**CHILOQUIN** — Paul Wampler, cattleman, suffered his third loss of hay by fire in two years when a large house which had been used as a barn for hay storage and an adjoining stack were completely destroyed in a fire Monday evening. His property is just north of Chilquin on the west side of Williamson River. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

Two years ago the barn on the same property was burned with its capacity load of hay, none of which was covered with insurance, and last year a barn owned by W. T. Oates, a mile north of Chilquin, burned with several tons of uninsured hay which had a short time previously been purchased by Wampler.

**Shaw Society Scores Play**

**CHICAGO** — Shawian enthusiasts today said the late George Bernard Shaw has become a victim of "commercial censorship" and that amateur rights to his play "Pygmalion" have "disappeared somewhere behind the Iron Curtain of a Broadway musical, 'My Fair Lady.'"

The Chicago Shaw Society said that as a result of the sensational Broadway show—a musical version of Shaw's play—no amateur or stock group in America is allowed to stage "Pygmalion." It also said that the movie version of "Pygmalion" has been withdrawn from public exhibition.

Elmer Gertz, attorney and president of the Chicago group, and Mrs. Lois E. Solomon, a suburban Glencoe housewife instrumental in formation of the society, said withdrawal of amateur producing rights to Pygmalion violates Shaw's will.

In New York, a spokesman for "My Fair Lady" producer Herman Levin said Levin had permission of Shaw's estate to produce the musical, as well as stage and screen rights to the musical until 1970.

He said the only restriction he knows of is against showing the movie "Pygmalion," which is part of the agreement with the Shaw estate.

The spokesman said that as far as was known there are no restrictions of nonmusical presentations of "Pygmalion."

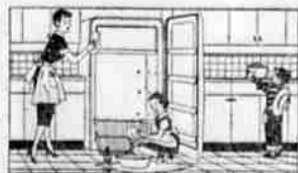
But Gertz and Mrs. Solomon said the Chicago society had received complaints and inquiries

from university theaters, high school drama groups and amateur producing companies concerning failure to obtain "Pygmalion" for production.  
William D. Chase of Flint, Mich. secretary of the Shaw Society of America, said in a statement that the situation makes the late Irish playwright the "victim of a new type of censorship."
