Slight Moisture Does Not Help Southwest Drought

DALLAS (AP)—Little Mike Oatman, 14 months old, ran to the window last week and looked out, then unloosed a great wail.
 "What's that? What's that?" he asked his mother excitedly.
 He was seeing rain for the first time. It's rained in Dallas within 14 months, but rain is still rare enough to cause children to wonder.
 The rains in scattered parts of the Southwest ranged up to 7 inches last week. But in the words of Texas Agriculture Commissioner

John White, "they didn't make a real dent" in the 10-year drought.
 The Texas moisture was too slight to help much. Scattered to heavy rains in Oklahoma helped, but most of the state reported supplies of water still were short. Rainfall in Eastern Kansas benefited wheat. Arizona reported no significant rain. The drought was becoming severe in much of Missouri.

Even had the rains been general and heavy, agricultural experts say, they alone would not have erased the scars of 10 years of general drought. The drought was broken only by a wet season in 1949.
 To restore subsoil moisture, say the experts, rains must be frequent and heavy.
 The Texas rains, which caused floods around Del Rio on the Mexican border, appeared the heaviest of any in the Southwest.

Where moisture fell, it raised the level of stock water ponds. On the Rio Grande, which divides Texas and Mexico, a total gain of 4 to 5 feet was expected at Falcon Dam from the heavy Del Rio rains. Flow from the reservoir has been cut off for many weeks because the water level has been low.
 Rains fell in the watersheds of the rivers supplying North Central Texas cities with water, but the soil was so dry the rains were absorbed where they fell and there was not much runoff into city reservoirs.

The prospects for rains in the Southwest in the fall and winter are not good. Weather Bureau records show.

Russ Premier Lands In Center Of U.S. Campaign

 Russian Premier Bulganin landed in the middle of the U.S. political campaign with a loud thump yesterday. President Eisenhower denounced him as a mediator in the controversy over ending H-bomb tests.

Bulganin's latest note — endorsing the views of "certain prominent public figures in the United States" who want H-bomb tests halted — drew a stinging reply from Eisenhower and added fuel to the current campaign debate. Even before Eisenhower's rejection of the Bulganin letter, Adlai Stevenson put out a statement saying, "The White House seems to have dismissed the Russian offer out of hand..."

POLICE SHOT DURING BATTLE
 LINCOLN, ILL. (AP)—Two Illinois state policemen were shot early today and one was reported in critical condition after engaging in a gun battle with four heavily armed men.

Officer Glen Nichols, about 35, was shot three times and critically hurt and officer Robert Goughly, about 28, was wounded once in the roadside gun fight on a U.S. Route 66 bypass.

Sheriff William Keys said two Joliet, Ill., men were captured, but the two others involved in the fracas eluded police. Keys identified the prisoners as William G. Wilcox, 31, Joliet and Arvid Jopp, 24, Joliet.

Keys said the officers chased an auto carrying the four men after it went through a red light near Lincoln, a central Illinois community. The car stopped near a restaurant and the four opened fire as the officers drove up. Keys related.

The policemen returned the gunfire, but Keys said he did not know if the two who escaped on foot in opposite directions were wounded. Neither of the captured pair was struck by bullets, he said.
 No charges have as yet been placed against the two prisoners.

Britain Explodes Fourth Weapon

MELBOURNE, Australia (UP)—Britain exploded the fourth and last atomic weapon of the current test series in the desert wastes of Western Australia before daylight early today.

Sir William Penney, chief British atomic scientist, and members of his team were expected to fly home within the next few days with data to be analyzed during the next few months.

to curb these dreadful weapons." Stevenson referred to an earlier statement by presidential press secretary James C. Hagerty, who had called the letter "a propaganda exercise rather than a serious attempt to achieve understanding between heads of state."

Stevenson's own proposal — that the United States take the lead in negotiations toward ending H-bomb tests — has been condemned by Eisenhower and other GOP leaders as a threat to national security unless there are foolproof mutual inspection agreements.

Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) called on Stevenson to "repudiate the unwarranted interference of Premier Bulganin..." in our free American elections. Knowland said Stevenson should do so "because you have helped create this situation by your unfortunate position on H-bomb tests."

In a statement issued in California, also before Eisenhower's reaction to the Bulganin note was made public, Sen. Estes Kefauver said the United States has "everything to gain and nothing to lose" by negotiating with Russia on a test ban.

ROCKETS FIRED FOR AIR STUDY
 FORT CHURCHILL, Man. (AP)—U. S. scientists are firing rockets to study atmospheric conditions. The first, a pencil-like 14-foot Cajun, roared up more than 70 miles Saturday. Another, a 26-foot Aerobee, is due to be set off Monday night.

The rockets are packed with instruments to measure density, temperature and pressure of the upper atmosphere. The explorations are being conducted in anticipation of the United States program for the International Geophysical Year beginning next July.
