Oklahoma To Face Irish Pigskin Jinx

NORMAN, Okla. (AP)— "Oklahoma score more points against Notre Dame than Michigan State?"

"Son, the Sooners will be lucky to get out of South Bend Saturday with their string of 34 football victories intact." That's the entire Oklahoma coaching staff at its favorite pastime of chanting the "We Can't Beat Them Blues."

From Head Coach Bud Wilkinson down the line, the worry is growing among the coaching staff that the team won't be able to handle the Irish in the nationally televised contest.

It's a sincere worry, and maybe is one reason that Oklahoma has been so successful under Wilkinson for 10 years. Nothing is ever taken for granted.

There are very few things Wilkinson's teams haven't accomplished, and one of them is beating Notre Dame.

Twice the Sooners have clashed with the Irish, and both times they were whipped by a touchdown. The first time in 1932, they lost 21-27 and the next year it was 21-28.

Michigan State stopped Notre Dame 47-14 last Saturday, an impressive enough victory to cause sports writers to drop the Sooners into the No. 2 spot in the nation's football ranks. Michigan State took over the top rung.

Stanford, Troy Workouts Differ For Big PCC Game

Stanford and Southern California fans may get a tipoff on Saturday's Palo Alto game by watching the scrimmages.

At Palo Alto the emphasis is on defense. Jess Hill is running his USC Trojans through offensive drills for the important Pacific Coast Conference battle.

Coach Chuck Taylor, who says his Cards will upset the undefeated southlanders, had the team working Tuesday on six defenses.

Hill, with ace halfback Jon Arnett sitting it out, drilled the Trojans on a wide variety of offensive plays. In the last three games, the Trojans ran 95 plays from the straight T, 50 from the winged T and 61 from the single wing. Arnett, who ends his collegiate career against Stanford, is nursing a hip-pointer. But he'll be ready Saturday.

At Corvallis, Oregon State, seeking its first touchdown against UCLA since 1950, stressed passing practice. End Norm Thiel and his replacement, Dwayne Fournier, hauled in passes tossed by Joe Francis, Paul Lowe and Tony Arana.

UCLA held a two-hour closed drill with Edison Griffin and Don Long running from the tailback spot in place of Doug Bradley, who ended his collegiate career last week against California.

Dick Bass was a popular fellow at Pullman, where the Washington State Cougars worked out in the snow. Coach Jim Sutherland had a number of players imitating the running style of Bass, College of Pacific sophomore star.

"We'll have to throw and throw plenty to match them," he said.

At Seattle, Coach Darrell Royal of Washington experimented with replacements for right halfback Dick Paysano, who sprained his shoulder in the workout. The in-

Klamath To Host Cavemen

Coach John McGinnis sent his Klamath Union High School footballers through their final heavy-duty practice session this afternoon as he and the Pelicans make ready for their Friday meeting with the Grants Pass Cavemen here on Modoc Field.

This will be the big one for the Pels, who will be completely out of the district and conference races if they fall before the Cavemen Friday evening. But the White-bird footballers—high in spirit—have decided against any such move.

McGinnis reported today that his squad was approaching the Grants Pass clash at a very good morale level, and by game time Friday night, the Pels should be ready to hold their own against the state's ninth ranked prep team. Grants Pass was classed as the number six team a few weeks ago.

One key factor in the Pelicans being "up" is reviewing last year's 33-31 disputed win by the Cavemen at Grants Pass. A referee's wrong decision, a protest to the OSA and a touchdown to Klamath Falls a week after the game had ended were the factors involved in the squabble last year on the Cavemen's sod. But this year, it will be different, or so the KU-men have vowed.

Coach Mel Ingram's Cavemen will again boast a first-class club to meet the Pels here Friday. So far this year, Grants Pass has won five and lost two, those to Marshfield and Longview, Washington. Klamath has won two and lost four. There have been no common foes between the two clubs yet this year.

Friday night's crowd will include 100 or more ex-lettermen at KUHS who have come together for the first annual K-Club Reunion. All of the ex-letter winners will be on hand for the game, then join in a dinner at Reames Golf and Country Club following the grid clash at Modoc. Jim Bocchi is chairman of the reunion. All former lettermen who have not been contacted are urged to notify Bocchi as soon as possible.

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Holman, Machen To Meet

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)— Unbeaten Eddie Machen will gun for his 18th straight victory and a higher heavyweight ranking when he collides with towering Chicago veteran Johnny Holman in a nationally televised bout here Wednesday night.

Machen, ranked No. 7, and Holman, No. 8, have been training hard for the fight several days here and doctors Tuesday pronounced them in top physical condition.

Machen, 24-year-old Redding, Calif., sharpshooter, continued to reign as a 2-1 favorite in the scheduled 10-round fight.

Tommy Moyer, who is promoting the fight, said he hopes to match the winner against Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson, the third-ranked heavyweight. Jackson holds two decisions over Bob Baker, who defeated Holman in Holman's last fight.

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
