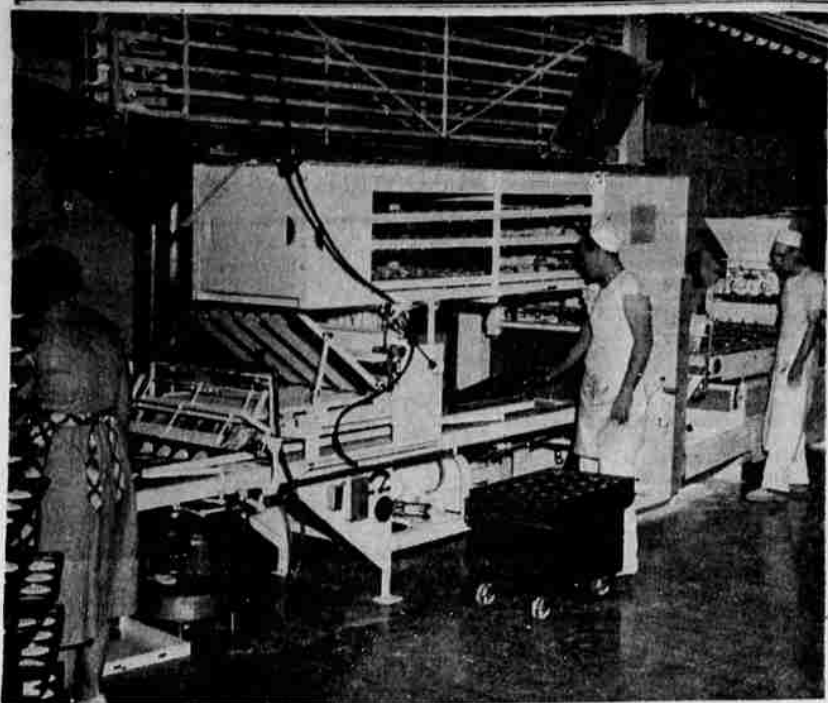

CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa (UP)—A motorist accused of deliberately ramming into six people with his car has been charged with assault with intent to murder.

Police said James Williams, 35, injured the six Saturday when he drove his car onto a sidewalk and into the people with whom he had been arguing.

Witnesses said the argument began when two of the group urged Williams to leave his three children with them because he had been drinking.

Williams allegedly threatened the group with a knife but was overpowered and disarmed. He drove off but returned in a few minutes, swerved onto the wrong side of the street and up onto the sidewalk.

Three persons were hospitalized.
