DUNSMUIR—Duane David Rose, 19, of Klamath Falls, is currently serving 180 days in the Siskiyou County Jail after pleading guilty to charges of taking about \$58 from the office of Dunsmuir Justice Judge A. S. Smith Monday.

Rose was in company with G.E. LaMarche, 18, of Klamath Falls, who had been in the justice office to pay a traffic fine. He told police he was unaware that the \$58 had been taken from the judge's cash drawer, and was released without charge.

The two youths were apprehended on the north outskirts of Dunsmuir about an hour after they were in the justice office. The money was found under a seat of the car which they were driving.

New School Opening Set

CHILOQUIN — The new grade school gymnasium will be dedicated on Friday evening, according to Frank Hale, school principal.

The new school and gym were completed by Brosterhouse Construction Company of Klamath Falls, general contractor, in time for the start of the present school year at a cost of \$287,880.56.

Morrison and Howard, Klamath Falls, were architects for the work.

Dedication ceremonies will start at 7:30 p.m. and are open to the public. A 30-minute program by school children will follow the invocation by the Rev. David Schneider. Guest speaker, Harvey Wright Oregon state director of Indian education, will be introduced by Carol Howe, Klamath County superintendent of schools.

An open house in all classrooms will conclude the evening with refreshments served by the school PTA.
