Mrs. Ruotolo Gets Release

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—A 33-year-old mother, whose infant daughter was kidnapped and murdered last month, was released from a state mental hospital yesterday.

Mrs. Eleanor Ruotolo asked to be admitted to the hospital two weeks ago but asked to be released four days later. She had to stay 10 days after that because of hospital rules, which require 10 days notice before voluntary patients can leave.

State's Atty. Abraham S. Ullman, who heads the investigation into the baby's death, said he will ask for the psychiatric reports on Mrs. Ruotolo, but he said he had no immediate plans to talk to her.

Coast Storm Moves To Sea

There were a few rainy areas but fair weather prevailed in most of the nation today.

The Atlantic coastal storm that brought heavy rain and strong winds from Maine to New Jersey this week moved out to sea yesterday. However, rain and showers continued during the night in the Carolinas. Clear skies were in prospect for the northeastern area.

Welcome rains which fell in drought areas of Texas were expected to spread northward into southern Kansas and southwestern Missouri during the day. Scattered showers also were forecast for the northern half of the Rockies, and more rain was the outlook for western Oregon and Washington.

Cooler weather was reported in the Northwest, the far Northwest and the southern half of the plains and in isolated spots in the Midwest. It was below freezing—27 degrees—at Pellston, Mich., this morning while Fraser, Colo., reported a chilly 18 reading.

Elevator Kills Young Woman

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UP)—A hospital elevator started unexpectedly Thursday and crushed a young woman to death before horrified passengers.

Mary Ann Logan, 21, a medical student, was boarding the elevator when it suddenly started up, pinning her head between the cab and portal.

Seven other passengers and the operator, Othelma Snow, were unable to help as the victim died almost instantly of strangulation and a crushed neck.

LEGISLATION DISCUSSED

The congressman discussed various legislation and expressed concern over the failure of Congress to pass the Barrett Water Rights Bill which he said "would have restored the water rights which the people of Oregon thought they had all along." He then expressed his intention to introduce legislation at the 1957 session which will be designed to secure the state's water rights.

Coon also said that this congressional district and adjoining ones received almost one dollar out of every \$18 in the public works appropriation bill for the entire United States this year, adding that he testified for many of the funds.

In speaking of reclamation, Coon told of the Crooked River Bill which was passed in the House last session following his sponsorship.

UN Call Girl Rina Broken

NEW YORK (UP)—A sharply red-tinted former, displaced person faced a possible five years in prison and \$10,000 fine today for allegedly running a "United Nations" call girl ring.

Nela Bogacki, alias Nelda Bogart, alias Nina Sandman, 22, was arraigned in Federal Court Thursday and accused of violating the Mann Act. The government charged her with operating an international call house that recruited slammer girls from at least five nations and possibly more for \$25 "dates."

The girls, like Miss Bogacki, were either displaced persons or visitors with transient permits forbidden to work in this country.

H-Bomb Study Plan Asked

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Twenty-four scientists at Washington University called Thursday for "intensive scientific study and public discussion" on how continued H-bomb tests might affect mankind.

They said the tests have created an "alarming" outlook. The scientists said both political parties "owe the American people a clear statement of their positions on this transcendent issue."

Adlai E. Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, has urged that the United States take the lead in trying to obtain an East-West agreement on halting further H-bomb tests.

The Republican administration has taken the position any ban on tests must be a part of a comprehensive disarmament plan with adequate controls and safeguards.

The tests already completed have burdened the upper atmosphere with radioactive materials which continue to fall on the earth, contaminate our food and become incorporated into human organs," the statement said.

"There are at present insufficient data to permit an absolute conclusion on the danger in continued accumulation of such radioactivity to ourselves and to future generations. The outlook is, however, alarming. This situation calls for intensive scientific study and public discussion."
