

Michigan State Grabs Lead Marshfield Tops HS Voting

Sooners Fall To 2nd Spot

Football experts, reversing their previous opinions like a set of shifty hallmarks, today picked unbeaten Michigan State over equally unbeaten Oklahoma as the nation's No. 1 football team.

It was the first time this season that Oklahoma's Sooners had finished anywhere but first in the weekly Associated Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters. The 47-14 trouncing Michigan State handed Notre Dame last Saturday seems to have swung the balance. Oklahoma racked up its fourth, and record breaking, victory at the expense of Kansas 34-12.

That was the 34th in a row for the Sooners, who don't often face opposition quite as tough as Michigan State's.

Georgia Tech, whose standing in the poll has been improving steadily as its victories pile up, retained third place by a comfortable margin. After those three, the order was jumbled by upsets, but all the teams rated in the first 10 a week ago managed to stay in there as two losers tied for 10th place.

Michigan State drew 96 of 156 first-place votes this week and Oklahoma only 44.

In the point scoring on the usual basis of 10 for each first place vote, 9 for second, etc., the totals came out: Michigan State 1,459, Oklahoma 1,356 and Georgia Tech 1,182.

Tennessee moved from seventh into fourth place after beating Alabama 24-0. Michigan and Southern California also advanced three notches, to fifth and sixth. Texas A&M, a 7-6 winner over Texas Christian, advanced from the second 10 into seventh place. Then came Baylor, idle last week-end, and upset losers Ohio State, Mississippi and TCU, all of which fell in the ratings.

Dodd Wins Lawton Open

LAWTON, Okla. (UP)—Betty Dodd, the red-haired veteran from San Antonio, Tex., closed out the women's summer golf schedule by setting a new course record here Monday and beating the field by five strokes in the \$5,000 Lawton Ladies' PGA Open.

Miss Dodd fired a 67, five under par, in her final round on the Lawton course. Her 34-hole card in the weather-delayed tournament showed 74-73-67-214.

Patty Berg of St. Andrew, Ill., finished second with 76-75-68-219.

Marlene Bauer Haggis of Sarasota, Fla., won \$250 for third place and thereby set an all-time money winning record among the women pros. Her season total was \$20,235.50.

Yankee, Redleg Lead Major Clutch Hitters

NEW YORK (UP)—Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees and Frank Robinson of Cincinnati, both sure-fire candidates for baseball's post-season awards, came through with leading clutch hitting performances during the 1956 season.

Mantle, certain for consideration as the American League's most valuable player, and Robinson, a top National League rookie, led the major leagues in game-winning blows. Each had eight figures compiled by The Associated Press showed Tuesday.

Credit for a game-winning blow was given to each player who put his club ahead to stay in the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth or an extra inning.

Behind the leaders with seven game-winning blows were Willie Mays of the New York Giants and Willie Jones of the Philadelphia Phillies.

One of the best clutch showings was made by Ron Northey of the Chicago White Sox, who turned five pinch-hits and one sacrifice fly into six victories for his club. One of Northey's blows came in the 11th inning, one in the 10th, another in the ninth, two in the eighth and one in the seventh.

Other players with six game-winning blows were Ted Williams and Jim Piersall of the Boston Red Sox, Al Kaline of Detroit, Carl Furillo of the Brooklyn Dodgers, Ted Kluszewski and Smokey Burgess of Cincinnati, Del Ennis of the Philadelphia Phillies and Wally Moon of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Mantle, who led both leagues with 52 homers, turned the tide four times with his circuit walk-ups. Two doubles and as many singles rounded out his under-pressure heroics. Mickey connected for one game-winning safety in the 10th inning (the pennant-clincher against the White Sox on Sept. 18), two in the ninth frame, one in the eighth and four in the seventh.

Four of Robinson's game-winners also resulted from home runs with three singles and a sacrifice fly accounting for the others. Three of the pivotal hits were made in extra innings which helped defeat Milwaukee, Pittsburgh and the Giants.

Wolverines Boast Lots Of 'Kev' Men

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UP)—Kick around the football terms "one-man gang" and "one-two punch" all you want, but don't kick 'em toward Michigan!

Coach Bennie Oosterbaan, whose Wolverines' only loss was to powerful Michigan State, has dotted his club's old-fashioned single wing attack with a host of runners and passers of near-equal ability.

The system has been so successful that Michigan boasts no stars, says the veteran Wolverine coach. "We don't have outstanding personnel," he insists. "We have a fine group of boys who do a number of things fairly well. They work hard as a unit, and because of their versatility, we have been fortunate enough to keep the opponents' defenses pretty loose."

To illustrate what the Michigan coach is talking about, four runners—fullback John Herrstein and halfbacks Terry Barry, Jim Pace and Bob Pateck—have carried the ball on 152 of Michigan's 212 running plays.

Barry has carried 35 times and leads the ground gainers with a 6.2 average. Pace has a 3.6 average for 44 carries. The sophomores, Herrstein and Pateck, have carried 73 times between them. Herrstein has a 4.5 average in 53 tries and Pateck has a 4.1 average in 20 attempts.

The Wolverine passing game is just as evenly split up. Although Michigan lacks what Oosterbaan calls a "good, consistent passer," no fewer than 11 players have tried their hand at it in the four games played so far.

Medford, Gresham 2nd, 3rd

Three members of last week's top 10 in the Associated Press high school football poll were defeated last Friday. All three dropped in this week's voting by sports writers and broadcasters.

Marshfield and Medford continued on top, Marshfield getting first-place votes from all but two of the participants and winding up with 168 points. Medford received 154 points on a flock of second-place votes and two ballots for No. 1.

Marshfield has topped the poll for five consecutive weeks and Medford has been No. 2. Both are undefeated and battled to a 20-20 tie earlier in the season.

Gresham moved up two spots and replaced Eugene as No. 3 this week. Eugene having lost to Marshfield, 38-7, last weekend. Gresham swept past North Salem.

McMinnville, No. 7 last week, advanced to fourth after crushing Newberg, 54-6. Eugene slipped to No. 5.

Beaverton dropped two places to No. 6 after losing a 20-0 decision to the Linfield College junior varsity. Albany, despite its victory over Springfield, slipped a notch to No. 7.

Springfield, tied for No. 10 last week, dropped out of the top 10. Astoria and Grants Pass traded places. Astoria rising to No. 8 after its defeat of Seaside. Grants Pass, dropped Roseburg, 35-14, but still dropped one notch to ninth in the poll.

Benson of Portland climbed into the top 10 for the first time this season after downing last year's Portland city league champion, Jefferson. Benson meets Lincoln Friday night in a crucial Portland game.

Out Of Town Hardtoppers Big Winners

Out of town drivers captured most of the honors and trophies Sunday afternoon at Klamath Speedway in the big Hardtop Jamboree sponsored by the Klamath Racing Association.

Five visiting hardtoppers snared victories, leaving only three to Klamath Falls drivers, and two of these went to Ken Kime in K-48. The other local winners were Dale Hankins in K-1.

The 100-lap A-main event went to speedy Ed Brown in C-8. The Meridian, California driver piloted his car across the finish line ahead of Bert Miller, another Californian from Project City. Finishing in third place was Lou Kerk of Medford in M-7, with Ray Brackman in K-22 coasting home in fourth position.

In the program's 30-lap Semi-Main, of B-main, Kime rode to victory in his Klamath Falls car. Behind Kime at the finish line was Doyce Lemley, Hal Stewart, Jim Barrett and Don Spear in the top five spots.

Kime also nabbed a heat race triumph as did Spear, Miller and Brown. Second placers in the heats 33 from the local oval were Barrett and Hankins.

Hankins won the A-trophy dash, with Brackman in the trophy two position. The winner of the B-trophy was Lemley in A-37. Buff Runnels was second.

Bud Cook tied the speedway track record in the time trials with a 19:60 clocking for one lap of the quarter-mile track. Brown timed in at 19:70, while Al Bonotto and Brackman recorded 19:80 times. Hankins and Kurz each had time trial marks of 20:00.

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Redlegs Grab Four Spots On National All-Star Team

NEW YORK (UP)—Four players from the Cincinnati Redlegs, two each from the Brooklyn Dodgers, Milwaukee Braves and St. Louis Cardinals, and one from the New York Giants were named today to the annual United Press National League All-Star Team.

The honor squad, selected by 61 sports writers from the various league cities, is one of the most

powerful ever to be named. The Ed Bailey from Cincinnati ranked third with 48.

UTILITY STAR
Because of unusual circumstances, the United Press for the first time selected a utility all-star. Stan Musial of the Cardinals, Musial received a total of 18 outfield and 16 first base votes. This combined total would have put him ahead of rookie Frank Robinson of Cincinnati, who had 28, and first baseman Ted Kluszewski of Cincinnati, who had 32. Since Musial played both positions, he was designated as a utility member of the team.

Red Schoendienst, veteran second baseman for the New York Giants, who has been a perennial member of the team, was selected for that spot with 31 votes, while Roy McMillan of Cincinnati was named at shortstop with 30 and Ken Boyer of St. Louis at third with a total of 44 votes.

The pitchers were Don Newcombe of Brooklyn, who had 47 votes, and Warren Spahn of Milwaukee, who totaled 38.

There was a big turnover from last year's All-Star team. Only Snider Kluszewski, Schoendienst, Musial, and Newcombe were repeaters.

RBI LEADER
Musial was the leader of the squad in runs batted in with 109 and Snider set the homer pace with 43. There were six 300-plus hitters led by Aaron's .328. Musial was at .310, Boyer .306, Kluszewski and Schoendienst .302, and Bailey .300 even. Snider hit .290 and Robinson .292, leaving only McMillan as a batting "weakling" but his .263 average was more than offset by his spectacular fielding. Besides Musial, both Kluszewski and Snider topped the 100 RBI mark. Klu with 102 and Duke with 101. Boyer just missed with 98 and Aaron had 93.

Newcombe with a 27-7 won-loss record was the biggest victory man in the majors and Spahn with a 20-11 mark recorded his seventh season at 20 or more victories.

There was only one close race for a position. That was at shortstop, where McMillan beat Ernie Banks of the Cubs by four votes.

Pelicans, Owls Host Grants Pass, HS JVs

This will be a big week for local football fans as the Klamath Union High School Pelicans and Oregon Tech Owls face hometown play this weekend in games slated for Friday and Saturday nights at Modoc Field.

Leading off the weekend parade will be the Pel's clash with Grants Pass in a traditional District 6-A-1 and Southern Oregon Conference battle Friday evening. Tech Saturday, the scene switches to the high-flying Oregon Tech Owls as they face Humboldt State College's Jayvees.

For the Pel and coach John McGinnis, this will be the "big one." If the Whitebirds are going to remain in contention for district honors, they must win this Friday's clash with the Cavemen. In case of a Grants Pass win, then the final two conference games for the Pel would only be a matter of formality.

Coach John McGinnis' charges have had a week's rest since taking the 47-19 trimming at Medford.

C. Erskine Trips Japs

SAPPORO, Japan (UP)—Carl Erskine's slick pitching and a home run by Duke Snider in the ninth inning featured the Brooklyn Dodgers' 1-0 revenge victory over the Tokyo Giants here Tuesday.

The barnstorming Dodgers now have a 2-2 won-and-lost record in their 20-game Japan-wide tour. Erskine held the Giants to three hits and one walk and never let a runner past first base. It was the same Giant team—loser of the Japan series—which beat the Dodgers 5-4 in their Tokyo opener last week.

Snider's 330-foot blow over the right-field fence was his first home run in four exhibition games in Japan and brought a mighty cheer from 30,000 fans jammed into Maruyama ball park in the capital of Japan's northern island.

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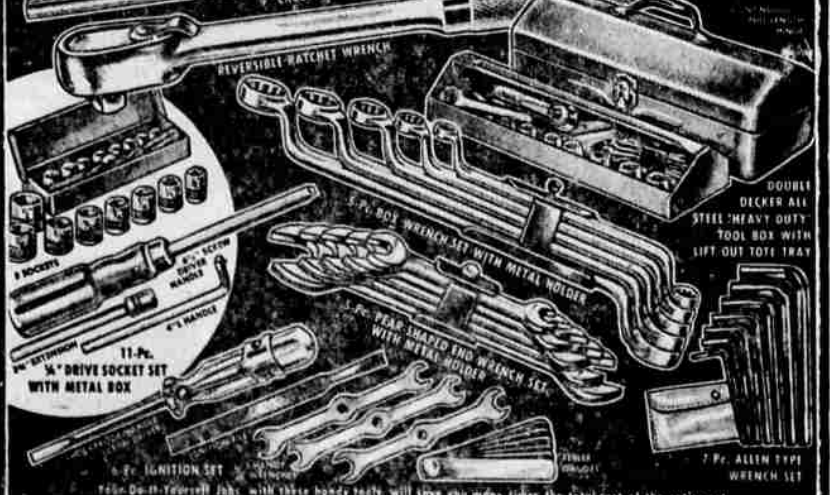
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
