Ohio State Loss May Be Blessing

CHICAGO (UP)—Monday morning quarterbacks, inclined to look on the bright side, agreed today that Ohio State's 7-6 loss to Penn State may be a blessing in disguise.

It was, they decided, just the spur the Buckeyes may need in their drive for a second straight Big Ten championship and the establishment of a new record for consecutive victories over conference foes.

Coach Woody Hayes, whose team is not eligible for the Rose Bowl game this year, is avidly

aiming for the record. A win over Wisconsin Saturday would tie the mark now held by Michigan at 15 straight and leave excellent prospects to eclipse it when the Bucks meet Northwestern Nov. 3.

A BIG POINT
The Lions scored in the last 4 minutes of the game to break a scoreless tie. Halfback Bruce Gilmore went over from the one-foot line, and quarterback Milton Plum kicked the victory-margin extra point. Don Clark scored for Ohio State in the closing minutes and sub quarterback Frank Kremlbas missed the try for the point after his team was penalized for having 12 players on the field.

Ohio State was the only loser in Big Ten play against non-league opposition. Iowa beat Hawaii 34-0, Michigan State hammered Notre Dame 47-14, and Indiana got its first victory of the season in defeating Nebraska, 19-14.

In conference action underdog Wisconsin held Purdue to a 6-6 tie, Michigan beat Northwestern 34-20 and Minnesota edged Illinois 16-13 by virtue of a field goal.

Michigan's bottomless barrel of manpower were down the Wildcats who could muster only 26 players for action. Wolverine halfback John Herrstein scored three times and All-American end Ron Kramer once.

Halfback Bobby Cox, a transfer from Washington, passed and ran Minnesota to both its touchdowns against the Illini and then got an assist from fullback Dick Borstad, who kicked a field goal from the four.

LIGHTNING STRIKES
Wisconsin and Purdue fumbled four times each in working their way to the 6-6 standoff. Len Dawson passed to Lamar Lundy for the Bolshaker score and Danny Lewis ran 20 yards for a Badger touchdown.

The Spartans' 47-14 triumph was their most lopsided win over the Irish in their 23-game series. The Irish played inspired football for the first two periods which ended in a 7-7 score. But Michigan State struck like lightning for six touchdowns in the next two sessions.

Iowa used substitutes lavishly in its easy win over Hawaii. Halfback Mike Hagler was tops in Hawkeye scoring, going over for two touchdowns.

Fullback Bob Fee smashed through the Nebraska line for two touchdowns in the last period to give Indiana its win.

In addition to the Ohio State-Wisconsin game, others are Michigan State at Illinois, Northwestern at Indiana, Iowa at Purdue, Minnesota at Michigan, and Oklahoma at Notre Dame.

TUNE-UP ROUT
GREENWOOD LAKE, N.Y. (UP)—Ray (Sugar) Robinson may engage in a tune-up bout with Bob Provizi at Providence, R.I., next month before he defends his middleweight title against Gene Fullmer at Madison Square Garden, Dec. 12. "I'd like to get one fight under my belt before I meet Fullmer," Robinson said today at his training camp.

MIDDLEWEIGHTS
MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UP)—Joey Giardello of Philadelphia, who has never lost a fight in Milwaukee, will meet Charley Cotton of Toledo, Ohio, in a 10-round middleweight bout here Nov. 13.

On Dec. 12, Robinson will defend his 160-pound diadem against 24-year-old Gene Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah, at Madison Square Garden.

Each of the other four champions are 20 — lightweight Joey Brown of New Orleans, featherweight Sandy Saddler of New York, bantamweight Mario D'Agata of Italy and flyweight Pascual Perez of Argentina. (D'Agata is generally recognized as bantam champ although the NBA claims younger Raton Macias of Mexico is the 118-pound ruler. They may fight at Los Angeles in January or February to decide the issue.)

Has this accent on age among current champions any significance?

Manager Al Weill—who guided Rocky Marciano, Marty Servo, Lou Ambers and Joey Archibald to titles — believes that television is indirectly responsible for the prevalence of whiskers in the throne room now.

FEW TURN PRO
He said today, "because television has killed off most of the small clubs — in the United States at least, there are very few places for young professionals to fight and earn a living as they develop. So — only a few turn pro every year now, and those that do turn have to work on jobs in the daytime to eat and they have to train at night to develop. It takes them longer to move up because they're handicapped in training and handicapped in getting small-club ring experience."

Weill admitted that Marciano was "a standout exception," who turned pro "when he was matured" at 23, "and was lucky enough to be handled by people who could get him small-club experience and move him along just right. (Weill claims Rocky actually was 25 instead of 23 when he turned.)

"Without me and Charley Goldman (trainer) to handle him, Marciano never became champion," Al declared bitterly.

If the International Boxing Club would open some small arenas, without benefit of TV, in New York, Chicago and California, it would help develop young talent, he concluded.

FULFILLED

Three Hunting Deaths Told

Three more fatalities were reported in Oregon over the weekend, raising the hunting season death toll to 22.

Gregory Franklin Zimmerman, 22, an airman stationed at the Burns radar base, died from a wound accidentally inflicted by a hunting companion Friday. State police said the companion, Franklin Darrell Sales, 18, told them that Zimmerman stepped into his line of fire as he shot at a deer.

Jimmie Allen McDaniel, 13, of Port Orford, was killed Sunday while hunting rabbits in the Roseburg area with two other youngsters.

Coroner L. L. Powers said that a .22 caliber rifle held by Gary Rose, 12, accidentally discharged when it struck a branch. The bullet penetrated the McDaniel boy's heart.

James R. McGinnis, 64, Portland, died at a Boise hospital Saturday, following brain surgery. He was stricken while on a hunting trip near Vale.

Fifteen others have died of heart seizures since hunting season opened Sept. 29.

The two weekend gunshot deaths brought to five the number fatally wounded in the field. One other was shot to death while preparing to go hunting.

Lewis, Clark Takes Chico; Remains Top

Lewis and Clark, only undefeated college football team in Oregon, maintained its perfect record Saturday when it went outside the Northwest Conference and defeated Chico (Calif.) State, 29-25.

In regular conference action, Willamette upset College of Idaho 13-7 and Linfield edged Whitman 14-13.

Pacific, also playing outside the league, beat Eastern Oregon College of the Oregon Collegiate Conference, 13-7.

An 80-yard touchdown run from the second half kickoff by freshman end Roy Barnes provided what proved to be the winning margin in Willamette's victory at Salem.

Fullback Charlie Koani scored the other Willamette touchdown after a fumble recovery.

Halfback Eddie Lodge, the top ground gainer of the conference, scored for C. of I. in the final quarter on a 36-yard run.

At Walla Walla, Whitman missed a conversion attempt in the final quarter in its one-point loss to Linfield.

Next conference action sends Willamette against Linfield and Pacific against Whitman. In non-conference games it will be Lewis and Clark vs. Whitworth and College of Idaho vs. California Polytechnic.
