

Board Votes To Keep Nats In Washington 'Forever'

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Washington Senators will be back at the same old stand next year. The club's five directors voted unanimously Friday to stay after two weeks of talk that the American League baseball franchise would be transferred to another city.

Afterward, Calvin Griffith, president of the Senators, said "we will stay here the rest of our lives."

The decision came after many baseball followers here had become convinced the Senators probably would be playing out of Los Angeles next season.

Published reports had pictured Griffith as anxious to move to a city where his club could make more money. And it was indicated he preferred Los Angeles over Louisville, San Francisco and Minneapolis, the other cities bidding for the franchise.

Griffith said the directors de-

clared that what they have here is better than anything offered them by the other cities.

Leading Washington businessmen and organizations, he said, had shown disappointment over reports of a move and had made known their desire to keep the club here. But he said there was no specific proposal of measures to help the club, except by fineshoring the bottom of the league.

A committee from the Washington Board of Trade had promised

Griffith Thursday to help with ticket sales. Griffith also was told that the committee felt a new stadium would be built here within a few years.

One of the happiest over the decision was Mrs. Anne Robertson Griffith, widow of the late Clark Griffith who headed the Washington club for more than 40 years.

"This is wonderful news," she said, adding that Clark "never would have moved."

Calvin is Clark's adopted son.

Giambra Winner On Split

NEW YORK (AP)—To the victor belong the spoils but sometimes there is glory for the conquered.

Such was the case Friday night when sharpshooting Joey Giambra, Buffalo, N.Y., middleweight contender, gained a split decision 10 rounds with ever hustling Ed Turner of Philadelphia at Madison Square Garden.

A 3-1 underdog and spotting his rival 7½ pounds — 158 to 161½ — the 26-year old Turner carried the fight all the way to his harder hitting rival. At the finish he was tired and wobbling but still bringing away with both hands.

Giambra, a picture-puncher, let all have both barrels in the decisive final round but he could never make the veteran haul down his flag. Handsome Joey connected with at least 20 solid shots to Turner's jaw in that final round and still couldn't floor him.

Giambra was battling to stay on the big time after three previous defeats in succession. The defeat won't eliminate him. He's had 31 TV shots and will get more if he lays with welterweights hereafter. He hasn't the stamina of old and he can't spot hard hitters like Giambra seven and eight rounds any more.

Giambra, tenth ranked among the 160-pounders, racked up his fifth straight victory in his post-prime drive.

He praised Turner for his gameness and condition.

Judges Harold Barnes (5-4-1) and Bill Rech (6-2-2) voted for Giambra, Referee Harry Kessler cast his vote for Turner, 5-4-1. The AP card had Giambra the winner, 11-4. All 11 ringside critics had Giambra ahead by varying margins.

Turner won his rounds on his feet. He fought like an alleycat after a fish scrap. Giambra, when he opened up, just had too much power.

A crowd of about 2,000 paid an estimated \$5,000 for the first Garden fight show since Sept. 7.

Browns, Rams Picks In Pro Grid Battles

The Cleveland Browns and Los Angeles Rams, defending division champions who have acted like also-rans so far in the National Football League races, are favored in their Sunday games and must win to stay within hailing distance of the early leaders.

The Browns, defending league champions, are six-point choices to defeat the Redskins at Washington and boost their record to 2-2. Washington (0-3) is the only NFL team without a 1956 victory.

Los Angeles, off to a 1-2 start in defense of its Western Division title, is a three-point favorite to defeat the Green Bay Packers (1-2) at Milwaukee.

The Lions, leading the Western race with a 3-0 record, are favored over the San Francisco Forty Niners (1-2) by 7½ points at Detroit. The Chicago Cardinals lead the Eastern Division with a 3-0 mark but apparently haven't

convinced the oddsmakers and their game with the Eagles (1-2) at Philadelphia is rated a toss-up.

The Chicago Bears and New York Giants, picked by many observers as the teams most likely to succeed the Rams and Browns as division champions, are the heaviest favorites in Sunday's clashes. The Bears (2-1) are 11-point choices against the Baltimore Colts (1-2) at Chicago and the Giants (2-1) are favored over the Pittsburgh Steelers (1-2) by a similar margin at New York.

All the games except the Cardinals-Eagles clash will be televised on regional networks by CBS.

For the first time this season, there will be no "space cadets" on the fields Sunday. On Thursday Bert Bell, NFL commissioner barred for the rest of the season the radios and other electronic devices five of the teams had used to pass information to their players.

Wash. Boxer Snares Spot On U.S. Team

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Ten men, including Pete Rademacher of Grandview, Wash., won places on the United States' Olympic boxing team Friday night.

Rademacher, heavyweight victor over Idaho State's Hal Espy, answered a four year dream. The former Washington State College football player, representing the Army, had missed out four years ago but decided to try out again this time. He battered Joe Hemphill of Washington, D. C., and Espy to make it Friday night.

Two other Idaho State fighters were in the finals. They were Roger Rouse who defeated Paul Wright, Flint, Mich., in the middleweight division, and David Abeyta, a loser to Choken Mackawa, Michigan State, in the bantamweight bracket.

In addition to Rademacher and Rouse, team members were:

Ray Perez, Hawaii, flyweight; Luis Molina, San Jose, Calif., lightweight; Joe Shaw, St. Louis, light welterweight; Harry Smith, New York, featherweight; Pearce Lane, Big Rapids, Mich., welterweight; Jose Torres, Puerto Rico, light middleweight, and Jim Boyd, Rocky Mount, N. C., light heavyweight.

The fighters go into training immediately at the Oakland Army Base. Ten alternates will be selected Saturday as sparring partners. The 10 man team leaves Nov. 6 for Australia.

Denver Sweeps Rivalry's Final

DENVER (AP)—Denver's Pioneers closed out the oldest football rivalry in the Rocky Mountains by trimming Colorado College, 49-21, Friday night.

The Skyline Conference team of Denver passed to four touchdowns in ending its 54-game series with the Rocky Mountain Conference team that first met DU in 1885.

Officials have decided not to schedule any more games because of Denver's overwhelming superiority in recent years. The Pioneers whacked CC 73-0 in 1954 and 60-0 last year. But CC is the overall winner with 23 victories in the series.

NFL Settles With Liberty

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The National Football League has settled for \$100,000 a \$2,100,000 damage suit brought against it by the former Liberty Broadcasting System Inc., of Dallas, Texas.

Federal Judge Alan K. Grim approved the settlement Friday, ending litigation that started Oct. 1, 1954.

Under the terms of the settlement, the trustees of the bankrupt broadcasting system will receive \$80,000 from the league immediately and the remaining \$40,000 by Jan. 7 of next year.

The Liberty System had accused the NFL and its member clubs of unlawfully preventing the broadcast of its games in home territories of the teams. The action was filed under the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, charging illegal monopoly of the pro football games broadcasts.

Marshfield, Medford Roar To Wins

Powerful Marshfield galloped over previously unbeaten Eugene, 33-7, Friday night and all but clinched a berth in the playoff for the state high school football championship it won last year.

It was the 30th game without a defeat for Marshfield, ranked No. 1 in the Oregon Associated Press poll since the start of the season. Eugene, Marshfield's chief rival for the class A-1 district 5 title, is ranked No. 3.

Jack Shanley, a brother of Jim Shanley, University of Oregon halfback star, scored four touchdowns and made 204 yards in 25 carries for Marshfield. One of the touchdowns came on an 89-yard run with an intercepted pass.

Roger Johnson, Shanley's back-

field mate, rolled up 157 yards in 22 running attempts and scored once.

EASY TIME
Medford, the No. 2 team in the poll, had an easy time beating Eureka, Calif., 34-0. Medford played Marshfield to a 20-20 tie earlier this season and the two teams are favored to meet again in the final round of the state playoffs.

Beaverton, ranked No. 4, suffered its first setback of the season, losing 20-0 to the Linfield College junior varsity. But the result does not affect Beaverton's status as one of three favorites for the district 3 title.

One of the others, fifth-ranked Gresham, trounced North Salem in a non-district game, 27-0. The third, Astoria, rated No. 9, de-

feated Seaside, 26-7, in another non-counting game. Gresham and Astoria have perfect season records.

Albany, No. 6 and the favorite in district 8, beat Springfield, No. 10, a district 5 team, 14-0.

PERFECT MARK
Seventh-rated McMinnville, with Jack Temple and Roy Gill each scoring three touchdowns, preserved its perfect mark with a 54-6 victory over Newberg. McMinnville now is considered almost certain to keep its district 4 championship and win a playoff position. West Linn, which retained an outside chance by downing St. Helens 18-7, was badly beaten by McMinnville earlier.


Grants Pass, No. 8 and the only serious obstacle to Medford in dis-

trict 6, showed power in beating Roseburg, 35-14.

Pendleton moved into the lead in the district 7 race, trampling Hermiston, 27-0, while The Dalles was upsetting La Grande, 13-7. Pendleton, defending titlist, now is the only unbeaten team in that district's competition. It was tied once by La Grande.

The two top teams in district 8, South Salem and Corvallis, meet at Salem Saturday night.

Benson and Lincoln continued unbeaten and united in the Portland city league, which sends two teams to the state playoffs. Benson whaled Jefferson, last year's league champion, 32-6, and Lincoln shut out Washington, 20-0. Benson and Lincoln meet next weekend in the season's big game.
