

Oregon Tech Owls To Host SOC In Homecoming Battle

It's Homecoming Weekend for the Oregon Tech Owls this Saturday and the Mile High Campus football fortunes will be centered on the afternoon gridiron clash between the homecoming Techmen and the invading Red Raiders from Southern Oregon College.

Game time for the Oregon Collegiate Conference battle is 2 o'clock on Modoc Field.

Coach Rex Hunsaker's Owls have moved through this week's first two practice sessions in high spirits as they drill for their arch rival, the Red Raiders of SOC. This week's clash will bring together the most heated football competition seen anywhere this season in OCC ranks.

Ever since the Owls and Raiders have been meeting on the athletic fields, the outcome has been a never-ending affair. Last year, OTU was dumped 33-0 by SOC, but the Owls in turn knocked the Raiders from contention in last spring's baseball tournament, after Southern Oregon had run roughshod over Tech's diamond club during the "non-counting" regular season play.

The big job facing the Owls as they work for this Saturday's game is the task of stopping SOC's Little All-American candidate, quarterback Bill Seymour. Led by the passing arm and over-all field-generalship of Seymour, the Raiders are ranked as the co-favorites to win the Oregon Collegiate crown this year.

Going into this weekend's fracas, Tech has lost three straight games after winning the first two of the season. In the last two outings, Tech has dropped conference meetings to Portland State and Eastern Oregon. Southern Oregon on the other hand will be out to pocket their third straight victory since their last defeat.

Last Saturday night, Southern Oregon handed tough Portland State a 13-6 defeat in Ashland, and the week before, the Red Raiders of coach Al Atkins dumped Chico State 27-25 on Chuck Cranall's extra point boots. The overall season record for the Raiders is 2-2 after losing to Humboldt State and Sacramento State and winning from Portland and Chico.

Two Klamath Basin high school stars, who are now playing under the Southern Oregon colors, may break into the starting lineup for the Oregon Tech game. Atkins may decide to open with Modesto "Mighty Mo" Jimenez at one guard position and there is an outside possibility that Marion Jack

Tighe Says Tigers Will Get Changes

DETROIT (UP)—The Detroit Tigers, best second-half ball club in the American League in 1956, will be full of fire and vinegar from opening day in 1957 if their new manager, Jack Tighe, has his way.

Twenty-four hours after taking over his first major league managerial job, Tighe today reviewed his prospects this way:

"My players will be in shape and will stay that way. We have the basis for a good team. We should have finished in first division this past season, maybe in second place. We'll run instead of wait for the home run. There will be a curfew."

Tighe knows the club. He has been a coach for the Tigers for the past two seasons. His selection as manager to succeed Bucky Harris came as no surprise.

He was first choice of the new Tiger owners who took control the day after the season ended. The Tiger resurgence in 1956 came with the sale of the club by the Briggs family to a syndicate of radio and television executives headed by Fred Knorr and John Fetzer.

From the start of the season to July 17, the date of the sale, Detroit had a 36-46 record. From July 17 to the end of the season the club had a 46-26 mark, best in the league.

The new owners said freely they wanted a manager that would inspire and demand fiery, aggressive play. Harris quit during the season's final week, saying he obviously didn't measure up to those qualifications.

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Ferris Sees Gold For US

NEW YORK (UP)—Dan Ferris, secretary of the U.S. Amateur Athletic Union who gave an amazingly accurate prediction of America's track feats before the Helsinki Olympics, said today that the U.S. should equal its 1952 mark of 14 gold medals at Melbourne this year, and may make it 15 gold medals.

"First, we expect perhaps the greatest Olympics ever," he said. "The competition will be stronger than ever, but then our team is our best ever."

"I was impressed by the performances of our squad in the exhibition meet at Berkeley last Saturday," Ferris said. "Remember, these men had been away from competition for many weeks. We were not too far off form, and we found what our weaknesses are and we have time to correct them."

Olympic Favorite Tumbles

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—An expected "easy winner" in the featherweight division was eliminated and other solid favorites wondered today if they'd fall prey to upsets that marked opening bouts in the U. S. Olympic Boxing Trials.

Francis Lee, rangy Navy champ from Pittsburgh, won a close decision from Seattle's Bobbie Hicks to snap the Northwestern fighter's victory string at 45. Lee scored a knockdown in the second round and battered his young opponent with repeated blows to the body.

Hicks, a 17-year-old high school junior, had been the unanimous choice to win the Olympic featherweight berth.

Only about half the 105 entrants—representing service, collegiate, AAU and Golden Gloves teams—saw action in the 30-bout card. The others, including many top-ranked battlers, fight tonight for semifinal spots.

The best fight last night eliminated a pair of slugging welterweights. Henry Brown, the Navy champ from Wichita, Kan., knocked out Willie Moran of Louisville with a third-round punch that caught Moran off guard and sent him sprawling.

But Brown, bleeding from cuts on the mouth and nose and both eyes, was ruled out of further competition. A ring physician said his cuts were too serious to permit him continuing.

Upsets ousted two other favorites. Sammy Rollins, rated one of New York's classiest lightweights, lost by a TKO to Fred Jackson of the Air Force after piling up a big lead.

Weekend Hunting Outlook

Oregon hunters will have a wider choice of game in the coming weekend with Saturday's opening of the pheasant and quail seasons.

Pheasant shooting will be in all counties from Oct. 20 to Nov. 12, with a bag limit of three cock pheasants a day and 12 in possession.

Valley and Bobwhite quail shooting opens west of the Cascades except in Linn County, and Hunter

garian partridge and mountain quail seasons open in Eastern Oregon. Chukar partridge shooting will open Saturday in Eastern Oregon except in Baker, Grant, Union and Klamath counties.

The Oregon Game Commission said in its weekly hunting report that waterfowl hunting in Northwest Oregon is poor and not expected to improve until storms bring the birds in.

Good pheasant hunting is expected in much of the state, particularly in Central and Southern Oregon.

Recent rain has improved deer hunting in Douglas County, and Chinese pheasants are numerous in much of Southern Oregon.

Deer hunting in the Mt. Hood area should improve by the weekend, although deer herds remain widely scattered at all elevations.

A hunter's choice deer season opened Wednesday in Central Oregon, but prospects are poor for the weekend. Ranges are starting to dry out after earlier rains.

Deer hunting should improve in most Northeast Oregon counties, where rainfall has dampened forests and ranges. This results in increased movement of deer. Hunting has been good in Wheeler and Morrow counties.

Pheasant hunting is expected to be fair to good in Baker and Union counties with best results likely at Durkee, Keating, Richland and Halfway. Waterfowl hunting has been fair in Baker Valley and good at the Summer Lake area in Southeast Oregon.

A change in the weather is needed to produce good hunting for ducks and geese in the Warner Valley.

Midgets Snare Grade Grid Win

The Junior High Midgets continued to roll along the victory path in local grade school football circles after they won a 20-7 nod over Pelican-Roosevelt Wednesday afternoon at Modoc Field.

In games scheduled for Saturday, Mills will meet Conger-Riverside at 9:15, and Pelican-Roosevelt plays Fairview at 10:30. Both of these games will be played at Modoc Field.

Yankees, Dodgers Get Loot

NEW YORK (UP)—The biggest chunk of the \$758,561.63 World Series players pool went to 32 members of the world champion New York Yankees, who pocketed \$3,715.76. Twenty-eight members of the Brooklyn Dodgers collected full shares of \$6,934.34—a record losers' share.

The previous losers' high was picked up by the Cleveland Indians in 1954, with 24 full shares worth \$6,712.50 each. That was the wealthiest four-game series on record, with the winning New York Giants claiming full shares of \$11,147.80.

That series was played in New York's spacious Polo Grounds and Cleveland's mammoth Municipal Stadium—building a record players' pool of \$881,763.72. The players' pool is derived from the first four games each year.

A total of 332 players, managers, coaches, batboys, ballboys, clubhouse attendants, trainers, groundskeepers and traveling secretaries dipped into the 1956 pool. The Yankees, taking a \$50 top share cut by voting late—corner Enos Slaughter a higher percentage when the series was in progress, and the Dodgers split 70 per cent of the melon. Their share amounted to \$320,993.15 with the Yankees getting \$318,595.89 in the final figures announced by Commissioner Ford Frick yesterday for the seven-game series.

Cleveland and Milwaukee, the second-place clubs in the pennant races, divide 15 per cent of the pool (\$56,892.12 each); the third-place Chicago White Sox and Cincinnati take 10 per cent (\$37,928.08 each); and fourth-place Boston and St. Louis 5 per cent (\$18,964.04 each).

Net receipts for the series totaled \$2,183,254.59 (compared with last year's \$2,337,515.34 net). Of that, \$1,180,204.76 went to the clubs and leagues and \$327,488.20 to the commissioner's office. That left \$675,561.63 for the players' pool, which was padded by \$63,000 from pregame television programs.

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
