

# Washington, Trojans Meet In Top PC Fray

The University of Washington Huskies, minus their first string quarterback, take on Southern California's undefeated Trojans Saturday in the top game on the Pacific Coast Conference menu.

The Huskies, who whipped the Trojans 7-0 a year ago at Seattle, will have Bill Snider of Aberdeen calling signals in Saturday's contest at the spacious Memorial Coliseum. First-stringer Al Ferguson suffered a dislocated shoulder against Oregon last Saturday.

The odds-makers have installed the Trojans as two-touchdown favorites.

Coach Jess Hill at Southern Cal worked Jon Arnett and Frank Hall on conversions and field goals for the Washington game. "Washington is one of the best defensive clubs in the country — every point will probably count plenty," he said.

Gene Pederson, injured in the early season, is to start at left guard for Washington in place of Don Armstrong, who was hurt Saturday.

California's Golden Bears expect to be in top shape Saturday when they try to snap UCLA's 18-game conference winning streak.

Coach Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf noted Wednesday that all his men except quarterback Gus Gnanulias would be ready. He planned to use a fullback who would rather work against the Bruins than

against Stanford, the Bears' oldest rival.

The fullback is Jerry Drew, a senior limited to five consecutive games when the PCC penalized Cal for improper assistance to athletes. By starting his five against the Bruins, Drew will miss the Big Game.

He explained: "I don't like the way UCLA has been handling us recently," and added, "I'm from Los Angeles, you know." UCLA has won its last five games from Cal.

At UCLA, Coach Red Sanders worked passing and pass defense, using tailbacks Don Lang and Doug Bradley to handle the throwing.

From what the Bears have shown, the main Bruin problem will be to stop an all-out passing attack.

Two other PCC coaches worrying about stopping aerials are Tommy Prothro at Oregon State and Len Casanova at Oregon.

Prothro's Oregon State club plays Washington State, the team with the best passing record in the nation. Casanova's Oregon squad met Stanford and John Brodie, probably the classiest collegiate thrower.

Prothro had his reserves throwing the ball in Washington State patterns and practicing ball handling in the rain. Washington State had quarterbacks Bunny Aldrich and Bob Newman throwing to ends, backs and flankers.

## Swaps' Life Hangs With Rods, Sling

CAMDEN, N.J. (UP) — The life of Swaps, a million dollar's worth of horseflesh, hung today on two metal rods, a sling and some plaster and plastic.

The items make up a specially-designed cast around Swaps' broken left hind leg and a rig to keep it two inches off the floor of his Garden State Park stall.

The cast, devised by Dr. Jacques Jenney of the University of Pennsylvania veterinary hospital, has immobilized Swaps' maimed leg from the hock down to promote healing and prevent recurrence of last Sunday's bad bump which aggravated a still tender bone break below the knee.

## Logart Bows In Surprise Ring Voting

BOSTON (AP) — The high rating of Isaac (Kid) Logart as a contender for the world's welterweight championship still appeared justified Thursday despite a 10-round decision loss to unranked Gaspar Ortega of Mexico.

The 23-year-old Cuban, rated the No. 3 contender by the National Boxing Assn. and Ring Magazine, was upset by Ortega in a nationally-televized bout Wednesday night on some surprising vote-casting by the officials.

The referee and one judge voted for Ortega and the second judge a draw. Boxing writers had Logart the winner by a 5-1 margin, while several other veteran ring men also figured the Cuban had won.

Logart subjected Ortega to a heavy body battering from the opening bell, but the Mexican Indian's last-round rally gained him the votes of Referee Eddie Curley and Judge John Norton. Curley voted 97-95 and Norton 97-96, both in favor of Ortega.

Judge Harry Sundberg voted a draw, 96-96.

Ortega, a 4-1 underdog out-punished Logart last March, was cheered on by a "studio" crowd of 906 at Mechanics Building and apparently landed enough solid blows against the stylish Logart to gain the necessary votes in the hard-fought battle.

Logart, who has been campaigning for a shot at Boston's Tony De Marco, the No. 1 welter contender, won the first round in easy fashion but from there on in the bout was like a dock brawl. The wee crowd cheered, clapped and stomped for a full minute as the fight ended in a slugfest.
