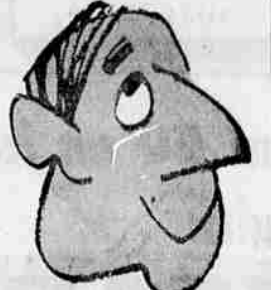

SHE ABOLISHES UNION ARMY
WASHINGTON (UP) — It took a good member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy to finally abolish the Union Army. Federal Judge Burnita S. Matthews, a UDC member from Hazlehurst, Miss., signed an order on Tuesday turning over to the Smithsonian Institution the scant remaining property of the Grand Army of the Republic. This included an American flag, a Navy flag, a yellow headquarters banner, a number of badges and a gavel made from wood taken from Abraham Lincoln's log cabin.

Name and address of the exhibitor must be on the bottom of the container. The festival is not responsible for loss or breakage. Decision of the judges is final.

The classes and divisions with prize awards are listed as follows:

Class I — A. Senior (seventh through twelfth grades.)

1. Panorama of Klamath Basin. A scene depicting harvest using potatoes and other materials. (Combined work of youth organizations or classroom students.) First prize, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$2.

2. Klamath Gold. A dried arrangement for buffet. May feature barley, rye or any other grain with dried material and weathered wood. First award, \$3; second, \$2; third, \$1.

3. Harvest Bountiful. Buffet arrangement featuring potatoes. First prize, \$3; second, \$2; third, \$1. B. Junior. (Same as senior only exhibitors must be from grades one through six.)

Class II—A. Senior and Junior. (Prizes in one division only, regardless of exhibitor's age.)

1. Let's Have a Party. Group of three favors made from vegetables of any variety; mixed or all one vegetable. First prize, \$3; second, \$2; third, \$1.
