Modoc Ranger Commended

ALTURAS — Chester D. Cannon Jr., superintendent of the Modoc National Forest prison camp, recently received a personal letter of commendation from Regional Forester Charles H. Connaughton.

On September 21, Mr. Cannon and his 50 man inmate crew were dispatched to the San Bernardino National Forest to assist in the suppression of a disastrous 11,000 acre fire. While working with the inmates and 25 Hopi Indians, putting in control lines in City Creek, the fire outflanked all of them from below. Realizing that a serious situation had developed and that neither the Hopis, or the inmate crews could out-run or find a safe place ahead of the flames, Cannon quitted the men, sized up the tactical situation and quickly backfired out an area. He then had the men, using their hard hats, dip water from a small pool and cool the hot coals in the freshly burned area. The crews then lay down in the prepared opening.

Within five minutes the main fire reached and crossed over all of the crews, but the effect of the backfire reduced the heat from the main fire. The only green spot that remained in the completely

devastated canyon was the small area prepared for the safety of the crew. No one received even minor injuries.

Regional Forester Connaughton had this to say, "Without your able leadership, I'm convinced a catastrophe would have resulted. The manner in which you took command of the emergency indicates your personal courage and competence, and is appreciated by me and all of us in the Forest Service."

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
